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# The 16th Annual Mass Hockey Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony

### Nomination Criteria

*Nominees shall be chosen on the basis of accomplishments in the game of hockey, sportsmanship, character, and contributions to his or her teams or organizations in college, amateur or professional hockey, or on international teams representing the United States. Each nominee must have distinguished himself or herself by exceptional performance and outstanding character reflecting favorably upon the game of hockey in Massachusetts, be in good public standing in the community, an appropriate role model for young players, and an exemplary representative of the game of hockey.*

### Nate Greenberg - Media



In 2007 Nate retired after 34 years in the Boston Bruins organization. He was Assistant to President Harry Sinden for the final 19 years, during which he handled a myriad of duties including scheduling, special events, television and radio contracts, and pre-season games. He was named Director of Public Relations in August 1973, and in 15 seasons received numerous awards including outstanding press guide and press box by the Professional Hockey Writers Association. A native of Manchester, MA, Nate graduated from Boston University in 1971. He worked as a sports writer for the Boston Herald Traveler while in college. Nate and his wife Karin reside in Newton, MA and since his retirement he has enjoyed the addition of two grandchildren to the family.

### Mike Gilligan - Coach



A native of Beverly, MA, Gilligan began his coaching career at his alma mater, Salem State, in 1975 where he compiled a .727 winning percentage. After a stint at Yale, Mike was named the head coach at Vermont in 1984. While at the helm of the Catamounts, Gilligan posted a record of 279-289-46 and a career record of 419-348-49 as a collegiate head coach for 26 years. When Gilligan retired from his head coaching duties at Vermont in May of 2003, he ranked sixth among active coaches in career victories. After retiring from his head coaching duties at Vermont in 2003, Mike got involved with coaching the US national women's team in various national and international events. Since the spring of 2003, Mike has served as the Assistant to the Director of Athletics for Special Projects and has been instrumental in the Catamounts women's hockey program's recruiting efforts.

### Ned Bunyon - Official



Edmund F. (Ned) Bunyon Jr.'s passion for hockey never waned. Ned was a team captain and league all-star at Belmont High, where he graduated in 1954. He skated for BC from the 1955 through 1958 seasons, led the Eagles in scoring as a junior, and was named All-East as a senior. He played in three Beanpot Tournaments (an event he would later officiate) and scored twice in BC's 1957 Beanpot championship victory over BU. After college graduation, Mr. Bunyon served in the Army and then earned his master's degree in business from Boston College in 1963. He became a college referee five years later, the start of a 35-year career at that level with the Eastern College Athletic Conference. Ned's legacy is truly exemplified by his mentoring of young referees to learn the art of "working a good game" and respecting the sport. The level of professionalism and love for hockey that he lived by resonated with everyone he impacted over the years...to be carried on for years to come.

### James Cooney - Builder



Jim Cooney was a player, coach, spectator, director, president and avid fan of all things hockey. He spent his youth playing hockey on frozen ponds in Burrillville, Rhode Island. His Mass Hockey career began as the coach of his son Sean's Framingham Youth Hockey Team; he soon became President of Framingham Youth Hockey and began exchange programs with youth leagues from Canada and Germany. He then branched out to Mass Hockey where he served as Director and Vice President. In addition he also worked on an initiative programs for USA Hockey including ACE and Fun and Skills. He continued to coach Massachusetts Select Teams including the 495 Stars and the Middlesex Braves where he traveled with his teams to Sweden and Norway and followed the NHL careers of all his former players. In addition he volunteered for the US Sled Hockey Team and various women's hockey leagues. He ended his career in hockey by becoming the "voice" of hockey games at Framingham High, Framingham State College and Northeastern University, his alma mater.

### John "Gus" Gustafson - Builder



John was a long time resident and active member of both Massachusetts Hockey and the Framingham Youth Hockey Program (FYH). John's involvement with FYH started in 1981 as a coach. During his coaching tenure at FYH he won a state championship at the PeeWee C level. John also coached the 495 Stars from 1995-2005. In addition to coaching, John served on the FYH board and was chairman of the Perini Invitational Youth Hockey Tournament. At the state level, John was an active member of the Mass Hockey Player development program assisting organizationally and coaching with the Spring Festival, a national player evaluation program. John was part of the team that pioneered the Initiation Program and served as an instructor to other start-up Initiation Programs around the country.

### **Bob Rogers - Builder**



Bob started his involvement in hockey in 1985 with the Gardner Youth Hockey (GYH) program, coaching his son David. Bob soon became president of the GYH and as time passed, he became the Registrar for District 7 and a district director at state level. Bob started the Central Mass Outlaws Hockey Association in 1990, and coached the midget team to a National Championship. Bob worked tirelessly for the betterment of youth hockey in Massachusetts. Along with Doc Ashare, he started the Heads Up, Don't Duck Program, which educates players on the importance of spinal injuries and concussions. Bob also served as the webmaster for Mass Hockey for many years. Bob was a true friend, a loving husband and father, and most importantly a dedicated member of the hockey community always focused on the players, first and foremost.

### **Jack Garrity - Player**



Jack Garrity was one of Massachusetts' most outstanding hockey players and in addition, he coached high school hockey for 10 years, refereed high school and NCAA college games for 20 years and taught at hockey camps until he was 70. As a high school standout in Medford, Jack led the team to two GBI Hockey League and two MA High School Hockey State Championship titles in 1943 and 1944. In 1948, Jack was selected as one of just three non-college players to play for the 1948 Olympic Team. He entered Boston University in 1949, where during his sophomore year, Jack broke the NCAA single season scoring record with 51 goals and 33 assists for 84 points, as he led BU to the NCAA finals. After graduation, Jack became a teacher and the athletic director at Archbishop Williams High School in Braintree. Jack is a member of the Massachusetts Football Coaches Association Hall of Fame, the BU Hall of Fame and the US Hockey Hall of Fame.

### **Lee Johnson - Player**



Lee was born and raised in Peabody, MA playing pond hockey on Brown's Pond. A self proclaimed "rink rat", she played with the boys teams up through bantams and juniors and then joined the Massport Jets 1969, the first all girl's hockey team in the US. Lee graduated from Swampscott High in 1975, and went on to Colby College where she received 3 varsity letters in 3 sports; field hockey, ice hockey, and softball. During her college hockey career she won many accolades including being voted the best college women's hockey player in North America in 1978, and was the womens college hockey's highest scorer that same year. In 1979, she was the first women at the school to have her Jersey retired. Lee is also a member of the Swampscott High School Hall of Fame. Lee has 3 children Kimberlee, Jake and Tyler and owns her own Landscape Design firm in NH.

### **Robert McManama - Player**



After starring with his high school team at Belmont Hill, center Bob McManama played three years at Harvard from 1970 to 1973. Bob joined David Hynes and Bill Corkery on the famed "Local Line" and during his final two years with the school, he established himself as one of the premiere scorers in the ECAC. He was chosen to the Second All-Star Team in 1972, and elevated himself to the First Team in 1973 after scoring 27 goals and 52 points in 22 games. McManama was also a 1973 All American selection. After playing at Harvard, he played 99 games in the NHL for the Pittsburgh Penguins and 37 games in the World Hockey Association for the New England Whalers in 1973-76. He was also a member of the United States National Team at the 1972 and 1973 Ice Hockey World Championship tournaments. Bob is a member of the Harvard Varsity Club Hall of Fame.

### **Bill Corkery - Player**



An all-league and all-state selection at Arlington High School and an All-Prep and All-America pick at Phillips Andover, Bill Corkery played the right wing on the famed "Local Line" at Harvard from 1970-1973. During his career at Harvard he totaled 116 points on 53 goals and 63 assists in 73 career games for the Crimson. In 1973, he won the Ivy League scoring title. Bill was a first-team All-Ivy League and second-team All-East selection in 1972-73. A goal and an assist in the 1971 ECAC title game were among his many clutch playoff performances. While at Harvard, Bill played for the 1972 U.S. National Team and following graduation he played for the Boston Braves, a minor league affiliate of the Boston Bruins.

### **David Hynes - Player**



Born in Cambridge, MA, David played for the Harvard Crimson as the left-wing on the famed "Local Line" from 1970-1973. In his freshman year, Coach Bill Cleary moved him to left wing to play with center Bob McManama and he collected 48 goals. In his sophomore year, Hynes scored 26 goals and picked up 26 assists in 27 games. He was chosen the most valuable player of the ECAC Tournament as he scored a hat trick in the finals against Clarkson to give Harvard a come-from-behind 7-4 victory. Hynes had another good season his junior year leading the team in scoring with 54 points on 25 goals and 29 assists. He led the East in goals per game with a 2.36 average and was picked as a first-team All-American in 1972. Hynes was drafted by the Boston Bruins 56th overall in the 1971 NHL Amateur Draft and he turned pro during the 1973-74 season. In addition to the Bruins, Hynes played for the New England Whalers of the WHA and retired in 1978 with the Springfield Indians.
