• TONIGHT'S GAME

Team USA faces Team Canada tonight in the second preliminary game of the World Cup of Hockey 2016 for both teams. The U.S. went 2-1 in its three pre-tournament games. Team USA is 8-0-1-3 (w-otw-otl-l) all-time in two previous World Cup Tournaments.

• LINEUP TONIGHT

Jonathan Quick will start in goal for the U.S., with **Ben Bishop** also dressing. **Dustin Byfuglien** and **Kyle Palmieri**, who did not play Saturday (Sept. 13) vs. Europe, are both in the lineup tonight. **Brandon Dubinsky**, **Jack Johnson**, and **Cory Schneider** will not dress. Quick made 14 saves on 17 shots in Team USA's 3-0 loss to Team Europe on Saturday (Sept. 17). Two of the three goals Quick allowed were on odd-man rushes, including a 2-on-0. Quick started two of Team USA's three pre-tournament games. He made 32 saves on 33 shots in two periods of action in a 4-2 win over Canada on September 9 in Columbus where he was named the number one star. He played the entire game on September 13 in Washington, D.C., and made 30 saves on 32 shots in a 3-2 victory over Finland. Quick played in five of Team USA's six games at the 2014 Olympic Winter Games and was 3-2-0 with a 2.17 goals against average and .923 save percentage.

VS. CANADA

The U.S. and Canada meet for the 14th time in World Cup/Canada Cup play tonight with Canada holding an 8-1-0-3-1 advantage. Team USA's three wins all came in 1996, the year Team USA won the inaugural World Cup of Hockey.

BITS AND PIECES

Team USA had a team meeting this morning at Air Canada Centre followed by an 11 a.m. pre-game skate ... A total of 15 of Team USA's 23 players have children ... Team USA and Team Russia are staying together in the same hotel in Toronto ... The U.S. is the home team today and will wear its blue jerseys. It is occupying the Toronto Raptors lockerroom ... A fire alarm awakened players and staff at their host hotel in Toronto on Monday (Sept. 19) at 7:30 a.m. The shrill of the alarm lasted for approximately 10 minutes and fortunately there was no fire ... Today marks Day 17 of Team USA's World Cup journey that began on Sept. 4 in Columbus ... Defenseman **Ryan Suter** and goaltender **Jonathan Quick** were both born on Jan. 21, Suter in 1985 and Quick in 1986 ... Forwards **Patrick Kane** and **Max Pacioretty** were born exactly one day apart (Kane on 11/19/88 and Pacioretty on 11/20/88) ... A total of 13 of Team USA's players were born in the first six months of the year, while the other 10 were born in the second six months ... The year 1986 is the most popular year for members of Team USA as seven players were born in that year ... **Frank Henry**, one of Team USA's security staff for the World Cup, appeared on the game show Family Feud with his family in 1994 ... **Kimber Auerbach** from the N.Y. Islanders, who is assisting with PR for Team USA during the World Cup, is a second cousin to basketball

• **QUANTICO VISIT ON SEPT. 12**

Team USA visited Quantico in Virginia on Sept. 12 where it met and ate lunch with a contingent of U.S. Marines. Following, the scene shifted to a shooting range where players and staff received a safety briefing before having a chance to fire a number of weapons regularly used by the Marines. The day also included a briefing and team photo on the stairway leading up to the entrance of the Pentagon and a somber visit to the National 9/11 Pentagon Memorial.

• **THE WEEK IN COLUMBUS**

Players and staff of Team USA arrived throughout the day in Columbus on Sunday (Sept. 4). The team gathered for a private reception that evening. Daily practices began Monday (Sept. 5). Players, coaches and staff had official World Cup headshots taken Monday; met daily with media, including two days of sit down interviews with television rights holders; and had a team photo taken Thursday. In addition, on Wednesday, **Ryan Kesler** filmed interviews with four of his Team USA teammates (Dustin Byfuglien, Jack Johnson, Derek Stepan, Cory Schneider) for special World Cup editions of his *Between Two Zambonis* internet show, which will air on ESPN for the World Cup.

• **BACK FROM SOCHI**

The U.S. returns 14 players from the 2014 U.S. Olympic Men's Hockey team that competed in the Olympic Winter Games in Sochi, Russia, including Jonathan Quick, John Carlson, Ryan McDonagh, Ryan Suter, David Backes, Patrick Kane, Ryan Kesler, T.J. Oshie, Max Pacioretty, Zach Parise, Joe Pavelski, Derek Stepan, James van Riemsdyk, and Blake Wheeler.

• **BITS AND PIECES FROM PREVIOUS GAME NOTES**

Forward **Derek Stepan** was the lone U.S. player to record at least one point in each of Team USA's three pre-tournament games. He led the team with four points (2-2) ... Team USA includes seven players who were full-time members of USA Hockey's National Team Development Program (Jack Johnson, Erik Johnson, Patrick Kane, Ryan Kesler, Kyle Palmieri, Ryan Suter, James van Riemsdyk) ... Players on Team USA were the first introduced at the opening night festivities at the Pepsi World Cup of Hockey Premiere Party last night at Scotiabank World Cup of Hockey Fan Village. Forward **Justin Abdelkader** led Team USA down the red carpet and up on stage. Following introductions, the players departed for an Italian team meal ... Last year's NHL season featured four Americans among the top eight point getters in the league (Kane, Pavelski, Gaudreau, Wheeler) in the regular season. In no other NHL season has there been that many Americans among the top eight scorers in the league ... Defenseman and alternate captain **Ryan Suter** has played in 71 games (11 previous tournaments) in a Team USA uniform, the most of any rostered player. Defenseman **Jack Johnson** is right on Suter's heels, having played in 70 games in a Team USA uniform in 10 previous events. Four other members of Team USA have played in 40 or more games in a U.S. uniform, including **Erik Johnson** (50), **Zach Parise** (45), **Ryan Kesler** (41), and **James van Riemsdyk** (41) ... U.S. Head Coach **John Tortorella** met Washington Wizards Head Coach **Scott Brooks** on Sept. 12 at Verizon Center. Brooks took in Team USA's practice ... USA Hockey will host the 5th annual CCM/USA Hockey All-American Prospects Game on Thursday (Sept. 22) at Wells Fargo Center in Philadelphia. The event features 40 of the top American-born players eligible for this June's NHL Draft ... Nationwide Arena in Columbus has a special place in the hearts of a number of Team USA players as it was the location where they were drafted into the NHL in June of 2007. **Patrick Kane** was the #1 pick that year (Chicago Blackhawks), while **James van Riemsdyk** was the #2 choice (Philadelphia Flyers), **Ryan McDonagh** was picked 12th (Montreal Canadiens) and **Max Pacioretty** was chosen 22nd (Montreal Canadiens). John Tortorella is serving as head coach of the U.S. World Cup of Hockey team. Tortorella was an assistant coach for the 2010 U.S. Olympic Men's Hockey team that earned a silver medal, the head coach of the 2008 U.S. Men's National Team and also an associate coach with the 2005 U.S. Men's National Team. **Jack Capuano**, **Scott Gordon**, **Phil Housley**, **John Hynes** and **Mike Sullivan** are all serving as assistant coaches.

• LONE ROOKIE

Dustin Byfuglien is the only member of the U.S. who has not previously represented Team USA in international competition.

• LEADERSHIP TEAM

Joe Pavelski is the captain of Team USA with **Patrick Kane** and **Ryan Suter** serving as alternate captains. In addition, **David Backes**, **Ryan Kesler**, **Ryan McDonagh** and **Zach Parise** are part of Team USA's overall seven-man leadership group.
