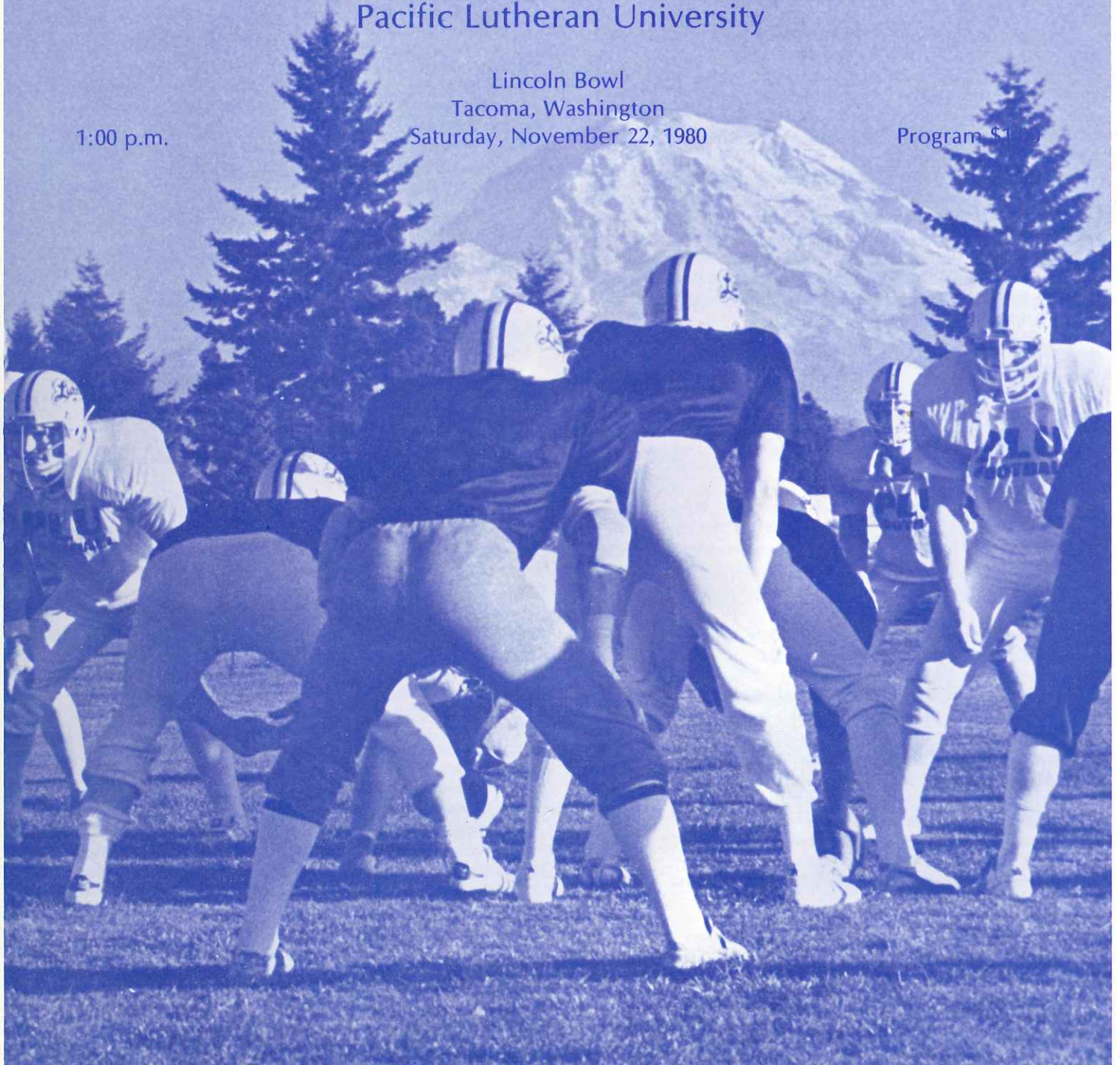

Your attendance here today has important meaning for both the institutions involved and the participants.

There is nothing quite like the pageantry and excitement of American college football. It is the strong feeling of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics that football and other sports are an integral aspect of the institution's total educational program. Over 70,000 student-athletes are annually involved in the varsity sports programs in the NAIA's more than 500 member institutions. We are very pleased that the Fall football program provides the vehicle for alumni and community involvement on campus, as well as a robust and desirable activity for the students.

The NAIA strives for a well balanced and comprehensive program of activities - one that meets the needs and interests of the total student population. Currently the NAIA conducts 15 national championships in 14 different sports. Women's championships and a Women's Division have been added to the NAIA program effective 1980 - 81, by vote of the membership.

The 1980 season marks the third year of a NAIA football playoff format that assures eight teams in Division I and eight teams in Division II an opportunity to compete for coveted national titles in each division. Texas A&I won the 1979 Division I crown, narrowly edging Central Oklahoma 20 - 14 before 9,300 fans in the nationally televised Palm Bowl in McAllen, Texas. The Palm Bowl attendance was more than double that of any other 1979 football playoff game among teams competing below the major level. Findlay College of Ohio, a finalist in 1978, exploded for a 51 - 6 win over Northwestern of Iowa in the 1979 Division II final game.

THE NAIA CHAMPIONSHIP FOOTBALL PLAYOFF SYSTEM DIVISIONS AND AREAS

Unlike basketball, where NAIA institutions compete in districts, NAIA football-playing members are classified according to Divisions — I or II. When the NAIA divided into divisions in 1970 member institutions at the time were given an opportunity to declare in which division they wished to compete. The NAIA Football Coaches Association Review Board has had the authority to rule on changes within divisions and an institution is required to spend at least two seasons in a given division once it is placed there. Within each division member institutions are arranged according to geographic areas. There are four such areas in each division.

RATERS AND RATINGS

Teams selected for participation in the playoffs are determined by weekly ratings of teams during a specified rating period through a season. Selected members of the NAIA Football Coaches Association submit a weekly rating of teams during this period which determines the participants in the post-season playoffs. Each division (I and II) is allocated 16 raters — four raters for each geographical area.

SELECTION OF TEAMS

- Institutions must declare their intent to participate in the NAIA championship program by September 15.
- Teams must be ranked in the top 12 in the final

regular-season weekly rating in each division to be considered for the playoffs.

- The top-ranked team from each of the four geographical areas (in each division) within the top 12 in the final regular-season rating is automatically selected for the playoffs.

- The next four highest-ranked teams, regardless of geographic area, and not already selected, complete the eight-team field.

- No more than two teams from the same conference (within the same division) may be selected for the playoffs.

- Teams may be paired according to geographic proximity to each other for the first round (quarterfinals) and members of the same conference would play each other no later than the second round (semifinals).

- Teams with four or more non-winning games may not be selected for participation in the playoffs.

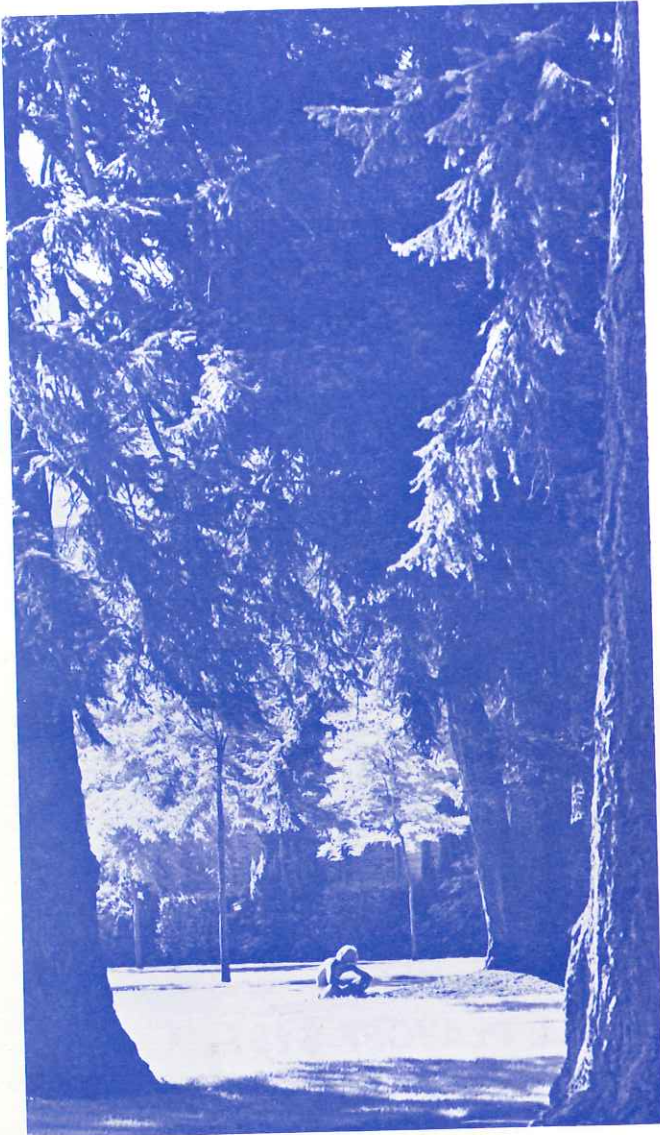

LUTE STAT LEADERS

ERIC CARLSON is the NWC total season passing leader with 173.6 ypg; has completed 92 of 161 for 1215 yards, 8 interceptions; his 15 TD passes ties him for the league lead. SCOTT WESTERING and GUY ELLISON are tied for the total season NWC lead in TD pass receptions with 8 each; they've gained 489 and 492 yards respectively; both have 37 receptions.

MIKE WESTMILLER is second in NWC total season rushing with 561 yards in 126 carries, a 4.5 ypc average; GUY ELLISON leads the NWC in scoring with 68 points.

PRESIDENT WILLIAM O. RIEKE

A man who graduated summa cum laude from PLU in 1953 and was awarded its highest alumni honor, Distinguished Alumnus in 1970, returned to his alma mater as its eleventh president in August, 1975.

Dr. William O. Rieke affirms a strong institutional relationship with the Lutheran church. "There are many excellent liberal arts universities which are not church related," he said. "The justification for PLU's existence, in my judgment, is to provide that extra dimension of relating Christ to all of life — past, present, and future — and to the highest possible quality of academics."

A University of Washington Medical School honors graduate (1958), he served for 17 years as a teacher and administrator within the field of medicine. He has been among the international elite in the area of transplant biology and has done some of the original research making transplantation possible. Rieke is the author or co-author of more than 50 major publications and abstractions dealing primarily with cellular immunology.

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR DAVID M. OLSON

Dr. David Olson, who has filed away more titles than an abstract company, is in his thirteenth year as Luteland appraiser.

Athletic Director and Director of the School of Physical Education, Olson is a member of the NAIA Executive Committee. In addition, he's the president-elect of the Northwest Alliance for Health, Physical Education, Recreation, and Dance.

Olson has clearly etched his trademark in a wide-ranging program of 24 men's and women's team sports, 30 activity courses, a multi-optioned professional program, plus intramural and fitness activities.

A 1956 graduate of Concordia (Minn.) where he was a baseball letterman, Dr. Olson completed his terminal degree at the University of Iowa in 1966.

Before coming to PLU in 1968, Olson served for eight years as Chairman of Athletics and Physical Education at Wartburg College.

FOOTBALL COACH FROSTY WESTERING

Frosty Westering, pyrotechnic speaker and grid strategist, has lit a flame of enthusiasm which has fired up not only the Lute football team, but the PLU student body, faculty, and community as well.

Four times NAIA District I Coach of the Year, Frosty introduced PHD football (pride, hustle, and desire) to Pacific Lutheran in 1972 after a successful coaching stint in the midwest at both the prep and collegiate levels.

Frosty, who packs a 108-47-2 collegiate ledger, including a 64-21-0 PLU mark, hails from Missouri Valley, Iowa. After a four-year hitch in the Marines, he played varsity football at both Northwestern and Nebraska-Omaha. Westering spent the next eight years in the Iowa high school coaching ranks, compiling a 46-21-3 record.

At Parsons College, where he doubled as athletic director and grid guide, Westering fashioned a 10-0 mark in 1962 and was named Iowa Collegiate Coach of the Year. He later was tabbed for the Iowa Collegiate Coaching Hall of Fame. Frosty left Parsons to complete his doctorate at Northern Colorado, then took on the AD and head coaching duties at Lea College (Minn.).

Frosty directed PLU teams to the NAIA top 10 in 1974 and 1975. After guiding the Lutes to the national semifinals in 1979, he was named Northwest small college coach of the year.

Westering is in high demand as a speaker and is a regular at both regional and national conclaves of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

He has done what no man before him could: capture nine Northwest Conference football championships prior to this 1980 season. But then, those who know Ad Rutschman aren't surprised each time he builds another block on a growing tower of accomplishments.

Ad Rutschman is a man of high goals, goals he sets for himself each and every day of his life. His athletic teams are a living example of the man and his ideals.

As a high school standout at nearby Hillsboro, Oregon, Rutschman quickly showed early watchers that he was going to excel. Gaining all-state honors, Rutschman entered Linfield College. He was to become one of the most heralded and highly honored athletes ever to wear the purple and cardinal uniform.

Winning 12 varsity letters in baseball, basketball, and football, Rutschman saw the College honor him at the conclusion of his career by retiring his jersey number 32. The first member of Linfield's football program to be drafted by a professional team, he still remains Linfield's number one all-time leading career rusher.

As a high school coach his teams won a state football championship as well as three baseball titles. He returned to Linfield as head football coach in 1968 and assumed the head baseball duties at Linfield in 1971. His initial team in the baseball was captured Linfield's second NAIA national baseball championship in the school's history.

Entering the 1980 season Rutschman's squads have a .762 winning percentage in football. They have been NAIA playoff participants in 1974, 1977, 1978 and 1980 and in each case completed the regular season undefeated.
