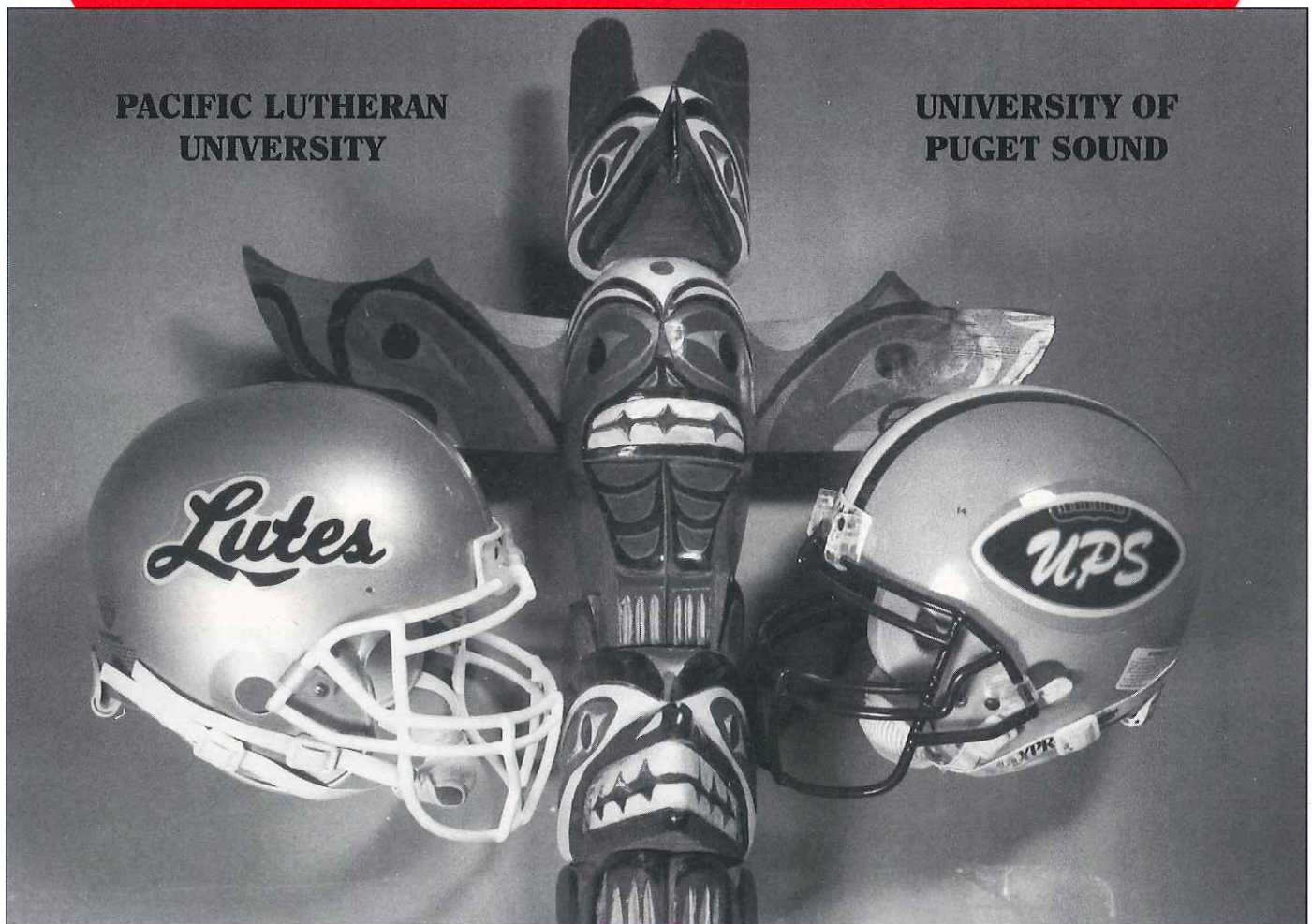

Tacoma's Football Civil War Breaks Out Again Today

For only the second time, Tacoma's two universities will renew their football Civil War in Puyallup — on the artificial surface of Sparks Stadium. They last met there in 1991.

Over the years, the teams have done battle at many different sites, including Stadium Bowl, Lincoln Bowl, Bellarmine Prep, Franklin Pierce High School and two different fields at UPS (the original site was where Burns Baseball Field is now located and the other is Baker Stadium). They played for the first time on mod sod in the Seattle Kingdome in 1986-87 and on the Tacoma Dome carpet from 1983-90.

From 1948-65, PLU and UPS played each other twice a season.

PLU is the home team this year and, just as UPS did a year ago, chose to play the cross-county rivalry at its home field — Sparks Stadium.

Academically and athletically, Pacific Lutheran University and the University of Puget Sound are among national small-college leaders in both categories.

Few communities in the United States have two such outstanding private educational institutions which contribute heavily to the quality of life, culture, recreation and all that is prized in a region's quality of life.

Which university will claim bragging rights as the No. 1

football team in Pierce County? For many years, that claim belonged to UPS, but, in recent years, PLU has held the upper hand.

The Lutes, as they have been since 1972, are under the direction of Frosty Westering, winningest football coach in NAIA Division II; the Loggers are under a second-year head coach in Gordon Elliott, only the second ex-Logger to guide his alma mater's football team (the other was the highly successful Bob Ryan).

Up for grabs is the Totem Pole trophy, awarded by the Young Men's Business Club since 1947.

Helping to insure the financial success of this game — and to help provide travel money for athletes representing the two schools — is the Tacoma Athletic Commission, which has been dedicated to sports and civic betterment in Tacoma-Pierce County for 53 years.

Dr. David Olson, PLU Athletic Director

Dr. David Olson is in his 28th and final year as Athletic Director and Dean of the School of Physical Education at Pacific Lutheran University. Olson announced his retirement, effective July 1, 1996, in October.



A 1989 inductee into the NAIA Hall of Fame, Olson has been the driving force behind one of the most successful small-college athletic programs in the country over the past quarter century. With Dr. Olson serving as athletic director, Pacific Lutheran has won nine NAIA national championships and scores of conference, district and regional championships. In addition, PLU has won the McIlroy/Lewis All-Sports Trophy 10 of the past 11 years. This award is presented to the outstanding athletic program in the Northwest Conference of Independent Colleges, based on the school's success in conference sports.

Olson is past president of the NAIA and has served in a number of capacities with the United States Collegiate Sports Council. Internationally recognized as a spokesman for amateur sports, he was one of five U.S. educators invited to the 1984 International Olympic Academy in Olympia, Greece. He has represented the NAIA at various amateur sports events, including the World University Games in 1989 (Sofia, Bulgaria), 1991 (Sapporo, Japan), 1993 (Zakopane, Poland), and 1995 (Jaca, Spain).

Olson has clearly etched his name in a wide-ranging program of 19 men's and women's sports, 30 activity courses, a multi-optioned professional program, a graduate program in Physical Education, plus fitness and intramural programs.

A 1956 graduate of Concordia (MN), where he was a baseball letterman, he earned his doctorate at the University of Iowa in 1966. Before coming to PLU in 1968, he served as Chairman of Athletics and Physical Education at Wartburg College.

A full professor, he specializes in administration and curriculum development.

He and his wife, Arvis, have four children and seven grandchildren.

Lutes Football Preview

PHD Football.

The acronym stand for "Pride, Hustle and Determination," the building blocks upon which Coach Frosty Westering has built the most successful NAIA Division II football program in the country over the past decade. In fact, from 1985-94, the Lutes compiled an incredible 94-17-4 record, the .835 winning percentage ranking 11th best among four-year college football programs at any level.

It's that same PHD brand of football that has carried the Lutes to this stage — a win today against Puget Sound would give the Lutes the Mt. Hood League's automatic berth in the NAIA Division II national playoffs, a familiar spot for Pacific Lutheran. Should PLU advance to the post-season, it would be their 14th such trip in the past 17 seasons. No matter the outcome, though, the season has been a good one. It's also been one filled with remarkable comebacks, including come-from-behind wins in the fourth quarter against Central Washington and Lewis & Clark, and last Saturday's miraculous three-touchdowns-in-the-final-three-minutes outburst that resulted in a tie with Willamette.

Pacific Lutheran has accomplished what it has despite starting the season with little experience on the defensive side of the football. The Lute defense, under the direction of PLU assistants Paul Hoseth and Craig McCord, reloaded after losing eight starters and five first team all-league performers from the 1994 squad. Several experienced players stepped up right away and helped PLU through the early adjustments. Among them were Ryan Mangan and Josh Arnold, linebackers Jon Roberts and Owen Von Flue, and defensive backs John Hammil and Rob McIlraith. Several others showed their ability right away, including linebacker Travis Hale and defensive tackle Brandon Woods. There were others, but injuries continued to haunt the defense. In particular, defensive back Bryan Alexander

and linebacker Josh Wyrick were lost for part or all of the season with injuries.

Through the first half of the season, the Lutes were allowing more than 400 yards per game. Adjustments in personnel and increased game experience have helped the Lute defense become one of the best in the Columbia Football Association.

The offensive side of the ball looked good from the start, but a key injury in the annual Alumni game forced the Lute coaching staff to make some changes. Sophomore running back Peter Finstuen, who gained 991 all-purpose yards and scored 11 touchdowns in 1994, suffered a season-ending knee injury. Into the void stepped Brian Van Valey, better known at PLU as an All-American javelin thrower. The sophomore has been among the Columbia Football Association's leading rushers throughout the season. Others contributing to the running game include senior Corey Bray and juniors Ryker Labbee and Josh Requa.

Pacific Lutheran's passing attack has featured sophomore quarterback Dak Jordan throwing primarily to senior tight end Gavin Stanley and sophomore wide receiver Karl Lerum. Jordan has thrown for 246 yards per game, including a personal-best 419 yards last Saturday at Willamette. Lerum and Stanley rank in a first-place tie among CFA receivers with 6.8 receptions per game. Stanley, in fact, has etched his name among the top all-time receivers in Columbia Football Association history. He comes into today's game with 180 career receptions (seventh best all-time in the CFA, and eight catches away from No. 4 on the all-time list) for 2,243 yards (12th on the all-time CFA list.) Stanley earned second team All-America honors in 1993.

No matter the outcome of today's contest, count on the Lutes showing their "Pride, Hustle and Determination."

Dr. David Olson to Retire

Come July 1, 1995, David M. Olson will no longer have to make the 35-minute daily drive from his Lake Lawrence home near Yelm to Pacific Lutheran University. Olson will retire as Athletic Director and Dean of the School of Physical Education, effective that date.

Since 1968, Dr. Olson has directed undergraduate degree programs in physical education, and in 1991 implemented the School of Physical Education's graduate program. In addition, he has built the school's intercollegiate program from 12 sports to a combined 19 men's and women's sports.

"I have been most privileged to serve very talented students, to work with dedicated and skilled faculty and staff, and to enjoy the support and encouragement of our administration, all in a place with a most worthy mission," said Dr. Olson. "How could one be so fortunate? I am very grateful for Pacific Lutheran University."

During Olson's tenure, Pacific Lutheran athletic teams have won nine National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics national championships, including three each in football and women's soccer, two in softball and one in women's cross country. At the same time, Pacific Lutheran has garnered 167 conference championships and 25 conference all-sports awards.

"Over the past 28 years, David Olson has built and led one of the most successful small college or university athletic programs in America," said Dr. Loren Anderson, President of Pacific Lutheran University. "Moreover, the program's values are in the right order; scholarship, teamwork, cooperation and the pursuit of excellence come first—winning is a by-product. We'll miss him."

Dr. Olson will also be missed by a host of organizations which he has served with distinction.

He was president of the NAIA from 1985-86, president of the NAIA

Athletic Directors Association from 1991-92, and chairman of the NAIA Council of Athletic Administrators from 1992-94. He was inducted into the NAIA Hall of Fame in 1989.

He has also been a member of the United States Collegiate Sports Council since 1986, of which he served as president in 1988. In addition, Dr. Olson has represented the United States as an administrator at the World University Games in Sofia, Bulgaria (1989), Sapporo, Japan (1991), Zakopane, Poland (1993) and Jaca, Spain (1995). In 1984, he was one of only five U.S. educators invited to the International Olympic Academy in Greece.

He was president of the Washington Alliance for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance (WAHPERD) from 1975-76, and president of the Northwest District, AAHPERD, from 1981-82.

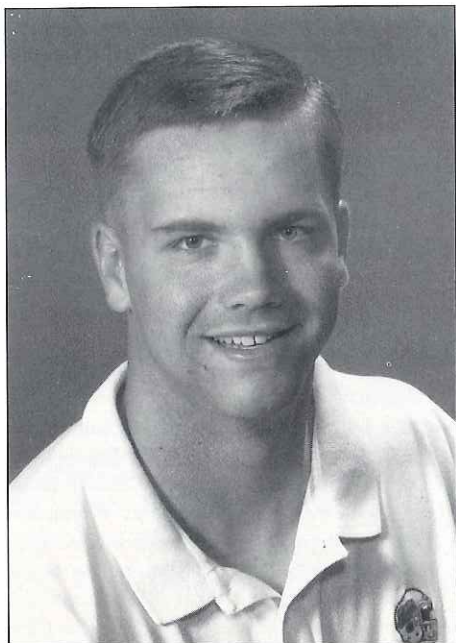
Dr. Olson earned his undergraduate degree from Concordia College in Moorhead, Minn., in 1956, and was honored with the Alumni Achievement Award from that institution in 1987. He earned his master's from the University of Minnesota in 1957, and his Ph.D. from the University of Iowa in 1966. Prior to coming to PLU, he taught, coached and was head of the Department of Physical Education and Athletics at Wartburg College in Waverly, Iowa, from 1960-68.

Arriving at Pacific Lutheran University the same year as Dr. Olson was Paul Hoseth, now the Associate Dean of the School of Physical Education and a PLU assistant football coach. Dr. Hoseth credits his associate with making academics and athletics work in cooperation on the Parkland campus.

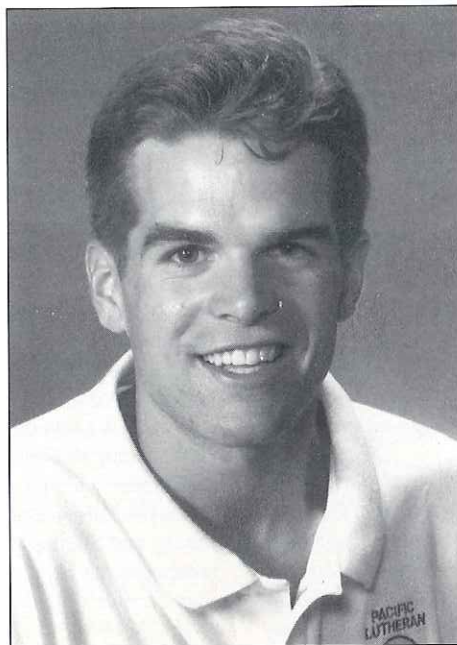
"Dave has been a boss, colleague, mentor, neighbor and friend for the past 28 years," says Dr. Hoseth. Dr. Olson and his wife, Arvis, have four children and seven grandchildren, whom they will enjoy in retirement at Lake Lawrence.

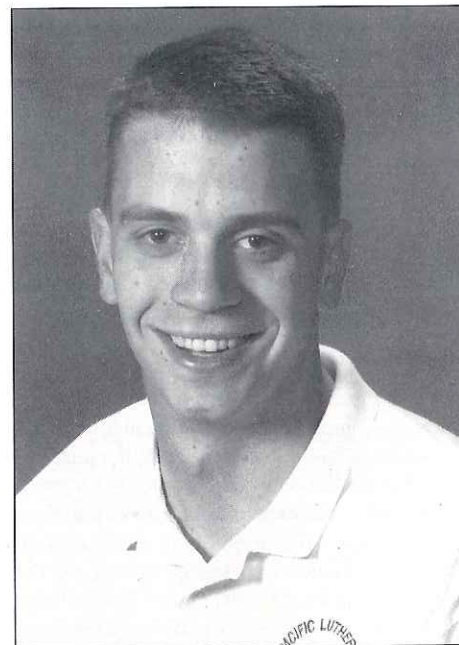

190, Jr., Milton (Fife)

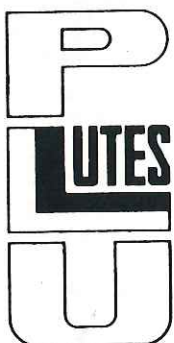


#33 Ryker Labbee — RB, 5-10,

FROM THE LUTE CLUB

Frosty Westering, PLU Head Coach

"Frosty" Westering has been the head football coach and a professor of health and physical education at Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma, Washington, for the past 24 years. He is one of the top college division coaches in the nation. Frosty received the highest honor in the coaching profession with his induction into the NAIA Hall of Fame on January 8, 1995. His PLU Lutes won the NAIA national championship in 1980, 1987 and 1993 and were national finalists in 1983, '85, '87 and 1994.

Since Frosty's arrival at PLU, the Lutes have had 23 consecutive winning seasons and have appeared in the national playoffs 13 times over the past 16 years. They are in the top 10 in winning percentage in college football at any level. Frosty is the winningest active NAIA coach in the nation with 236 career victories, coming into this season. His overall record at PLU entering the season was a staggering 192-47-4. He has been twice named NAIA National Coach of the Year, and nine times Northwest College Division Coach of the Year. The Iowa native has been inducted into his home state's Hall of Fame and he has twice been honored as Tacoma's Man of the Year. He has coached 21 NAIA First Team All-Americans, including his own son, Scott, who is now the offensive coordinator at PLU.

Frosty has guided PLU grid teams on four highly successful international goodwill football tours: to the French Riviera during the summer of 1985; to Australia and New Zealand in 1988; the



highly publicized trip to China in 1989; and most recently to Hamburg, Germany, where the Lutes participated in the UNICEF Charity Bowl.

Winning, success and goodwill, however, are all by-products of his overall lifestyle and coaching philosophy. Frosty's unique DOUBLE WIN coaching style has received national attention this past year in *Sports Illustrated* and from The Associated Press. He challenges his players to reach their God-given potential, competing with their best self rather than their opponent. Winning and losing on the scoreboard are viewed from the perspective that the goal is not the end of the road — the goal is the road. This is reflected in a special kind of excellence, excitement and energy. A full professor with a doctorate in Education, Frosty has written a motivational book titled, *Make The Big Time Where You Are*, which deals with his Double-Win philosophy. He specializes in sports motivation and sports psychology and is an interesting, motivating and entertaining speaker, being in high demand for regional and national meetings and conferences. He has long been a strong supporter of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

Pacific Lutheran Assistant Coaches

PAUL HOSETH, Defensive Coordinator — Hoseth, now in his 28th year at Pacific Lutheran University, is the Associate Dean of the School of Physical Education and a full professor specializing in health education. He has been a PLU assistant football coach since 1969, and has been the defensive coordinator since 1977. Hoseth was an all-conference defensive back at Concordia University of Minnesota, where he played for that school's 1964 national championship team. He graduated from Concordia in 1966, received his master's degree from South Dakota State in 1967 and earned a doctorate at the University of Oregon in 1977. Hoseth came to Pacific Lutheran in 1968 from Bemidji State, Minnesota, where he was a football assistant coach and head gymnastics coach. From 1969-82, he served as Pacific Lutheran's track & field coach. Hoseth and his wife, Jeanne, have a son, Karl, a former Lute quarterback, and a daughter, Mari, a member of the PLU women's basketball team.

SCOTT WESTERING, Offensive Coordinator — Scott Westering coaches with his father, for whom he played for three seasons. He has been part of the Pacific Lutheran staff since 1981 and has been the offensive coordinator since 1984. Westering was a captain and All-America tight end on PLU's 1980 NAIA national championship football team and later had tryouts with the Buffalo Bills and San Francisco 49ers. A 1982 PLU graduate, Westering also serves as fitness coordinator, equipment manager and physical education activity class instructor. Westering's wife, Susan, is an aerobics instructor at PLU. The Westerings have a daughter and son.

CRAIG McCORD, Defensive Assistant — McCord originally came to the Pacific Lutheran program as a player. After graduating in 1987, he served as a graduate assistant for Coach Don James at the University of Washington. McCord then returned to Pacific Lutheran in 1988 and has been at the school since. In addition to his coaching duties, McCord is the program's recruiting coordinator and PLU's Intramural Director. McCord is single and lives in Parkland.

SCOTTY KESSLER, Staff Assistant — Kessler originally served as staff coach for the Lutes in 1981, 1982 and 1984, and rejoined the program in 1992. In the intervening years, Kessler coached at high school, junior college and university levels. In addition, he was a sports agent with America's Best in 1990 and with Master Plan Management in 1991. An All-America defensive back and co-captain for PLU in 1980, Kessler was recipient of the George Fisher Scholar-Athlete Award in 1981. He had a tryout with the Denver Broncos in 1981. Kessler is single and resides in Parkland.
