# LUTES AND WILDCATS BRING TRADITION TO NWC OPENER

**SERIES NOTES:** Pacific Lutheran and Linfield renew one of the great college-division matchups in today's Northwest Conference-opening contest, which also serves as PLU's Homecoming game. The tradition between these two squads dates back to the NAIA when one or the other school made an annual long run through the playoffs. Pacific Lutheran and Linfield have three NAIA national titles apiece to their credit, and both programs have had solid success in the NCAA as well. Pacific Lutheran has advanced to the NCAA postseason four straight years, winning the national championship in 1999. The Linfield Wildcats, who reached the NCAA playoffs most recently in 2000, hold the collegiate football record with 46 consecutive winning seasons. PLU, by the way, is fifth on that same list with 33 straight winning campaigns. Today's game marks the 37th consecutive year that these teams have met on the gridiron, Pacific Lutheran's longest current ongoing yearly series, and it is the 52nd overall meeting between the Lutes and Wildcats in a series that dates back to 1933. While the Wildcats lead the all-time series, 26-21-4, the Lutes have won six of the last eight meetings. The last time these teams met at Sparks Stadium in 2000, however, it was Linfield that rolled past the Lutes, 38-28. Carl Haberberger, now a Linfield assistant coach, was the star of that game with 224 rushing yards and two TDs.

**LAST YEAR'S MATCHUP:** Pacific Lutheran, losers of three straight dating back to the end of the 2000 season, rallied in the second half to beat Linfield, 31-20, in McMinnville. Linfield led 17-7 halfway through the second quarter, and late in the third period held a 20-14 advantage before the Lutes ran off 17 unanswered points in the final period. Quarterback Tyler Teeple hit Jeremy Force with an 18-yard scoring pass that culminated a nine-play, 84-yard drive, giving the Lutes the lead, 21-20, with 13:15 remaining in the game. Following a Tyler Shillito interception, the Lutes did something they hadn't done in 36 straight games dating back to the 1998 season opener against Cal Lutheran. The Lutes attempted, and made, a 23-yard field goal with Dave Weller doing the honors. PLU safety Seth Berghoff sealed the win, returning an interception 96 yards for a touchdown in the closing minutes.

**THE COACHES:** Pacific Lutheran head coach **Frosty Westering**, who is in his 31st season at PLU, is a member of a select fraternity: college football coaches who have won at least 250 games. This group—a Who's Who of collegiate football—includes Eddie Robinson, John Gagliardi, Paul "Bear" Bryant, Charles "Pop" Warner, Amos Alonzo Stagg, Joe Paterno, Bobby Bowden and Tom Osborne. Westering has compiled an incredible 295-90-7 overall record (.761 winning percentage) in 39 seasons as a college coach. In addition to winning the 1999 NCAA Division III championship (which it did by becoming the first team to win five straight road games), Pacific Lutheran won NAIA Division II national titles in 1980, 1987 and 1993 and finished as national runner-up in 1983, 1985, 1991 and 1994. Westering's overall record at Pacific Lutheran is a staggering 251-64-5 (.792 winning percentage). Excellence on the football field, however, is only a by-product of Westering's overall life philosophy. He emphasizes a double-win theme: the satisfaction of playing to one's personal potential and achieving victory on the scoreboard. **Jay Locey** is 42-15 and in his seventh season as Linfield head coach. Previous to his head coaching appointment, Locey was the Wildcats' defensive coordinator for 13 years.

**LUTES LAST TIME OUT:** Pacific Lutheran improved its 2002 record to 1-1 with a 35-10 non-conference win over Chapman on September 14 in Orange, Calif. Pacific Lutheran totaled 352 yards of total offense and put the game out of reach with 21 points in the second quarter. The Lutes opened the scoring in the first quarter on a 3-yard scoring pass from Tyler Teeple to Kyle Brown, and Aaron Binger added a 7-yard run to give the Lutes a 14-0 lead at the 12:56 mark of the second quarter. After a 37-yard field goal for Chapman, the Lutes scored twice more before the half on a 45-yard fumble return by Casey Carlson and a 10-yard scoring aerial from Teeple to Brown. In the second half, the Lutes threw only five passes, choosing instead to grind the clock down via the running game. Ryan Simpson came off the bench to gain 58 rushing yards, leading a PLU ground game that netted 233 yards. Carlson had 2 1/2 of the Lutes' six quarterback sacks and the PLU defense limited Chapman to 182 net yards.

**LINFIELD LAST TIME OUT:** Linfield improved to 2-0, rallying four time to garner a dramatic 42-35 double overtime victory over visiting Southern Oregon on September 14. Marty Williams and David Russell combined for 168 rushing yards and four touchdowns. Russell's 3-yard run in the second overtime gave Linfield its first lead of the game, and the Linfield defense made the score stand up. Quarterback Tyler Matthews threw for 236 yards and two touchdowns, completing 18 of 37 passes without an interception. George Carter caught seven passes for 109 yards and one touchdown.

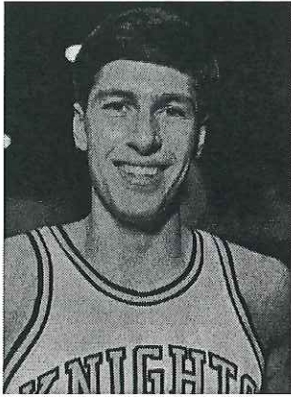

# BASKETBALL TEAMMATES HIGHLIGHT 2002 HALL CLASS

Allan Kollar and Lee Sinnes, basketball teammates in the mid 1960s, highlighted a list of six individuals inducted into the Pacific Lutheran University Athletic Hall of Fame at a Friday afternoon luncheon in the University Center. Joining the basketball duo in the 13th Hall of Fame Class are football player Greg Rohr, swimmer Karen Hanson Scott, women's basketball player Kelly Larson and softball player Holly Alonzo.



**ALLAN KOLLAR**  
**(Men's Basketball, 1966-70)**

Allan Kollar averaged double figures in scoring in four seasons of men's basketball at Pacific Lutheran, with a single-season best of 15.9 points per game as a sophomore. He finished his career with 1,285 points in 99 games, an average of 12.9 points per game. At the conclusion of his career, he ranked eighth on the career scoring list. He still holds the school single-game records for consecutive free throws made (15) and for free throws in a game (16), both coming against Western Washington on Dec. 2, 1966. Not only was Kollar an outstanding scorer, he led the Lutes in rebounding each of his final three seasons, averaging at least 11 rebounds per game in two separate seasons. Kollar twice earned All-Northwest Conference first team honors during his Pacific Lutheran career. As a senior, he received NAIA honorable mention All-America and Lutheran College All-America recognition.



**LEROY SINNES**  
**(Men's Basketball, 1966-70)**

Lee Sinnes led the Pacific Lutheran men's basketball team in scoring as a sophomore, junior and senior, averaging more than 16 points per game twice in his career. His best year came as a senior when he tallied 464 points in 28 games, an average of 16.5 points per contest. Sinnes finished his four years with a total of 1,307 points, an average of 12.8 points per game. He was the seventh player in the storied history of the Pacific Lutheran men's basketball program to exceed 1,000 points for his career. Sinnes earned All-Northwest Conference honors in 1968 as a sophomore and again in 1970 as a senior, matching his two highest scoring seasons. Following the 1970 season, he was named to the Lutheran College All-America Basketball Team as an honorable mention selection.



**HOLLY ALONZO**  
**(Softball, 1986-1989)**

Holly Alonzo, then just a sophomore, compiled an outstanding 0.47 earned run average in helping lead Pacific Lutheran to the 1988 NAIA national softball championship, the first of two won by the school. She earned all-conference and all-district honors that season as the Lutes compiled an impressive 39-6 won-loss record. The following season, Alonzo earned second team All-America honors. Though not a prototype power pitcher, Alonzo finished that year with 163 strikeouts, then a Pacific Lutheran school record. She concluded her career by helping the Lutes finish second at the NAIA national tournament.

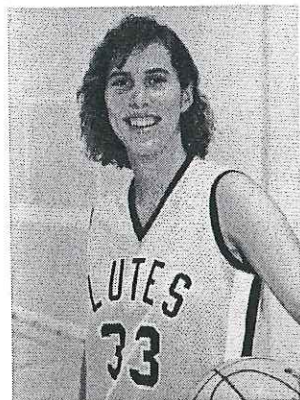

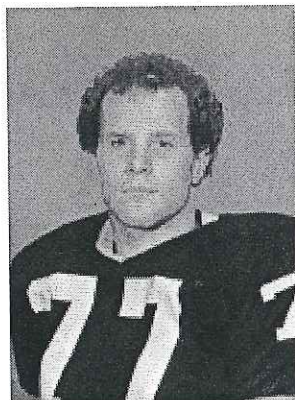
**KAREN HANSON SCOTT**  
**(Women's Swimming, 1988-92)**

Karen Hanson Scott earned All-America honors an astounding 31 times in her Pacific Lutheran swimming career, capping her four years with a national championship in the 500-yard freestyle at the 1992 NAIA meet. She showed her versatility that same senior season by placing 2<sup>nd</sup> at nationals in the 200 backstroke and third in the 200 freestyle. In all, she earned All-America honors 11 times by placing in the top six in individual events at nationals. The 500 freestyle was her specialty as she placed third twice and sixth once in addition to her national title. Hanson Scott still holds five Pacific Lutheran individual swimming records including the 100 freestyle (53.31), 200 freestyle (1:53.74), 500 freestyle (5:01.81), 1650 freestyle (17:35.80) and the 200 backstroke (2:06.01). In addition, she swam on 200 medley and 400 freestyle relay teams that still hold Pacific Lutheran school records.



**KELLY LARSON**  
**(Women's Basketball, 1985-89)**

Kelly Larson is arguably the finest all-around player in Pacific Lutheran women's basketball history. At 5 feet, 10 inches, Larson could score, rebound and handle the ball with precision. Larson's name is repeated throughout the Pacific Lutheran women's basketball record book. She finished her career with 1,545 points, at the time ranking No. 1 in that category. More than a dozen years after completing her eligibility, Larson continues to rank No. 1 in career assists with 440 and first in career free throw percentage at .791 (321-of-406). She also ranks fourth with 190 career steals and ninth with 502 career rebounds. Three times in her career she had 11 assists in a game, ranking her first in that category. Larson earned first team all-conference honors twice and was a second team pick two more times. She never averaged less than 13.5 points per game and had a single-season best of 16.7 points per contest as a junior.



**GREG ROHR**  
**(Football, 1978-81)**

Greg Rohr is among the most dominating defensive linemen ever to wear a Pacific Lutheran football uniform. He earned first team all-conference, all-district and Little All-Northwest honors as a junior when he helped lead the Lutes to the 1980 NAIA football title, the school's first-ever national championship. That year, Rohr finished the season with 56 solo tackles, 10 quarterback sacks and two fumble recoveries. The following year he added first team All-American to his list of accolades. He finished his senior year with 76 tackles, six sacks, three fumble recoveries and "anchored a defense which gave up only eight points a game." That team was undefeated and ranked No. 1 in the nation before losing in the national playoffs. For his career, Rohr compiled 190 total tackles, 17 quarterback sacks and six fumble recoveries.

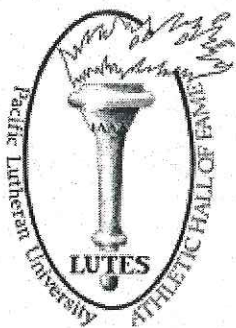

# NORTHWEST CONFERENCE COACHES PICK LINFIELD NO. 1

Pacific Lutheran, Puget Sound, Willamette, Whitworth, Lewis & Clark and Linfield are the football-playing schools in the Northwest Conference. The NWC will be in its eighth year of existence following the disbanding of the 12-member Columbia Football Association, that following the 1994 season.

Northwest Conference schools are affiliated with NCAA Division III. The national playoff structure includes 28 teams in a single-elimination format. Automatic berths are given to the champion of conferences with at least seven football-playing institutions. A second "pool" of playoff participants come from champions of smaller conferences and independents, with the remaining berths given to teams that do not win their conference titles but which have outstanding records. A national selection committee will finalize the NCAA Division III playoff field.
