## TODAY'S GAME

The U.S. Men's National Team will be the home team and wear its blue jersey for the first time here in Riga, Latvia, when it takes on Kazakhstan today at the 2021 IIHF Men's World Championship.

## THE SERIES VS. KAZAKHSTAN

Today's game is just the fourth-ever meeting between the U.S. and Kazakhstan in IIHF Men's World Championship play. The U.S. has won all three previous meetings and hold a goal for-goals against advantage of 17-5, two of those wins have required overtime. Coincidentally, both of the last two U.S. meetings against Kazakhstan has featured U.S. captain **Justin Abdelkader**, who was part of the U.S. rosters in 2012 and 2014.

## TEAM USA INJURY UPDATES

In Team USA's 5-1 win over Canada, both goaltender **Anthony Stolarz** (first period, lower body) and forward **Tage Thompson** (third period, upper body) left the game due to injury. Yesterday, it was announced Stolarz will miss the rest of the tournament while Thompson is considered day-to-day.

## GOALTENDER DREW COMMESSO TO JOIN TEAM USA

Due to Stolarz returning to the U.S. for further evaluation, the U.S. has added **Drew Comness**, who skated this past season with Boston University (6-3-1 (W-L-T, 2.99 GAA, .915 SV%) and was selected in the second round (46th ovr.) by the Chicago Blackhawks in the 2020 NHL Draft. He skated two seasons with USA Hockey's National Team Development Program and was originally named to the preliminary roster for the 2021 U.S. National Junior Team before becoming unavailable to participate due to COVID-19 protocol. He is en route to Latvia.

## INSTANT IMPRESSION FOR IIHF DEBUTS

So far, eight of a possible 10 players have made their IIHF world championship debut here in Latvia, including **Colin Blackwell**, **Brian Boyle**, **Conor Garland**, **Trevor Moore**, **Eric Robinson**, **Kevin Rooney**, **Matt Roy**, and **Matt Tennyson**. In addition, **Connor Mackey** and **Ryan Shea** will also be making IIHF debuts when they draw into the lineup. Of those players, two are serving as alternate captains (Blackwell, Roy) while three have already hit the scoresheet -- all of which came in Team USA's win against Canada. Moore scored twice, Garland added two assists and Tennyson netted Team USA's fifth and final goal.

## THINGS WORTH MENTIONING

Due to COVID protocols, Team USA has gone back to traditional ways of team bonding with a card table, a ping pong table and an Xbox area at the hotel ... **Connor Mackey** has been cleared from the tournament-mandated quarantine and will be available for Team USA to play beginning Thursday, May 27 ... **Kevin Rooney** celebrated his 28th birthday on May 21 here in Riga ... Team USA's journey to Riga, Latvia started on May 15 when players and staff convened in Newark, N.J. The following day, the team boarded a charter along with Team Canada and other tournament participants such as fellow players and officials. Upon arrival, the team entered a mandatory quarantine before being released ... In 2006, the only other time the tournament was held in Riga, Latvia, the U.S. went 4-3-0-0 to finish in seventh place. **Paul Holmgren** served as general manager, **Mike Eaves** was head coach and **Keith Allain** and **Jay Leach** were assistant coaches. **Richard Park** was captain and joined by alternate captains **Hal Gill** and **Ryan Malone**. **Dustin Brown** finished as Team USA's top goal scorer (5) and point producer (7) while **Craig Anderson** finished with a 3-2-0 record, 2.36 goals-against-average and .908 save percentage as Team USA's starting goaltender.

### TEAM USA IN RECENT BACK-TO-BACKS AT MEN'S WORLDS

With Team USA's 5-1 win over Canada on May 23, the U.S. is now 8-1-0-1 (W-OTW-OTL-L) on the second night of back-to-backs and 13-2-0-4 (W-OTW-OTL-L) overall in back-to-back situations since the 2016 IIHF Men's World Championship. ### JASON ROBERTSON AND FINLAND BREAKAWAY GOALS

U.S. forward **Jason Robertson** has skated in eight international games between the 2019 IIHF World Junior Championship (silver) and yesterday's opening game here in Latvia. In those eight outings, the Dallas Stars forward has tallied two goals -- coincidentally both against Finland. As Robertson recalled during last night's postgame availability, his first goal in 2019 (4-1, USA win) came with a five-hole tally off a breakaway, not too differently from last night's goal.

### TEAM USA'S NHL, COLLEGE AND YOUTH CONNECTIONS

International tournaments often see teams preach the need to come together under short circumstances. With no exhibition games and a mandatory quarantine period, time was against Team USA more than ever. ### FROM YOUTH TEAMMATES TO INTERNATIONAL TEAMMATES

A pair of U.S. players on this year's roster are once again teammates after doing so as youth hockey players.

From Scituate, Massachusetts, U.S. forwards **Conor Garland** and **Ryan Donato** once skated together before now doing so here again in Riga. Garland, who was invited to the 2015 USA Hockey National Junior Evaluation Camp for consideration for the 2016 U.S. National Junior Team, is skating for Team USA for the first time. Donato returns to a U.S. roster after skating in the 2018 Olympic Winter Games and helping Team USA earn a bronze medal at the 2016 IIHF World Junior Championship.

In addition, **Jason Robertson** and **Sasha Chmelevski** were teammates together on youth hockey teams in both California and Michigan. Perhaps just as impressive as their development taking them from youth hockey teammates to teammates on the U.S. National Junior Team is that one of their fellow youth hockey teammates is none other than **Cayla Barnes** (Eastvale, Calif./Boston College), who helped the 2018 U.S. Olympic Women's Ice Hockey Team capture its first gold medal in women's ice hockey in 20 years. The following year, she was named to the Media All-Star Team and tabbed one of Team USA's Top Three Players in their gold medal-winning effort at the 2019 IIHF Women's World Championship. Barnes also helped the U.S. win three IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship gold medals from 2015-17. At the 2016 and 2017 event, she earned the Directorate Award as Best Defenseman.

### OTTAWA CONNECTION FOR WIDEMAN & CHMELEVSKI

With his season having already ended, defenseman **Chris Wideman** joined the U.S. with a short supply of spare sticks. As luck would have it, a few years ago, when Wideman was with the Ottawa Senators, fellow U.S. teammate **Sasha Chmelevski** was playing for the Ottawa 67's in the OHL.

At the time, Chmelevski was considering changing his stick blade when he came across a spare Wideman stick. Despite some hesitations and frustrations in initial attempts to use the stick, he went ahead and played a game with the stick and scored a hat-trick. Naturally, he's used that stick blade ever since, which means here in Riga, Latvia, Chmelevski has been more than happy to serve as a back-up option for Wideman should he find himself in need of extra sticks.

### TEAM USA OVER THE LAST FIVE WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

Over the last five world championships, the U.S. has registered a 27-5-1-13 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record while earning four top-five finishes (2019-7th, **2018-bronze**, 2017-fifth, 2016-4th, **2015-bronze**). Team USA's eight wins in 2018 tied for the best-ever by a U.S. team in a single world championship while the team's 12-2-0-2 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record between the 2017 and 2018 events was its best-ever stretch in tournament history.

Individually, the last two IIHF Men's World Championships saw **Patrick Kane** rewrite the U.S. record books. In 2018, Kane put forth arguably the greatest individual U.S. performance as he established U.S. single tournament records in both points (20) and assists (12) en route to becoming the first-ever American ice hockey player to earn tournament MVP honors and just the fourth-ever to receive Media All-Star Team recognition. In 2019, Kane then established a new U.S. record for most career points (42) and assists (29) in tournament play.

### CAPUANO TABBED HEAD COACH HERE IN RIGA

**Jack Capuano**, associate coach for the NHL's Ottawa Senators, is serving as head coach of the U.S. Men's National Team. He is joined by assistant coaches **Nate Leaman** (Providence College) and **Adam Nightingale** (USA Hockey's NTDP). In addition, **Kevin Reiter** (USA Hockey's NTDP) will serve as goaltending coach and **Mike King** (Ottawa Senators) as video coach.

This is the fourth time Capuano will be behind a U.S. bench after serving as an assistant coach for Team USA at the 2017 IIHF Men's World Championship and at the 2016 World Cup of Hockey. He was the head coach of the 2005 U.S. Under-18 Select Team at the Five Nations Cup in Slovakia.

### U.S. ROSTER

Team USA has a 27-player roster, which includes 14 forwards, nine defenseman and four goaltenders (one who was forced to leave due to injury). The roster features one Olympian in **Ryan Donato**, who played for Team USA in the 2018 Olympic Winter Games, while **Justin Abdelkader** and **Jake Oettinger** both enter the tournament representing the U.S. for a team-leading fifth time. **Christin Wolanin** is the lone returner from the 2019 U.S. Men's National Team.

As a group, players on this year's team have accounted for 18 total medals in world championship play, including seven gold medals. The U.S. roster features nine first or second-round NHL draft picks with the addition of Comnesso.

### ABDELKADER TO CAPTAIN TEAM USA

In a team meeting on May 21, head coach **Jack Capuano** announced that **Justin Abdelkader** (Muskegon, Mich.) will captain Team USA while **Matt Roy** and **Colin Blackwell** (North Andover, Mass.) will serve as alternate captains.

It marks the second time Abdelkader is serving as captain for Team USA in this event after doing so in 2014 in Minsk, Belarus. This is also the fifth time he will represent the U.S. internationally after doing so in two IIHF Men's World Championships (2012, 2014), one IIHF World Junior Championship (2007-bronze) and the 2016 World Cup of Hockey. In 20 international appearances, he has collected 11 points (5g, 6a).

An 11-year NHL veteran with the Detroit Red Wings, Abdelkader was with Detroit when they captured the 2008 Stanley Cup and amassed 252 points (106g, 146a) in 739 NHL games. He spent this past season with EV Zug (Swiss) where he registered eight points (4g, 4a) in nine games before tallying nine points (6g, 3a) in 13 playoff games to help EV Zug capture the 2021 NL Title.

### ROY, BLACKWELL TABBED ALTERNATE CAPTAINS IN USA DEBUTS

The 2021 IIHF Men's World Championship not only marks the first time Roy and Blackwell are skating for the U.S. in any international competition, it is also the first time they are wearing captain letters since their youth/high school careers. Both players coincidentally were taken with the 194th pick in the seventh round of an NHL Draft (Blackwell - SJS, 2011; Roy - LAK, 2015) and made their NHL debuts in the 2018-19 season.

Roy, a Detroit native, played youth hockey with Victory Honda (MI) before joining the Indiana Ice in the USHL for two seasons. Following that, he skated three years at Michigan Tech before signing with the Kings. On March 21, 2021, the Kings signed Roy to a three-year contract extension with an average annual value (AAV) of \$3.15 million.

Hailing from North Andover, Mass., Blackwell played high school hockey with St. John's Prep before spending five years with Harvard University. The 2020-21 season marked his first with the New York Rangers after splitting the last four seasons with the San Jose Sharks, Buffalo Sabres and Nashville Predators.

### AVERAGE AGE

The 2021 U.S. Men's National Team has an average age of 26, making it the oldest U.S. entry in an IIHF Men's World Championship since 2004 and 2005, when Team USA's average age was 27.6 and 28.1, respectively. Below is a look at the average age of Team USA since 2004.

### MATTY BENIERS

At 18years, 6months, of age, **Matty Beniers** is the fourth-youngest player to dress for the United States in an IIHF Men's World Championship. A consensus Top-10 selection in this summer's NHL Draft, Beniers was part of the gold medal-winning U.S. National Junior Team this past January and skated the 2020-21 season as a freshman for the University of Michigan (Big Ten).

### U.S. MEN'S NATIONAL TEAM ADVISORY GROUP

Assisting Drury with the selection of the players and staff for Team USA is the U.S. Men's National Team Advisory Group, led by **John Vanbiesbrouck**, assistant executive director of USA Hockey for hockey operations. The group includes NHL general managers **Kevyn Adams** (Buffalo Sabres), **Stan Bowman** (Chicago Blackhawks), **Tom Fitzgerald** (New Jersey Devils), **Bill Guerin** (Minnesota Wild), **Lou Lamoriello** (New York Islanders), **David Poile** (Nashville Predators), **Don Waddell** (Carolina Hurricanes) and **Bill Zito** (Florida Panthers).

### STAN WONG WORKING 46TH INTERNATIONAL EVENT

**Stan Wong**, one of Team USA's two athletic trainers and a beloved figure of players and staff alike, is working his 46th international event for a U.S. hockey team. This year marks his 13th straight men's world championship. He has also served as a trainer for four Olympic teams, 17 national junior squads, 10 Deutschland Cup teams and for Team USA at one Youth Olympic Games and one Winter World University Games. Wong was inducted into the Professional Hockey Athletic Trainers Hall of Fame in June 2015.

### BRYSON HITS 1,500 NHL GAMES WITH THE LA KINGS

**Dana Bryson** (Medford, Mass.), longtime equipment manager for the LA Kings, is making his debut on a U.S. Men's National Team staff here in Riga, Latvia. He previously served on the U.S. staff at the 2015 Ivan Hlinka Memorial Tournament and also spent time with the U.S. National Inline Team. A member of the LA Kings' 2012 and 2014 Stanley Cup championship teams, Bryson earlier this season worked his 1,500th NHL game in a 4-2 win over the Arizona Coyotes. Coincidentally, the very first NHL game he worked also came against the Coyotes in 2005-06, where Wayne Gretzky served as coach of the then 'Phoenix' Coyotes.

### TEAM HOST GEORGIJS PUJACS

Team USA's host here in Latvia, **Georgijs Pujacs**, is a three-time Olympian who skated for the Latvian National Ice Hockey Team in the 2006, 2010 and 2014 Olympic Winter Games. He also skated in three IIHF Men's World Championships, serving as an alternate captain in 2012 and 2013. His playing career included stops with HC Orebro (Sweden), Dinamo Riga (KHL), Lada Togliatti (KHL), Sibir Novosibirsk (KHL), Avangard Omsk (KHL) and, in the 2004-05 season, a stint with the Elmira Jackets of the UHL in Elmira, New York. At the 1999 NHL Entry Draft, he was drafted in the ninth round, 264th overall, by the Boston Bruins.
