

In Memoriam

The following individuals were in the Bogus Basin Ski Club when I joined in 1966. The club was strongly involved in the Mitey Mites program that began in 1954. The club existed for that program and continued its support for the program as it matured and the racers grew older, raising money for the program, providing judges, timers, gate keepers, race patrol, etc. The BBSC members also strongly supported the local ski patrol with money, volunteer patrollers, supported the mountain when it hosted the first National Junior Ski Championships in March 1948 with permission from the U.S. Ski Association. That was possible because BBSC belonged to the Pacific Northwest Ski Association (PNSI), a division of the U.S. Ski Association and had people on the Board then and continued to have club members on its Board of Directors throughout the late 1970 and 80s. The following individuals were involved with the above.

Kenneth C. Whitney, age 77, passed away June 27, 2012 in Boise of natural causes. Ken was involved with the Bogus Basin Racing Association and served on the Board of Directors for the PNSI for many years.

Walter "Jack" Long, age 83, was on the original Board of Directors for the Bogus Basin Ski Racing Alliance when it was formed in the spring of 1967 and the organization took over the control of the annual ski swap. Jack served on the Nation Ski Patrol for 23 years and was the patrol leader from 1974-1976, as well as the Pacific Northwest Alumni Director. He was involved with the Bogus Basin Association Membership group since 1963 to the time of his death. He served on its Board from 1971-1977. I knew Jack personally through our membership/work with the Gem State Kiwanis Club and our membership with the Gowen Field Officers Club. Jack sponsored my admission to the National Ski Patrol at Bogus which resulted in my completing 15 years with that organization with a

senior rating. Jack skied with the Primetimers. The old timers in our club will remember Jack's wife, Virginia, "Ginney" Chapin, who died in a tragic gun related accident at her home in January 1977. Jack, like many club members in the 1940's-1960's joined the Idaho National Guard in 1949, getting his commission after he graduated from the University of Idaho in the spring of 1952, started his full time active service in May of 1960 and retired as the Idaho State Inspector General in 1988 with the rank of Colonel.

William "Bill " Rutledge, age 89, passed away at home in Boise. I knew Bill through the club, the racing program with his four sons, serving on the ski patrol and as an Insurance adjuster who handle many of his agency insurance claims. Bill was a Marine pilot during WW II and I enjoyed his funny stories related with that time.

Bob Skinner, age 86, passed away at a local care center Thursday, September 20. He was married to Bessie Skinner who was featured in our September 2012 issue-Make a Difference article, page 7. I first met Bob and Bessie when I joined the Gem State Kiwanis Club in the late 60s. Bob was president of the that club in the late 70s. For many years we participated in the annual Fourth of July pancake breakfast event at the Julia Davis band shell. It is still an annual event. Our surviving club records show that on December 4, 1990, Bob was nominated to the Board of Directors to temporarily fill out the trip coordinator position for the remainder of that term. Again and again Bob would fill in any vacancy on the board until the next annual general membership meeting. Bob worked for True Blue in the accounting department under president Dan Duncan, who also was a BBSC member. On March 3, 1992, Bob presented to the BBSC Board of Directors its first financial plan; to prepare a yearly budget and whether or not to subsidize club events. Bob set up the computer program for the club and assisted the club treasurer for several years. In 1994, Bob chaired the Masters Salome Race held March 5-6. Bob and Bessie completed their final years on the club Board in 1998.

Time for New Equipment?

Well I did it. I just purchased new boots for my skis. Wow, they feel good right out of the box. No pains, no pinches. My custom footbeds and heaters transfer right over. They are snug with a medium/firm forward flex. What's this? There is a custom feature that lets me unlock the cuff so that I can walk normally when I am walking up or down stairs at the lodge. You no longer have to unlock your buckles to walk like a human! My old boots had 200 plus ski days on them. The buckles were on their last legs. The old boots were "packed out." so that I had to over tighten the buckles. Packed out boots are cold boots. The front and back lugs had lots of gouges and the bottom of the boot was pretty roughed up from too many parking lot trips. My boots are an important part of my safety equipment. My feet will be in heaven this ski season.

Maybe you're in the market for new equipment this year. All of the local shops have a great selection of equipment. When you go the ski shop take your time, have the sales person explain

the attributes and downside of everything you're looking at. Be honest about how aggressive or timid you are on the hill. How many days you ski, how many hours on the snow, big turns, tight turns, fast skier, slow skier, groomed skier, or off the groomed skier. There are lots of intimidating terms associated the new equipment. Ask the sales person, "How will that help me ski better?" Rocker, turn radius, flex, let alone, what does recreational, intermediate, or advanced mean? Lots of us used to be advanced, but are we now? The good news is that all the ski equipment available today, if appropriate for your skier type and properly fitted, will make your ski day much more pleasant. My own experience is that today I ski with about one-third of the effort that I had to expend just ten years ago. Yes, every thing today is safer, lighter, shorter and much better than the good old days...

Why Do You Ski?

Here at Greenwood's Ski Haus we conducted a very unscientific survey and asked a few of our resident ski bums the question "Why do you ski?" Although the answers varied, there is definitely a common thread woven through the answers. That thread is the absolute passion--passion for the season, nature, camaraderie, serenity and the sport itself.

On the more scientific and statistically accurate side, a recent SIA (Ski Industries of America) survey asked consumers the question "What benefits to skiing and/or riding do you find most appealing?" The survey responses paralleled our findings but here are the actual statistics. 72% of respondents picked Being with Family and Friends as one of the top three "benefits" of skiing or snowboarding. 63% of respondents selected Being Outdoors and 56.1% selected Exercise and Athleticism among the top three "benefits" of skiing or snowboarding.

"Sliding on snow gives me a sense of freedom I have never found anywhere else."




