2024 IIHF WOMEN'S WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP

The U.S. Women's National Team is one of 10 teams competing at the 2024 International Ice Hockey Federation Women's World Championship from April 3-14 in Utica, N.Y.

The event returns to U.S. soil for the first time since 2017, when USA Hockey Arena in Plymouth, Mich. hosted. It marked and will be the fifth time the championship has been staged in the U.S. overall. Team USA enters the tournament as defending gold medalists.

The tournament features ten teams divided into two groups of five. Team USA is competing in Group A alongside, Canada, Czechia, Switzerland and Finland. Group B includes Japan, Sweden, Germany, Denmark and China. Each group will play a single round-robin series before the playoff round.

WOMEN'S WORLDS SUCCESS

The U.S. has earned gold or silver in every IIHF Women's World Championship since the inception of the event in 1990. The U.S. has made the title game in all 22 tournaments staged.

LAST TIME OUT

Alex Carpenter recorded a hat trick, Laila Edwards scored twice and Nicole Hensley stopped all 19 shots she faced to help the U.S. Women's National Team to a 6-0 victory over Czechia in its second preliminary round game at the 2024 IIHF Women's World Championship. Up just 1-0 after one, the U.S. used a two-goal second and three-goal third to pull away from Czechia. Caroline Harvey recorded a three-assist night for the U.S. on the blue line.

QUICK SHOTS

TONIGHT'S MATCH UP

Tonight's game marks Team USA's third preliminary round game at the 2024 IIHF Women's World Championship. The game is the second of back-to-back games for the U.S. Team USA sits atop group A with a 2-0-0-0 (W-OTW-OTL-L) after shutting out both Switzerland and Czechia to start the tournament.

AGAINST FINLAND

Tonight's game is the 23rd all-time meeting between the United States and Finland at the Women's World Championship. The U.S. holds a 19-1-1-0-1 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T) against the Fins, and have won the last 12-straight game against Finland.

LAST TIME AGAINST FINLAND

The U.S. and Czechia last met in the second preliminary round game at the 2022 Women's World Championship in Denmark, with the U.S. topping Finland, 6-1. Amanda Kessel recorded two goals and two assists in the victory.

COYNE AND KNIGHT APPROACH ALL-TIME WWC ASSIST RECORD

With two assists in Friday's game, Kendall Coyne Schofield now sits at third on the all-time Women's Worlds assist list with 44. She needs five to tie and six to break the record. Hilary Knight sits at fifth all-time with 42 assists.

FOR CARPENTER

With a goal in each period against Czechia, Alex Carpenter tallied her first hat trick at the Women's World Championship. It marked the U.S.' 32nd all-time hat trick in Women's Worlds competition.

BACK-TO-BACK SHUTOUTS

For the first time since 2021, Team USA has held its opponents scoreless through the first two games of the tournament. The U.S. has yielded no goals on 30 total shots.

EDWARDS TALLIES FIRST WNT GOAL

Forward Laila Edwards' second period goal against Czechia marked the forward's first goal as a member of the U.S. Women's National Team. Edwards tallied her second goal, a shorthanded score, later in the third period.

DOMINATING FACEOFFS

Through two games, Team USA has won 75 percent of its faceoffs, winning 88 percent against Switzerland and 60 percent against Czechia.

TEAM USA AT A GLANCE

ROSTER BREAKDOWN

The 2024 U.S. Women's National Team features 25 players, 15 forwards, seven defenders and three goaltenders, and features 18 returners from the gold medal-winning team that competed at the 2023 IIHF Women's World Championship. Joy Dunne, Laila Edwards, Sydney Morrow, Kirsten Simms and Gwyneth Philips will make their U.S. Women's National Team debut.

AYE AYE CAPTAINS

Hilary Knight (Sun Valley, Idaho) is the captain of Team USA for the 2024 IIHF Women's World Championship. Alex Carpenter (North Reading, Mass.) and Megan Keller (Farmington Hills, Mich.) are serving as alternate captains.

BEHIND THE BENCH

John Wroblewski is the head coach of the 2024 U.S. Women's National Team. Shari Dickerman, Brent Hill and Josh Sciba are serving as assistant coaches, while Alli Altmann is the team's goaltending coach.

LAST WWC MEETING: AUGUST 27, 2022 • USA 6, FIN 1: Amanda Kessel recorded four points (two goals, two assists) as Team USA topped Finland, 6-1, in the second preliminary game of the 2022 Women's World Championship. Defender **Jincy Dunne** recorded her first goal as a member of the U.S. Women's National Team during the win. The U.S. outshot Finland 72-16, with **Maddie Rooney** making 15 saves.

WWC Series vs. Canada: 13-4-7-10 (W-OTW-OTL-L)

LAST WWC MEETING: APRIL 16, 2023 • USA 6, CAN 3: Behind a hat trick from **Hilary Knight**, Team USA topped Canada, 6-3, in the gold medal game of the 2023 IIHF Women's World Championship. Trailing 3-2 heading into the third period, and early goal from **Caroline Harvey** tied the game, before Knight converted on two goals within minutes of each other to give the U.S. a lead and its first world title since 2019.

WOMEN'S WORLDS IN THE U.S.

WELCOMING THE WORLD TO UTICA!

The ten best women's hockey teams from around the world have arrive in Utica for the 2024 IIHF Women's World Championship. It marks the fifth time overall and the first time since 2017 that the U.S. has hosted the top tournament. The state of New York last hosted the Women's World Championship back in 1994 in Lake Placid.

The greater Utica area also created hype with local children, distributing 13,000 activity books with games and information about all ten teams competing to 55 schools in the Oneida, Herkimer and Madison Counties. Additionally, 7,000 of those Utica-area elementary school students attending games throughout the tournament.

THE ADIRONDACK BANK CENTER

The tournament will take place at the Adirondack Bank Center, located in downtown Utica. The venue, known as the 'Aud,' was originally built in 1960 and seats around 4,000 fans. Known for its iconic ceiling design, its innovative cable suspended roof design resembles that of Madison Square Garden.

SUBARU CHAMPIONSHIP VILLAGE

Fans will have the opportunity to experience the Subaru World Championship Village. Free and open to everyone, the World Championship Village will be the hub of activity throughout the 12-day women's ice hockey tournament and festival. The space will be open from 3 p.m.-11 p.m. ET daily, with live music filling the indoor venue beginning at 4 p.m. each day of the tournament.

DEFENDING THEIR ICE

THE STORY OF THE U.S. WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM

Produced by USA Hockey and RightHand, *Defending Their Ice: The Story Of The U.S. Women's National Team*, gives viewers an inside look at how the top women's hockey players in the world prepare to defend their world championship title on home soil.

The breakout six-part series on NHL Network dives into different aspects of what it takes to succeed both on and off the ice at the national team level, and offers a behind-the-curtain look at Team USA throughout the entirety of the 2023-24 season, starting from puck drop on game one of the Rivalry Series all the way to the final whistle of the Women's World Championship in April.

TEAM TIDBITS

2023 WOMEN'S WORLDS RETURNEES

The 2024 U.S. Women's National Team returns 18 players from the 2023 edition of the team that won gold in Brampton last April, including **Cayla Barnes**, **Hannah Bilka**, **Alex Carpenter**, **Britta Curl**, **Lacey Eden**, **Aerin Frankel**, **Rory Guilday**, **Savannah Harmon**, **Caroline Harvey**, **Taylor Heise**, **Nicole Hensley**, **Tessa Janecke**, **Megan Keller**, **Hilary Knight**, **Abbey Murphy**, **Kelly Pannek**, **Hayley Scamurra** and **Haley Winn**.

2022 U.S. OLYMPIC TEAM RETURNEES

In total, 12 players on this year's team were members of the 2022 U.S. Olympic Team that took home silver in Beijing in February 2022. Olympians include, **Cayla Barnes**, **Alex Carpenter**, **Kendall Coyne Schofield**, **Savannah Harmon**, **Caroline Harvey**, **Nicole Hensley**, **Megan Keller**, **Hilary Knight**, **Abbey Murphy**, **Kelly Pannek**, **Hayley Scamurra** and **Grace Zumwinkle**.

WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM NEWCOMERS

Joy Dunne, **Laila Edwards**, **Sydney Morrow**, **Kirsten Simms** and **Gwyneth Philips** were named to the U.S. Women's National Team for the first time in IIHF competition and will be making their debuts in Utica. Edwards and Simms played for Team USA in the 2023-24 Rivalry Series.

FOURTEENTH GO AROUND

Forward **Hilary Knight** is appearing in her record 14th IIHF Women's World Championship, the most in USA Hockey history. Knight has led Team USA to gold nine times (2008, 2009, 2011, 2013, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2019, 2023) and silver four times (2007, 2012, 2021, 2022). She owns the IIHF record for all-time WWC points (101) and goals (61).

TENTH APPEARANCE FOR CARPENTER

Forward **Kendall Coyne Schofield** is playing in her tenth IIHF Women's World Championship, tying **Jenny Potter** and **Angela Ruggiero** for second-most in USA Hockey history. Coyne Schofield has won six golds (2011, 2013, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2019) and three silvers (2012, 2021, 2022). She is returning to the national team following maternity leave that kept her out of the 2023 tournament.

YOUTH MOVEMENT

Fourteen of the 25 players on the roster are still currently playing college hockey, with the same amount of players having a birth year of 2000 or later.

TWO GENERATIONS

The age gap between the oldest player on Team USA and the youngest player on the U.S. squad is 16 years. **Hilary Knight**, 34, born July 12, 1989 is the oldest player on the roster, while **Joy Dunne**, 18, born June 13, 2005 is the youngest player on the roster.

HISTORY FOR EDWARDS

Forward **Laila Edwards** is the first black player to skate for Team USA as a member of the U.S. Women's National Team at an IIHF Women's World Championship.

COLLEGE CONNECTION

All 25 athletes on the Team USA roster have competed or are currently competing as women's hockey student-athletes at a U.S. college or university. The University of Wisconsin leads the way with six athletes, while Northeastern and the University of Minnesota have four representatives. Ohio State University has three, while Boston College and Clarkson have two. Colgate University, Cornell University, Lindenwood University and Penn State University all have one athlete on the national team. In total, 10 different schools have representation on the team.

PATTY KAZMAIER MEMORIAL AWARD HONOREES

Four members of the team have been honored with the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award, bestowed annually to the best women's player in NCAA Division I college hockey: **Taylor Heise** (2022), **Aerin Frankel** (2021), **Kendall Coyne Schofield** (2016) and **Alex Carpenter** (2015).

U18 WOMEN'S WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP ALUMNI

A total of 19 players on the 2024 U.S. Women's National Team represented the U.S. at an IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship, including **Cayla Barnes**, **Hannah Bilka**, **Alex Carpenter**, **Kendall Coyne Schofield**, **Britta Curl**, **Joy Dunne**, **Lacey Eden**, **Laila Edwards**, **Rory Guilday**, **Caroline Harvey**, **Taylor Heise**, **Tessa Janecke**, **Megan Keller**, **Sydney Morrow**, **Abbey Murphy**, **Kelly Pannek**, **Kirsten Simms**, **Haley Winn** and **Grace Zumwinkle**. Dunne was most recently on the U18 team in 2023.

WNT ALUMNI TAKE DEVELOPMENT ROLES

U.S. Women's National Team alumni **Ellen Hughes** and **Haley Skarupa** have joined the team staff in a development capacity this season. Hughes is the team's player development consultant, while Skarupa is the team scout. Hughes played on the 1992 U.S. Women's National Team, while Skarupa won gold with Team USA at the 2018 Olympic Winter Games.

2020 U18 TEAM LEAVES A MARK

Six players and two members of the coaching staff from the 2020 U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team are currently on the roster or staff of the national team. **Lacey Eden**, **Rory Guilday**, **Caroline Harvey**, **Abbey Murphy**, **Kirsten Simms** and **Haley Winn** were a part of the gold medal-winning 2020 U18 squad that now compete at the senior level. Assistant coach **Josh Sciba** and goaltending coach **Alli Altmann** both held the same roles they currently hold, on the 2020 team.

AROUND USA HOCKEY

MAKING THE 2024 U.S. WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM

The 25-player 2024 U.S. Women's National Team was selected following a five-day evaluation camp in Lake Placid, N.Y. The team was selected from a pool of the top 39 players in the country.

2024 PATTY KAZMAIER MEMORIAL AWARD

The 2024 Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award was presented to **Izzy Daniel** of Cornell University as part 'Saturday at the Women's Frozen Four' on March 23 in Durham, N.H. Daniel was the first Cornell player to take home the honor. The Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award, an award by The USA Hockey Foundation, is given annually to the top women's hockey player in division I college hockey. Daniel, along with the University of Wisconsin's **Casey O'Brien** and **Kirsten Simms** were honored as top-three finalists.

2024 U.S. UNDER-18 WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM WINS GOLD

The 2024 U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team won gold at the 2024 IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship in January, defeating Czechia, 5-1 in the gold medal game. Team USA was a perfect 6-0-0-0 in the tournament. It marked the ninth overall time the U.S. has won the tournament and the first time since 2020.

THE BRIANNA DECKER ENDOWMENT FOR GIRLS HOCKEY

The Brianna Decker Endowment for Girls Hockey is going national. Started in 2018 by three-time Olympian **Brianna Decker** (Dousman, Wis.), and in conjunction with the USA Hockey Foundation, the endowment aims to provide grants to girls hockey organizations to increase female youth participation in hockey by alleviating costs around ice and equipment, advertising and marketing, and overall development. 2024 grants are open to all girls programs across the nation. JOHN WROBLEWSKI, HEAD COACH

John Wroblewski is serving as the head coach of the U.S. Women's National Team for the 2023-24 season after leading Team USA to a gold medal at the 2023 IIHF Women's World Championship and silver at the 2022 WWC.

Wroblewski joined the U.S. Women's National Team following two years (2020-22) as the head coach of the Ontario (Calif.) Reign, the AHL affiliate of the LA Kings, and four seasons (2016-20) as the bench boss of the USA Hockey National Team Development Program.

Over his four years with the NTDP, the program reached its first USHL playoff berth since 2012 and finished top-three in all 12 international tournaments played. He led his team to 33-consecutive international victories from 2016-18, and also oversaw the development of 29 NHL Draft picks, including Jack Hughes, who was selected first overall by the New Jersey Devils in 2019.

At the IIHF level, Wroblewski guided the U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team twice, resulting in a gold in 2017 and bronze in 2019.

The Neenah, Wisconsin, native began his coaching career as an intern assistant coach with the NTDP and was promoted to a full-time assistant coach the following season, a position he held from 2008-10.

Wroblewski, a player on the inaugural NTDP roster in 1997, skated four years with the University of Notre Dame (1999-2003). He went on to play four years (2003-07) professionally with the ECHL's Fresno Falcons, recording 125 points (65-60) in 273 career games.

JOSH SCIBA, ASSISTANT COACH

Josh Sciba is reprising his role on the U.S. Women's National Team staff during the 2023-24 season, after serving in the same capacity during the 2022-23 season.

As an assistant coach, Sciba helped lead the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team to a gold medal at the 2022 IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship, after serving in the same capacity for the 2019 U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team.

Sciba is currently the head coach of the Union College women's ice hockey team, a role he has served in for the past six seasons.

As a player, Sciba was a member of the USA Hockey National Team Development Program from 2001-03, prior to playing four years at the University of Notre Dame.

BRENT HILL, ASSISTANT COACH

Brent Hill is returning as an assistant coach for the U.S. Women's National Team during the 2023-24 season, after serving in the same capacity during the 2022-23 season.

Hill is currently serving as an assistant coach of the Quinnipiac Women's Ice Hockey team, a role he's held for the last two seasons.

Hill was on the bench as an assistant coach for the 2015 U.S. Under-18 Women's World Championship, leading the squad to a gold medal at the 2015 IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship.

Prior to Quinnipiac, Hill spent four seasons at the helm of Bishop Kearny Selects Academy, following a season as an assistant coach at Merrimack University and four seasons as an assistant coach at RPI.

SHARI DICKERMAN, ASSISTANT COACH

Shari Dickerman is returning as an assistant coach for the U.S. Women's National Team during the 2023-24 season, after serving in the same capacity during the 2022-23 season.

Dickerman, an assistant coach at Minnesota State University, previously served as assistant coach of the 2022 U.S. Collegiate Women's Select Team, that competed at the 2022 Collegiate Series against Canada in August.

Prior to her appointment to the USA Hockey staff, Dickerman served as an evaluator at numerous USA Hockey camps.

A member of the Mavericks staff since 2009, Dickerman has helped lead Minnesota State for the last 13 seasons.

As a player, Dickerman was an All-American goaltender for the Mavericks.

ALLI ALTMANN, GOALTENDING COACH

Alli Altmann returns as the goaltending coach of the U.S. Women's National Team after serving on the staff of the 2021, 2022 and 2023 U.S. Women's National Team.

Altmann also guided the U.S. Under-18 Women's National Team for four seasons, having served in the goaltending coach role from 2017-22. She guided the U.S. to two golds and two silvers during that time.

Altmann is currently the co-owner and vice president of DEVENIR Goaltenders. She played four seasons for Minnesota State University, recording a career .901 save percentage.
