## PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Minnesota Football Coaches,

I am honored and grateful to serve as the President of the Minnesota Football Coaches Association. Much of my appreciation for this organization stems from a history of seeking to do everything the right way. The MFCA gathers coaches from all corners of our state at all levels, positions, and ages, to develop, mentor, and honor them when deserving while constantly promoting our game. The association endorses proper application of the game, competition, player safety, academic achievement, player recognition, recruitment, and of course on and off the field performance and joy. Furthermore, through the Community Service Award and Tackle Cancer, our association has encouraged our players and coaches to give to and serve others throughout our state in order to leave a lasting legacy far beyond the gridiron. The MFCA is a special organization – one we must continue to hone, grow, and experience.

While our game has faced some challenges over the past decade, now is the best time to play football. These challenges have spawned changes, programs, and resources that are making the game safer than it has ever been. Coaches are more conscious and purposeful protecting player safety when using necessary return to play protocols. Moreover, the research and science community has responded to the rash of negative – and in some cases unfounded – media coverage to recognize that while playing football does pose risks, so does traveling in cars, riding bikes, skateboards, snowboards, or skis, or playing on a playground. In fact, those activities are statistically more dangerous than football. Therefore, we can recognize there are risks but we have to also see the significant benefits, which we know can be greater. Now more than ever, young men need our game to become men of character to display perseverance, selflessness, empathy, and some grit.

While the MFCA is proud of its past and strong in the present, we are preparing for the future. Our organization revitalized itself in the early 2000s. The MFCA established an Executive Director position (Ron Stolski of Brainerd), created a first class coaches clinic, obtained important sponsorships, shared the leadership of the organization, and grew the membership. The association is as strong as it has ever been. Nevertheless, work is underway to ensure we continue this progress in the future. First, an inventory of duties of each leadership position within the executive director's committee will be collected. Second, a succession plan has been initiated to replace the Executive Director and Secretary/Treasurer to ensure a smooth transition of leadership at the top. 


## LETTER FROM COACH P.J. FLECK UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA

## MFCA CODE OF ETHICS

#### PREAMBLE

One of the distinguishing characteristics of a profession in education may be that its members are cognizant of, and perhaps dedicated to, rendering a service to humanity. As educators who choose to coach football, we must understand that the justification for football is that it provides educational and physical values for those who play the game, and the game essentially belongs to the players who choose to play it.

The welfare of the game depends on how coaches live up to the spirit and letter of ethical conduct, and how coaches, as educators, model ethical conduct, and remain mindful of the trust and confidence placed in them by colleagues, players, and the public.

#### PURPOSE

This code of ethics has been developed to protect, promote, and preserve the best interests of the game and the coaching profession. Its primary purpose is to clarify and distinguish ethical and professional practices from those which are detrimental. Its secondary purpose is to emphasize the value of football as an experience that contributes to the overall education of the student-athlete and to stress proper functions in relation to schools, players, and the public.

#### ARTICLE ONE - RESPONSIBILITY TO PLAYERS

- 1. Coaches shall be aware of the tremendous influence they have on the education of the student-athlete; therefore, they shall never place the value of winning above the value of instilling the highest ideals of character and integrity.
- 2. Coaches shall follow or create and enforce a set of training rules for players that reflect the positive values of abstaining from drugs, alcohol, and tobacco.
- 3. Coaches shall never place the value of winning over the safety and welfare of players.
- 4. Coaches shall not exert pressure on faculty members to give players special consideration.
- 5. Coaches shall show respect to all players by treating them with integrity and honesty in both verbal and nonverbal behavior, regardless of their role or contribution to the team.
- 6. Coaches are responsible for their players' actions on the field and must not permit them to perform with the intent of causing injury to opposing players.
- 7. Coaches shall not seek unfair advantage by teaching deliberate unsportsmanlike behavior to players; they shall instruct players to play within the written rules and within the spirit of the game at all times.

#### **ARTICLE TWO - PROFESSIONAL BEHAVIOR**

- 1. Coaches shall exemplify the highest moral character, behavior, and leadership.
- 2. Coaches shall display modesty in victory and be gracious in defeat.

- 3. Coaches shall promote ethical relationships among fellow coaches.
- 4. Prior to, and following contests, coaches for the competing teams should meet and exchange cordial greetings to set the correct tone for the event.

#### **ARTICLE THREE - SPORTSMANSHIP**

- 1. Coaches shall exhibit, model, and teach good sportsmanship.
- 2. Coaches shall exert their influence to enhance sportsmanship by spectators, both directly and by working closely with cheerleaders, pep clubs, booster groups, parents, and administrators.

#### **ARTICLE FOUR - SCOUTING**

It is considered ethical to scout opponents only during games and agreed upon scrimmages, and within the designated rules of the conference or section by-laws. The head coach is responsible for the actions of his scouts.

#### **ARTICLE FIVE - RELATIONSHIPS WITH GAME OFFICIALS**

Coaches shall respect the integrity and judgment of the game official. Coaches shall not include in conduct which would incite players or spectators against officials. Public criticism of officials is considered unethical.

# MINNETONKA "WE ARE ONE" CAMP GIVES BOTH WAYS

Minnetonka has promoted and conducted community service with its football players for many years. In fact, an experience in 2011 spawned the idea that eventually became the Minnesota Football Coaches Association Tackle Cancer effort which hopes to eclipse the \$2 million mark in 2019.

A different effort captures the hearts of its players and participants in the "We Are One" Camp. Few things are better than high school football players coaching

their peers. At Minnetonka High School, the players are sharing their knowledge, skills, and tricks of the trade with adaptive student-athletes.

This camp, in its second year in 2018, hosted a couple dozen participants who experience the game in a way not otherwise possible. The high school players adapt the drills they practice so each participant can apply the fundamentals of throwing, catching, carrying, blocking, tackling, and more to experience our great game.

This collaboration, between the Minnetonka Sutdent Support Services leadership team and Skippers Head Coach Dave Nelson, features paraprofessionals and staff who already have relationships with the students and families to keep the focus fun and developing a sense of belonging.

While there is no doubt the campers have an enjoyable learning experience, a profound impact is made on the player coaches as well.

"I think (our players) learn a ton," said Coach Nelson. "I think they broaden their horizons a little bit, they have some new friends in school, and learn a little bit by coaching somebody else."

Michelle Ferris, executive director of Student Support Services, said "This is a very special night for the students with disabilities as well as the football team, who all come together to coach, mentor and make new friends in the spirit of friendship."

The campers leave the camp with shirts and tickets to the first home game so they can cheer on their players who coached them. In the end, this connection builds community while giving indelible experiences to all involved.

# How to Lead When You Are Not in Charge

This last summer I listened to a great podcast by Andy Stanley. He was interviewing a man named Clay Scroggins. The topic they were talking about was, "How to lead when you are not in charge." They started by stating that the majority of us will always have bosses that we are working for. However, just because we are not the boss and are not in charge we can still have tremendous influence.

The purpose of this article will be to share with you some of the main qualities from this podcast as well as valuable lessons I have learned during my years of being on multiple coaching staffs. In my experiences, having a great coaching staff that works together in a positive and productive way is

essential to helping your program be successful. These would be the Top 5 Qualities I would encourage you and everyone on your staff to make a real part of how they coach and live life.

# Quality #1 - Self-Leadership!

How you lead yourself directly reflects how you will lead others. Even if you are under a bad boss and that frustrates you, turn the focus on yourself and how you lead yourself. Control the things you can control and make those things the best. Not arrogantly or boastfully, but develop the lifestyle and habit that whatever you do you will do in a top class way. Regardless if that is being a dad, husband, co-worker, son, etc. Lead yourself well first and foremost. When you lead yourself the right way you give yourself a better chance to lead others as well.



# **Quality #2 – Own Your Domain!**

All of us are usually in charge of something. For example, your position group, taping, scout team, offense, defense, special teams, etc. Whatever it is you are in charge of, make it as great as you can. Be the head coach of that area/domain you have. Again, not in an arrogant or boastful way to pump yourself up, but in a way that reflects, "Whatever I am in charge of, I am going to make that great." Clay Scroggins describes it as creating an "Oasis of Excellence" with whatever you have been placed in charge of. The bottom line is, we can all have great influence regardless of our position or level of authority.

# Quality #3 – Choose Positivity!

The greatest gift we can all bring to everything we do is the energy of a

positive attitude. One of the greatest keys to leading is, BRING POSITIVE ENERGY EVERY DAY! When we bring this type of energy it influences people and makes things better. Individuals who choose positivity are the type of people you want in the room when you attack something. They are the individuals who are forward thinkers, are hope filled, have a "can do" attitude, say "we can do this", and "there isn't a mountain high enough!" Be a 100 watt lightbulb, not a 40 watt lightbulb.

# Quality #4 – Add Value by Thinking Critically without being Critical!

Often individuals become frustrated and disengaged when they don't have a chance to weigh in or they don't feel like they are listened to. The key to this is, don't become discouraged to the point where you aren't bringing your best every day and you are just "biding my time until I am in charge." All this does is hurt your program and your players. Here are a few tips for how to add value by thinking critically without being critical. One, see the big picture and have a realistic outlook. Two, we all want people who think critically. This means we think of ways to make things better and find ways to make progress. Critical thinkers do three things great; Notice Things, Question Things in a Good Way, and Connect Things. Therefore, don't just identify issues alone, but also be a problem solver and be ready to present possible ways to solve the issue. Three, be able to handle things if your idea is not done or rejected. A sign of a healthy coaching staff is being able to disagree, yet at the end you can all commit to the decision moving forward with tremendous "buy in" by EVERYONE!!! If your idea/thought isn't used, don't let it beat you up and keep you down. The line of being critical and critical thinking is razor thin. Constantly be asking yourself, "how can I be a critical thinker without being critical and how could we specifically address this to make things better and make progress?" Four, approach is everything! Therefore, figure out how and when to best approach who is in charge. Head coaches and leaders want things to get better and want to win, so find what approaches work best with them. **Quality #5 – Reject Passivity!** 

Our natural pull when we aren't in charge is to be passive. Find ways to add tremendous value to whatever staff you are on and whatever your role is. Look for ways to enhance what is already done and observe possible ways to make things even better. Don't just present problems, but present solutions to your plan as well. This is where you need to have that fine line of not always being a "yes" man. It's good for everyone to be reflective about everything they do and even be challenged to ensure who we are leading is getting the best of all coaches.

To summarize, here are four major questions to constantly be asking yourself.

- 1. How can I...Lead myself really well?
- 2. How can I...Choose Positivity?
- 3. How can I... Think critically and not be critical?
- 4. How can I...Reject Passivity?

If you have a staff full of people who live this way and think this way your time together as a staff will be very memorable and positive!

# A Look Into Perham Yellowjacket Football Offensive Philosophy and Culture

# Perham Offensive Football, Ryan Beachy

Looking at my roots in football, I look back to Staples-Motley, where I graduated from and played quarterback for two years. We were a triple option team and I fell in love with that. After graduating, I spent a year at NDSU, another option team, before transferring to Concordia, yet another triple option team.

Any way you look at it, my belief is that the option play is the single best play in football. I leave that very open when I say the "option play," because there are so many variations. When you can leave a defensive player or two players unblocked and read what they are doing to get you into the best play possible, to me, that is a no-brainer.

When I talk to the team at the beginning of the season, the first thing we talk about is being able to hang your hat on something. If we need a yard what are we going to? Every kid understands what that is. It is very important that the kids understand and believe in what you are doing, or you are fighting a losing battle.

If any of you were able to sit in on Randy Jackson's talk last year at the coaches clinic, we have very similar philosophies. I will go for it on 4th down from anywhere, I will call the same play over and over, I will run one guy vertical and then another and another. I will run swinging gate in the middle of the field, I

usually call two to three trick plays a game and, yes, we go fast on offense.

As I get into philosophy of where I go with my play, it is always numbers, angles and field:v

**Numbers:** Pretty simple. Do we have more numbers on the one side than they do? Often times I will be running or throwing to the boundary. With our style of offense, as we go fast and use our multiple types of formations and unbalanced formations, we might get numbers and angles and be able to go to the field.

**Angles:** We have great angles on our blocks off the ball, and also have the ability to get to the next level (LB) as well. That is a great opportunity to run to where we have angles. This will usually occur to the boundary.

**Field:** more often than not, this is done with a sweep, jet sweep, roll out, play action or with some sort of unbalanced formation.

The more I stop and correct a play in practice and have kids understand where the ball should be going in order to put us in the best shape, then the more not only our QB gets it, but the other kids that are on the field will get it as well. If my QB doesn't see it sometimes, then the lineman are calling the audible. This would include the slots as they also know where we want the ball going. So most of the time, the offense is all on the same page with where the ball is supposed to go. Now it just comes down to execution.

As I talked about it before, I am a triple option guy. Three

# Perham Football Culture & Off-Season, Kyle Knutson

This past season finished my 4th complete season as head coach in Perham and my 26th year coaching football. Prior to becoming head coach, I was the Defensive Coordinator in Perham and also in Frazee from 2000-2006. Before that I was a coach in the Zumborta-Mazeppa football program from 1993-1999. I played football at Concordia College – Moorhead, under coach Jim Christopherson, from '88 through the '90 seasons.

As a graduate from Lakeville High School I was fortunate to play in the Prep Bowl for the state championship against a good Cambridge team to whom we lost.

All of these experiences have helped shape my coaching style to try and promote a culture in Perham to continue the success the district has experienced in the 13 years I have been here and prior.

A huge part of the culture of a team is the coaching staff. Perham football is fortunate to have a team of guys that work well together. We can disagree at times but work through it and at the end of the day -or game - respect each other. There are

years ago Kyle Knutson, our head coach, asked if I would look into RPO's. I spent quite a bit of time researching it and asking questions of people that are very knowledgeable about the subject. Then we started to implement and could then tweak things to how we liked them.

After running some bubble screens four years ago and not having much success with it I scrapped it for a year. I was then able to listen to University of Minnesota Gopher offensive coordinator, Kirk Ciarrocca, speak here at our association clinic. I implemented that style two years ago and did very well with that. After talking to coach Laqua, the head coach at Minnesota State University Moorhead last summer, we added more to that and also increased some tunnel screens.

I honestly don't know how many different formations we ran this year, but if I had to guess it would be somewhere between 15 and 20. Out of those formations we run most every play we have. We are always able to run some sort of option play out of every formation. The idea behind the amount of formations we run is that we will see when someone doesn't line up correctly or gives us easy points. When a team doesn't line up correctly over a TE or a slot the vertical route is usually wide open. Hence also the reason to go fast and not let the defense have much time to adjust.

over 200 years of coaching experience on the staff for grades 9-12 and I believe that is a huge asset to have in a program. I imagine what we teach and preach is pretty common amongst schools across the state so what I write about is probably not new to most schools. Our practices are fast paced, broken into

timed periods and often run long when mistakes happen. We will turn the lights on if necessary.

In Perham football, we teach that there is not any one person that holds more importance on the team than another. Every person has an important role. A few years ago we started dressing our freshman and moved them into the varsity locker room so that they can experience and learn that concept from the beginning. It also allows them to feel a part of something right away instead of waiting until their season is over. We give every freshman the option to continue on with the team after their season is done with the understanding that they participate through the end of the season. We remind them that we hope to be practicing in snow as we wrap up our season and it will get cold!

Our off-season programs are fairly limited compared to most. We understand kids are stretched pretty thin already trying to balance other sports and activities. We draft weight lifting teams a few weeks after our season ends when the season is still fresh in the kids' minds. The next year's seniors draft players down to the incoming 8th graders and their lifting activity is charted throughout the school year and summer, offering prizes along the way for teams that have the most activity.

We do try to compete in some 7-7 evenings with area schools and as of late we are hosting our own team camps. For years we attended college team camps and loved the competition but found with cost and time, our numbers were limited. Last summer we had over 60 kids 9-12 attend camp that consists of mostly football education, O and D install, 7-7 challenges, big man challenges and team bonding. Our camp consists of 1 day in June and a day and a half to close out July. Our closing ceremony at the lake involves grilling, games, swimming and goal setting.

Starting at team camp in the summer and continuing throughout the following season a player will pick another player on the team that exemplifies a great teammate. Someone they believe will have their back on and off the field, works hard in practice and has a good attitude. After the next practice, the player that was picked the day before will pick one





that he feels meets the same standards. These standards define the culture we want. This continues until the last practice.

We have seen great chemistry and bonding this past season which is greatly attributed to the type of kids we had and are getting back. # **Building Pride Back into a Program**

Tom Nelson graduated from Two Harbors High School in 1990, Attended UMD, and has taught for 22 years (Special Education for 20 and PE for the last 2). He has coached boy's basketball, track, and football, and is married with 5 children—Angie (wife), Tate 12, Carter 11, Brooklyn 11, Delaney 11, and Owen 10.

When I was asked to consider writing something for the MFCA annual magazine I thought about some of the most important ingredients to our success. From there I then knew what I should focus on as far as this article goes, I hope this is a worthwhile read for some of you.

Two Harbors is a small 3A school on the North Shore of Lake Superior. We draw from a large geographical area that is mainly rural. We are rarely the bigger team and often times do not have the fastest kids, but we have been able to compete and succeed most years due to "Buy In".

When we took the program over 19 years ago (I was 29) we were in a pretty tough spot. Our numbers were not there, school spirit and pride was poor, community interest was minimal, and overall expectations for our football program were low, in fact there were some rumblings about suspending the Agate Football Program at that time.

The 2 things we focused on in the beginning were to first change the culture of what it meant to be an Agate Football Player and secondly we needed to get kids into the Weight Room. We adopted the motto of F.A.M.I.L.Y which is an acronym for Forget About Me I Love You. This one simple thing has had an enormous impact on our program over the years. Now it took a few years to get kids, parents, community, etc to really start buying in, and still some never do, but when they did start you could see the momentum begin to grow. We plaster FAMILY everywhere, we even had it on our jerseys for years until jersey restrictions prohibited it....so now it is down the side of our game pants--which is still allowed--we found the loophole and did it! Getting kids into the weight room (which we often refer to as the "workroom") was instrumental in our ability to compete. We worked to create an environment where kids were welcomed, not driven away—no matter their size or strength. Our older and more experienced lifters are in groups with our younger student-athletes and this has been key for us to build mentor-ship opportunities and take more ownership in the program. We typically lift at 6 am M-W-F mornings all year round and average between 25 and 35 student-athletes per day with nearly all in attendance playing football. There is no doubt that our kids have given themselves a chance to compete with bigger and faster athletes because of the WR. It took us about 2-3 years to really start seeing noticeable results as far as being able to consistently compete throughout the entire season.

Working off the FAMILY values, we began having our kids volunteer in the community back in the early 2000's. We needed to intertwine the student-athletes and the community together again. Our kids put in countless hours volunteering

with such things as Grandma's Marathon, community dinners, moving community members who need help, helping at local churches, cleaning up our community, and numerous other acts. We also focused on being students first. Our first game we ever coached in back in 2001 we had 26 kids in 9th -12th grade out for the team with 8 of them not dressing due to grades for that game—so we suited 18 kids in 9 -12th grade for a 3A team due to grades—not good! This past year, and many other years leading up to now, we had zero academically ineligible kids and were Academic All State as a team in 2018. Now don't get me wrong, we still have our issues we deal with, but they are a rarity now.

When the student-body, community, and alumni started to notice the changes, that is when it was a true FAMILY atmosphere. Bleachers started filling up, kids were proud to wear Two Harbors Agates apparel again, people were talking about games and had hope in their voices...but most importantly they were proud of THEIR football program and what it stood for, and that was awesome to see. Our cheerleaders, our band, and our fans are fantastic and make the games a True American High School Football Experience!!

Over the past 18 years we have been fortunate to win 5 conference championships (before that the last was 1979), we have been section runners up 3x, and section champs last year while making our first trip to State in 41 years. We are not a powerhouse football program with multiple state titles, but I would like to think that we are well respected as a team and that you must be prepared to play against us. We will work to give you everything we have to succeed and strive to overachieve. We have to outwork other teams as we are not talented enough to just show up and win, and I am proud of that. We believe that no matter how talented you are, become an overachiever. Our kids work to be the best they can be and with that they represent themselves, their families, their team, their school, and their community in the best way possible.

There are many coaches out there that are probably a heck of a lot smarter than I am, and I feel fortunate to be in this profession with them. I am coming up on my 30th year of coaching at one level or another, and I truly feel that the more I learn, the more I realize how little I really know, and how much I can still learn about this great game. I have always believed that if you can get a players heart bought into what you are doing as a program, they will go farther than they ever thought they could...F.A.M.I.L.Y!!

# **Pyramid of Success**

During my football career I have been fortunate to learn from working with a number of coaches, both while playing for and while coaching alongside, I have been able to take something from every school I have been associated with. I played center at the University of St. Thomas in the late 90s and got to see how a program with a tradition of success functioned. I started coaching at Irondale High School in 2000. As a new coach I learned the value of planning and preparation. Since 2003, I have been coaching at Spring Lake Park High School. I spent my first 15 years as an assistant coach; prior to 2018 I worked as the Offensive Coordinator and Offensive Line Coach. During that time, I was able to work with a number of great coaches and grew as a coach and learned many aspects of leading a football program. Honestly, being a Head Coach was not on my career to-do list. I was happy being a coordinator/position coach. But when SLP's Head Coach, Jeff Schlieff, retired in early 2018 after serving in the position for 25 years I knew that if there was ever a time and place for me to take the helm, it was then and at Spring Lake Park. After getting my wife's and family's blessing and a stressful few months of developing my coaching portfolio along with completing various interviews, I was named the next Head Football Coach at Spring Lake Park.

As I prepared for the new role and the task of taking over a program that had been built on a solid foundation of character, hard work and a mentality of toughness I got a lot of advice from a number of people in my life. Some of the advice was solicited and some of it was given freely. I heard everything from "you have no idea what you are getting into", to "throw the ball", and "be yourself". Almost everyone I talked to had tips on what offense to run or the latest blitz package we needed to implement.

Because I had been a part of the SLP program for so long and had a part in building/maintaining the culture Coach Schlieff envisioned, I wanted to take a close look at what traditions and values our players and coaches felt were important to the program. I spent a good chunk of the Spring interviewing past and current players as well as talking with the coaching staff about traditions, values, new ideas and things that should not be changed. The players had all sorts of ideas about our traditions, some of which no one could figure out how or why

they had even been started. Those were the things I knew we would need to take a second look at and work to clean up what was actually a tradition aligned our values. In talking with the coaches, we discussed our values what current practices made sense as well as areas where we were willing to try something new. One of the conversations



that stood out was with a veteran assistant coach - he wanted to make sure I understood that our Pyramid of Success was the program that should continue to drive our work. Our Pyramid of Success is based on many of John Wooden's principles and serves as a great tool for guiding our coaches and players at Spring Lake Park.

The Pyramid gets posted in our locker room and is one of the few handouts we still give players each season. Our emphasis is on the bottom 3 rows with the belief that if we are strong in those, we will have the best chance of reaching the blocks at the top.

Here is a look at our Pyramid for 2019. Most of the Pyramid stays the same from year to year; the only things that get updated are if any of our TEAM Game Goals change. (See opposite page.)

# Level 1

The foundational blocks, are Person/Student traits that we challenge our players to develop. Most of them have little to do with being a football player but serve a bigger role in the development of high character in young adults. Players who are strong in these blocks represent themselves, their families and the football program well.



#### Level 2

Athlete/Player traits. These 6 values serve as a guide for the type of player we are looking for and trying to develop. When we have a TEAM of individuals who are strong at Level 2, it is special. They are a good group to coach and often reach their potential – maybe even overachieve. Our 2018 TEAM was led by a player that embodied the values on Level 2; our on-the-field success was a direct result of this.

# Level 3

TEAM traits that we work to develop. Some of the work is done in-season but a good chunk of getting stronger, faster and becoming a close-knit group happens in the off-season. We have had a strong tradition of lifting as a TEAM in the off-season. Lifting with your teammates is a fantastic way to build relationships and strengthen trust between players.

# Level 4

Individual football goals. The individual goals are purposely

put after the TEAM goals to help emphasize that the TEAM comes first.

# Level 5

Connects to our TEAM Game Goals. We have 12 game goals each week. 3 TEAM Goals, 3 Offensive Goals, 3 Defensive Goals and 3 Special Teams Goals. Score 21 points and + Side Turnovers are two of them and goals that all 3 phases of the game can impact. That is why they are on the Pyramid. I will list our Game Goals later in the article. W.I.N. stands for What's Important Now – Lou Holtz gives a great talk on this acronym on YouTube. Asking yourself this question as it relates to your goals helps to frame a decision-making process that we believe helps our athletes. There have been times we will talk about this before practice to help shift the focus to football for the next 2 hours.

Levels 6, 7, 8 & 9 are pretty standard goals for all football programs. Other than Win the Block, our rivalry game with Irondale, I would think all teams have some form of those goals in their program. Having the best chance to achieve those goals comes from building a strong foundation on the lower levels.

We cover the blocks of the Pyramid throughout Fall Camp and during the season. Most days during Fall Camp we will meet during the mandated rest period and one of our coaches will give a character talk. Often the topic connects with one of the blocks at the base of the pyramid. Since our staff has a lot of experience together and I believe they have a good sense of what our TEAM needs, coaches have the freedom to decide what to talk about during that time. Some of our coaches get creative and come up with activities or interactive discussions to cover their topic. If a coach is stumped for an idea or if they are new to the staff, I encourage them to look at the Pyramid and pick a topic. During the season we use part of our Monday scouting meeting for a character talk and introduce our theme of the week. One of the many things I kept from Coach Schlieff is that each assistant coach takes a game during the season and he is responsible for the lesson that week and any other motivation for that game. I decided to keep that going as I think it is good for our TEAM to hear from other voices and looking back, I think it really helped my own development as a coach to need to prepare those lessons and talks for a game week. Another way we engage our athletes with the Pyramid is when we have our post-season individual meetings, the Pyramid provides a nice framework for talking with players about strengths and areas of growth.

Our Pyramid of Success will continue to be a major influence in all of the work we do with our TEAM. It has served Spring Lake Park well for over 25 years and I have appreciated having it as a tool during my first year as a head coach.

For us, it's about changing perspective. It's about changing words or how we use our words. It's about pep talks and occasionally it's about getting after each other. Challenging each other not to continuously make the same mistakes. As a program, we know that everyone has bad days. We have a get out of jail free card that anyone can use. With this card an individual can miss one practice with no consequence. Yet hardly anyone takes advantage of this because we hold each other accountable for wanting to become better.

We like to think of climate being our day to day process. This is something our program sees and lives every single day. We like to think of our culture as what everyone else sees. If we are all striving to become a better person each day then our climate should be creating our culture. Our culture shouldn't have a ceiling. We are always thinking of more, not in a greedy way but in a way in a sense of "what can we do more of to become better."

# **Trust more:**

If we want people to trust us as leaders then we need to be able to trust them when they have a vision or an idea also.

# **Listen more:**

A lot of people think of communication only through talking. To be a good communicator, we need to sit back and listen to everyone also. One thing we like to do when a coach is done talking with the players is to ask any other coach or players to add something they may feel is important while the group is all together. # Talk more:

We don't talk just to talk or because we like to hear ourselves talk. We try to talk more in a way that we can't assume everyone in our program knows our vision or what we are thinking. We have to be able to talk to communicate to try and have everyone on the same page.

# **Delegate more:**

In order to be successful at this point, we believe we have to develop and know the skills of our team/staff. If we feel confident in those skills then we are more likely to delegate tasks out knowing they will be completed to the best of their abilities.

# **Encourage more:**

As we continue to strive to be transformational leaders, we have learned that our encouraging attitudes have a trickle down affect. In our society right now it is so easy to point the finger and say "It's not my fault, or it's not my job", this can lead to a lot of negativity amongst staff/teams which is also a trickle down affect and a lot easier to get drawn into. It really takes a conscious effort to be encouraging and positive to let people know that, "they can do it!"

# **Support more:**

If we want people to buy into our vision or strategy then we better build some good relationships to earn their support and vice versa.

#### Smile more:

Having or showing a smile often makes us more approachable. It make others think that we are polite and caring. If we are more approachable to others then they will be more likely to share their thoughts, ideas, concerns, and vision with us. If we earn their trust from being approachable, they will be more likely to be on board with us when we may have thoughts, ideas, concerns or visions.

# Involve more:

Each person has a job and they do their job. Nothing should change as a leader, we try to involve as many stakeholders as possible in whatever we do. We make sure not to give any job or task to anyone if they haven't seen us do it first. Part of being a leader is to show that we will do the same work and be just as involved.

# **Praise more:**

It's no secret that everyone likes to hear they're doing a great job. If we as educators can give labeled praise to students that do a specific task to the best of their ability, then there is no reason as leaders we can't give the same labeled praise to peers that do a task to the best of their ability. # **Fundamentals of Success**

First and foremost, I would like to thank the Minnesota Football Coaches Association for the opportunity to write this article.

We obviously had an extremely successful year here at Mahnomen/Waubun. Winning the Prep Bowl against an extremely talented BOLD team was a dream come true. If you are a coach that witnessed that game, you are thinking two things: 1 - Wow! How did the Thunderbirds pull that off? 2 - Why in the world would a coach whose defense gave up what seemed like a thousand pass yards in the first half of that game be writing on Defensive Back play?? Well, we aren't sure on the first, it's still a little surprising to us. As for the second, because the Defensive Back has become the most important player on the field!!

The game of football is changing. It seems nearly everyone is running some sort of spread offense. With the RPO (can we please get a lineman downfield call, sheesh) craze, this is only going to become more common. This means that the offenses are getting more creative than ever to get the ball to the best, fastest athletes on the team in open space. Think about that.

Ok there Mr. Junior DB, go cover that kid, who is the best athlete on their team, oh, by the way, he knows where he is going and you don't, also he gets to run forward and you have to be going backwards! This is what DB's are going through. The ability to defend the pass is more vital now than ever before.

Thunderbird defense is something that we take extreme pride in. Our expectation is a shut out each and every game. To do this, all 11 players must exhibit superb fundamentals, focus and attitude. There are no shortcuts. Yes, sometimes your team is simply going to be superior to the other team. But every team has at least one athlete, one player that can break one. This is why we have to hammer home that each and every play, no matter if it is a rep in practice or late in the 4th quarter of the State Championship game, all 11 players must have superb fundamental, focus and attitude.

# **FUNDAMENTALS**

Fundamentals are needed daily in high school football,

but sometimes they are hard to cover, especially in the small schools. Small school football coaches never have enough time. When the majority of your major contributors play both sides of the ball and most special teams, practice time becomes extremely thin. Throw in being a defensive coach on a staff with an offensive head coach, and the time becomes even less (D Coordinators all know what I'm talking about). We have narrowed our drills drastically to what we think are the four most important fundamentals: eyes, footwork, tackling and attitude.

# **EYES**

Training the eyes is the single most important fundamental. Proper eye training will give the DB a chance every play. We constantly question "Where are your eyes?" and "Why are your eyes there?" Pre snap, we want the eyes in one of two places, the designated offensive lineman if we are in zone or the bellybutton of our man if we are in man to man defense. If we are in zone, we expect our DB's to not only defend the pass, but also provide support in the run game. We have no glory boys that don't get their uniforms dirty! Reading run/ pass immediately after the snap is essential. This is something that needs to be addressed constantly throughout the season, or it will not happen. We have found easy ways to do this. We rely heavily on the Offensive line giving us the run/pass read, depending upon if they are firing out or dropping to protect the passer. An important piece to this is that we always error deep, meaning if in doubt = pass read. Incorporating some sort of high hat/low hat terminology into footwork drills has become a great tool for us. Very easy to do. Another fun way to make this a priority is having contests to see who can read the run/pass first, This has become a favorite. Challenge a different player each play, whether it is during a team practice session or on the sideline of a JV game, make it a fun way to compete and challenge your players to become perfect with their eyes. Offense has the advantage of knowing the play and where they are going. Proper eye placement can reduce that advantage just a bit.

#### **FOOTWORK**

There are thousands and thousands of footwork drills for DB's out there and all of them have benefit. Even if we practiced hours a day, every day of the year, there is no way we could hit them all. A determination of what are the most important skills your DB's need has to be made. For us, we determined that we want our DB's to have tremendous start/stop/acceleration. We cater all of our footwork drills into this set of skills. We work to start fast, stop fast and accelerate NOW!. We don't expect to have cookie cutter fixes to this. Each player is different and we allow them to practice that way. One player might be fastest playing out of a back peddle and another might be faster crossing over. Our preference is crossing over, but it's not mandatory. The players have to feel fast, if they are trying to move in a way that makes them uncomfortable or have to think about the movements, we feel we are defeating the purpose.

We don't care so much about how they play fast, as long as they have 2 non-negotiables: quick, short steps instead of elongated, slow steps and they exhibit good balance/body control. In our world, long steps and/or being unbalanced = advantage offense. We work to avoid that as much as possible. We want a fast start, a fast stop and a fast acceleration if needed to put our DB's in the best possible position to have success each play. The aspect of footwork that we are the most strict with has little to do with feet, we work hard to make sure our DB's stay in the proper body position. Keeping a balanced center of gravity and a bend at the hips, knees and ankles is must. We call this staying in the athletic position. Staying in this position may not make a player faster, but NOT being in this position certainly makes the player slower. A simple reminder of "Be an Athlete" usually reminds the DB's of this position.

# **TACKLING**

Unfortunately, our great game is under attack. Protecting the head has become the single most important aspect of football. This has changed the way we practice drastically. Live tackling sessions were once a weekly, if not daily, mainstay in every practice schedule. Now, we may do live tackling drills a few times the entire year. It is very difficult to simulate this, but we feel we have a found a way to get in the reps, without as much contact. Not that we have a ton of contact anyhow, considering our tackling philosophy at DB is 'get an ankle and hold on!' We don't expect a huge hit when a DB has to make a tackle. Remember, when DB's are tackling, that usually means the best athlete of the other school has the ball and is in open space. Not a lot of time to worry about form! Being in the right position drastically helps our DB's cut down the open space

and funnel the ball carrier. We spend the most time covering where the DB is supposed to be in relation to the ball carrier. Great tackling teams work in unison, knowing where to force the player if I were to miss is critical. If the player is a secondary contain player, a CB in Cover 3 for example, we expect him to be outside the ball carrier and tackle the outside leg/hip. For an alley defender such as a FS in Cover 3, we have inside leverage, therefore he should be tackling the inside leg/hip. Ideally, they meet at the same time, converging on each leg/hip, giving the ball carrier no wiggle room. We feel if the player is clear on his support position, we cut down the angles of the ball carrier and even if we miss, we send the ball carrier to our partner. We also spend a lot of time with a tackle wheel. This has worked extremely well, as it gives the players an object to make contact with and a moving target. We always incorporate position into the drills. Instructions such as - "We are left contain," or "We are Alley" force the players to understand which part of the wheel (representing which leg), they are to attack. We also throw in a blocker to make it more realistic to game day. This has become one of the few tackling drills we incorporate on a consistent basis.

#### **ATTITUDE**

No matter what your position is on staff - position coach, coordinator or head coach - it is up to you to determine what the attitude is going to be for the group under your control. This is something that needs to be addressed constantly. If you want a physical defense, you must address it, you can't just hope for it or have it be an end of practice "we need to be more physical" afterthought. We believe attitude is a fundamental that can be taught and MUST be taught on a daily basis! The players need to know exactly what you want and what you mean. The attitude we want at defensive back is "THE BALL IS OURS!" We don't want our DB's thinking it is an ultimate disrespect for the other team to think that they can pass the ball on us. It ranks right up there with calling our Mama's ugly! So when they do pass, we try and beat it into our DB's that the ball is ours, not theirs. They are throwing it to us, not them. Nothing irks me more than when a player in an offensive drill will go up over three others and make a one handed catch and then, in defensive drills, the same player watches a 4'8, 6th string WR on the 9th grade team catch a ball right in front of them. I am positive every other DB coach in the world feels this way. It's 100% attitude. It's natural for the offensive player to think the ball is to them. It is our mission to make "THE BALL IS OURS!" a mindset of our defensive players. To accomplish this, it must be a constant demand. Every ball thrown in DB drills must be intercepted or there are consequences. Every ball the scout team throws must be intercepted or they hear about it! The attitude that you want must be ingrained into every play or it becomes a hope, not a demand.

As you have probably figured out, we are very passionate

# Wide Receiver Technique

#### **MATT SIMON**

Wide Receivers Coach / Passing Game Coordinator, University of Minnesota

Minnesota Football Coaches Association,

I could not be more excited to be home in our great state of Minnesota. I am honored to be given the opportunity to speak with you about the great game of football. I truly believe that the University of Minnesota is a special place where we have special things ahead of us this season and in the future. I appreciate all that the MFCA has done for our sport, including the annual clinic, where our staff and coaches in our state come together to share our passion for the game of football. Our facility is always open to you and our staff is always available.

First, I believe there are three characteristics that play an important role in the development of wide receivers. These characteristics reflect their willingness to learn in the film room and on the field. Their main focus should be to get better while watching film. We do this by taking notes each time we meet as a unit. This allows our wide receivers to learn and grow from their mistakes as an individual as well as from the mistakes of their teammates. Their focus on the little things will translate into success.

# **EFFORT**

When I talk about effort, I am referring to consistency and confidence. These traits are seen in the weight room, on the field and while watching film. If a player is confident in themselves, they will become consistent in those three areas, so then you are able to trust him to do the right thing in practice and during a game. This includes being in the right spot, at the right time, to execute what it is that is asked of them.

# **PASSION**

Passion and love for the game of football is instrumental. The mentality to committing to repeating the same fundamentals represents their desire to be great. This leads to players developing the concentration needed to be a wide receiver. A wide receiver needs to have the passion to go make the entire offensive unit better one play at a time whether they get the ball or not. Their mindset should be the same when it comes down to making a key block on a defensive back or linebacker or if they are running a route to drive the ball down field.

# **MENTAL TOUGHNESS**

A wide receiver needs to be mentally tough. They are consistently asked to block on the perimeter or attack the football. This means they must be in total control of themselves and their actions, which goes hand in hand with being mentally tough. If something doesn't go their way or they miss a play, they need to have the strength to bounce back and execute on the very next play and forget what had previously happened.

Next, are some fundamentals that I look for in a wide receiver's play: speed, hands, maneuverability, their stance and catching.

# **SPEED**

When looking at their speed, they need to be able to separate themselves from the defender. They need to be able to move laterally and vertically quickly and aggressively. Agility drills with the fundamental, proper technique will allow a player to develop their footwork and the speed will follow over time.

# **HANDS**

A player's hands come down to catching the ball multiple times a day. It is a craft that every wide receiver needs to master. It's as simple as running routes with a quarterback, throwing and a catching tennis ball off the wall or using a jugs machine to develop their hands.

# **MANEUVERABILITY**

This is the bend in the athlete. For them to move they need the ability to bend, to get around defenders but to also get in and out of breaks. This is vital each play to keep their defenders guessing each and every play. Such as being violent route runners with their get-offs, sinking their hips and the movements of their head and shoulders.

# **STANCE**

The inside foot should be forward with the feet staggered. The feet are shoulder width apart. This is important because if they have their back foot behind the front foot it leads to an unbalanced position. Also, the feet must have enough stagger so they do not take a "false step," which ends up being wasted movement at the line of scrimmage. Both knees should be bent in a comfortable position where the body weight is on the ball of the front foot. The back should be straight, slightly leaning forward and bent at the waist. This way their chest is not exposed to a press corner. Their head is up to study the defense while also having the ability to look in at the ball. A good buzz phrase to use: "Knee over toe, chest over knee."

Catching: The body position during a catch is important. They need to have an athletic position to be able to use their strength to catch and secure the ball while taking a hit. This also helps with the ability to react to generate yards after the catch. Make sure that they square the ball up and they have the correct positioning of their hands. Be sure they see themselves catch the ball by having them watch the crosshairs of the ball. Train their eyes to see the ball into their hands and secure the ball. Draw attention to the point that a receiver should never attempt to catch a pass against his body. All balls should be caught with the fingertips, not with the palms. Emphasize that when the ball is in the air, the receiver should go get it because there is no such thing as a bad ball. We want our wide receivers to think every time the ball is in the air that it is theirs. They need to come down with every ball. They need to battle the defensive back smartly, aggressively and consistently.

# **Bob Jackson,**Spring Lake Park & White Bear Lake

### **High School Division**

Bob was a 1972 graduate of Winnebago High School in Winnebago, Minn. where he lettered in football and baseball. He then attended Mankato State University and earned his degree in Education. After graduation, he accepted his first high school teaching and head football coach positions in Belcourt, ND.

Bob then went on to coach and teach in Mabel, MN from 1978-1982, 1984, where his Mabel-Canton Cougars were the Conference Champions and

made a State Tournament Appearance (Quarters) in 1981. Bob was a Graduate Assistant at UW-River Falls in the Fall of 1983 and the University of Colorado in the Spring of 1984.

In 1985, he taught and coached the Spring Lake Park Panthers until 1993, earning a Conference Championship in 1988 and making State Appearances in 1991 (Class A State Champions) and 1992.

His last 19 years of his career were spent in White Bear Lake, where he was the athletic director and head football coach. While coaching the WBL Bears, Bob earned conference championships in 2000 and 2004. His team made State Tournament Appearances in 1997, 1998, 1999 and 2002. He left White Bear Lake as the winningest coach in school history with 123 wins and was inducted into the WBL Athletic Hall of Fame. Bob was a master of rebuilding struggling programs by putting emphasis on weight room and work ethic. He ended his head coaching career with 214 wins. After retiring, Bob helped as an assistant coach at North Branch, Spring Lake Park and Wayzata.

Bob passed away at the age of 64 on March 31st, 2018. He is survived by his daughter, Lisa, his sister and 5 nieces and nephews.



Bob Jackson was a true leader of young men and women and instilled life skills of character, discipline and work ethic in each student who had the pleasure of interacting with him. If he wasn't working tirelessly to make sure the facilities were in pristine condition, he was covering the banquet costs for athletes who couldn't afford to attend. His teams were a reflection of his blue collar approach and demeanor. A humble man, he led by example, never drawing attention to himself, but leaving his mark on the lives of those he touched.

# The Power of Influence Award: Criteria and History

The Minnesota Power of Influence award is presented by the MFCA to recognize one of the many extraordinary football coaches in Minnesota. The Minnesota award winner is our association's nominee for the national Power of Influence Award, which is presented jointly by the American Football Coaches Association and the American Football Coaches Foundation\*.

The Power of Influence Award was created as a way for the AFCA and AFCF to honor a deserving high school football coach for his effect on his players, school and community. The individuals nominated must be active head football coaches and must embody the life-changing qualities of respect and inspiration. They must have touched lives and caused student-athletes and others to want to emulate their honesty, patience and modesty. This award is not based on wins and losses, however, it is noted that coaches of powerful influence have longevity and success.

Previous Minnesota Power of Influence winners and national nominees have included: Dwight Lundeen of Becker 2009, Dave Nelson of Minnetonka 2008. Dave Hylla of Proctor 2007, Mike Mahlen of Verndale 2006, and Ron Stolski of Brainerd 2005. Stolski went on to be named the national Power of Influence Award winner by the AFCA and AFCF.

# **2019 DON SWANSON AWARD**

The Don Swanson award represents exemplary service to the MFCA. It is presented annually to a member of our association who personifies what the late Don Swanson exemplified: unconditional service to and for football in Minnesota. "Swannie" was a respected teacher, coach, administrator, and friend to all who knew him. His passing in 2009 left us all with a void. He was a proud graduate of South High school

and Gustavus Adolphus College and a life-long educator in the city of Minneapolis. His work as part of the MFCA clinic is legendary and he will never be replaced. In honoring "Swannie," we remember his sense of humor, his quick wit, his engaging charm, and, most importantly, his tireless efforts on behalf of students and coaches. He was one of our finest — a true 'Keeper of the Game'.

# Jim Dotseth, MFCA Secretary-Treasurer

Jim Dotseth is a graduate of Clarkfield High School, Waldorf JC, the University of Minnesota and St. Mary's University. In high school he earned letters in football, basketball, track and baseball. At Waldorf JC he was all-conference in football and all-state in basketball while earning an Associate of Arts degree. Jim later finished his Bachelor of Science degree (1968) and Master of Education (1972) at the University of Minnesota. In 1997, he completed his administrative degree from St. Mary's University.

Jim spent 30 years teaching and coaching in the Minneapolis Public School District – his early years at Roosevelt High School and later at Patrick Henry High School. During his years in the Minneapolis district, Jim coached a variety of sports including football, wrestling, track and badminton. He was named Minneapolis conference coach of the year several times in wrestling and football. He finished his career in education in the Chaska School District as an administrator. Jim has been an active member of the Minnesota Football Coaches Association having chaired several committees over the years including MFCA Banquet Chair, All-Star Game Director (1987-1999), Awards Committee Chair and currently Secretary Treasurer. He received the MFCA Distinguished Service Award in 1998 and was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 2010. In 2012, Jim was inducted into the Waldorf College Hall of Fame. Jim and his wife Wanda have two daughters and four grandchildren (all living in the metro area): Jennica, husband Paul Burgh and children Caleb and Hannah (Maple Grove); Deena, husband Wade Laugen, daughters Avery and Maia (Apple Valley).

### **Award Requirements**


An <u>active</u> assistant football coach at the high school level.



The Warriors defeated Blackduck in the Section 7A title game before losing to Mahnomen-Waubun in the first round of the state tournament. The Warriors were led by a dominate offensive and defensive line made up of Sr linemen Cole Fox, Frank Villeneuve and Bill Maki. The skilled positions were filled with underclassman who will all be returning in 2019 including the backfield pair of Trevor Michienzi and Austin Rasley who totaled over 2000 all purpose yards on offense out of the backfield behind that line.

#### **Braham**

The Braham Bombers finished the year with a 5-4 overall record and a 4-2 Northeast District Siver Division record. The Bombers ended up losing to Blackduck 36-20 in the section semifinals.

Braham had four All-Conference selections: Seniors: Devin Shellito, Jacob Johnson and Ryan Roslin as well as Junior Luke Bendickson. They also had three more selected as Honorable Mention: Juniors Josh Klingensmith, Michael Tilkens-Rogstad and Ben Carlson.

### **Hinckley-Finlayson**

The Hinckley-Finlayson Jaguars are coming off a 3-7 season. Going into this past season there were a lot of question marks at several positions after graduating 13 seniors from last years section finals team.

The Jaguars will be returning 9-starters on offense including three all-District lineman selections. The defense will be returning 7 starters as well. This past season there were many growing pains as many sophomores and juniors made their varsity debuts. With a year of valuable experience under our belts, the Jaguars hope to once again be in contention for conference and section play

### **East Central**

The East Central Eagles finished the 2018 season with a 0-8 record but improved throughout the year. All-District Awards went to Sr. Vern Anderson III, who had 800 yards passing with 13TD and Sr. Linebacker /running back Matt Klocke. Klocke had 114 total tackles and 795 yards rushing. Honorable Mention honors went to Seniors linemen/linebackers Dylan Fratzke and Devlin Fratzke.

### **Rush City**

Led by 9 seniors, the Tigers finished the year with a 2-7 overall

record and 2-5 in the subdistrict. Rush City started the year with some big physical teams right out of the gate, Class 3A rival Pine City, and Class 2A power Barnum. The inexperienced Tigers learned a lot in those first two games about themselves that would help them later in the year. After a bye week, the Tigers traveled to Braham to take on the Bombers. The game was closely contested in the first half, but fell 34-16. The Tigers got on the winning track for Homecoming the following week against East Central 28-12. The rest of the season played out like earlier in the season after that. The Tigers were competitive and had opportunities to pull out wins, but could not come up with a play or two when it was needed. The Tigers lost to Concordia Academy in the first round of the Class 4AA tournament 25-8. The Tigers were led by seniors Brandon Guptill, Cody McFee, Hudsen Mell, Carl Sybrant, Beau Behrendt, Logan Niessen, and Nate Ramberg. There is a lot of returning players who saw plenty of playing time that will be the nucleus to the 2019 Rush City Tiger Team.

### **Northwoods**

The North Woods Grizzlies came off a section championship in 2017 and began the 2018 season replacing positions held by the previous year's Seniors. Although inexperienced, North Woods had some solid athletes to fill various positions. The Grizzlies ended the regular season at 3-5. Four of the losses were to 9-man teams that were ranked in the top ten or qualified for the State Semi-finals. The other loss was an 11-man game versus I-Falls. North Woods was able to advance to the section semifinals where they lost at Cook County.

2019 will be the beginning of a new era at North Woods. The Grizzlies will be playing 11-man football. Numbers in the upper grades will be smaller than in the recent past, but numbers in the lower grades look promising. North Woods hopes to build a solid 1A program and remain a competitive football program.

### **Metro East**

Woodbury won its first conference or sub-district championship with a 5-1 (9-2) Metro East record. The school, which opened play in 1975, also made its third trip to the state tournament all-time. The Royals were led by Metro East Defensive Most Valuable Player Joe Rossebo who terrorized offenses racking up 11 tackles for loss for the sub-district's top-ranked defense. Woodbury yielded just 195 yards and 17 points per game, aided by all district defensive perfomers Jenaro Wathum-Ocama, Raphael Orubo, and Cole Smutny. Offensively, the Royals led the league in rushing yards featuring Brock Rinehart (505 yards), Andrew Kraemer (298), and Jake Wenzel (278), anchored by offensive lineman Braden Prestholdt. A trio of three-year performers on special teams, including Cade Keesling (kicking 42 points), Drew Pearson (127 punt return yards), and Kraemer (32.5 yards per kickoff return) rounded out the first place finish. The Royals fell in the State 6A Quarterfinals to Lakeville South.

The Royals district rival, East Ridge, finished 4-2 in the sub-district with an overall record of 6-4. The Raptors had the top offense in the conference with 432 yards per game, almost 100 more per game then the next best offense. Metro East Offensive Player of the Year Zach Zebrowski completed 185 of 307 attempts (60.3%) for 2,410 yards, 17 touchdowns, and eight interceptions en route to a pile of school records. His favorite target, Simon Start, also led the league, nabbing 80 receptions for 976 yards and six touchdowns, while Alex Larson and Cam Ashford tallied nearly 1,000 yards combined in the regular season. Defensively, standout

linebacker Jack Mohler paced the defense. East Ridge advanced to the section championship game before losing to Eastview at home.

Also 4-2 in the Metro East was Cretin Derham Hall, who also finished 6-4 overall. CDH had league-leading running back Tony Underwood. The junior rushed 174 times for 931 yards and six touchdowns through eight games. The Raiders also had the second best passing attack in the Metro East behind second year starter Danny Callahan. The senior threw for 1,377 yards and 18 touchdowns with eight interceptions. His most reliable receiver was Gopher-commit Peter Udoibok who averaged 16.7 yards per catch with six touchdowns. The O-line was paced by Metro East Lineman of the Year Sam Harris. The Raiders lost in the first round of the playoffs at home to Lakeville South.

Mounds View finished 3-3 featuring wins against St. Michael-Albertville and East Ridge. The Mustangs had a stout defense led by all-Metro East performers Rowan Morgan (11 tackles for loss),

Chase and Charles Dressel, Nate Farm (four interceptions), and Ben Kettelhut (five interceptions). Mounds View surrendered just 243 yards and 15 points per game while creating a sub-district best 23 turnovers in eight games. MV finished 6-4, defeated by Eden Prairie in the section championship game.

White Bear Lake ended its 19-game losing streak with a 28-27 victory over Centennial to start the 2018 season. It was the Bears' first win since October 9, 2015 and a springboard to a .500 regular season. WBL boasted a big offensive line, led by Luke Parzyck and Zach Claussen who paved the way for Zach Griebel's 407 yards and eight touchdowns. They also protected Cooper Anderson who threw for 1,206 yards and 12 touchdowns. The season ended for the Bears in the first round at Maple Grove.

Roseville earned wins in its first two weeks against Anoka and gave Metro East Champion Woodbury its only regular season loss, 27-7, at Royal Stadium. They also edged Mounds View 10-7. Led by the second best offense and the third best defense, the Raiders record was deceiving losing three sub-district games by nine total points. Roseville ran the ball effectively (1,374 yards) with Brenden McMillan (5.1 yards per carry) and prevented opponents from doing the same (579 yards) behind Metro East Defensive Lineman of the Year Christen Hurt. Roseville's season ended at St. Michael-Albertville in the first round, finishing 3-6 overall.

Stillwater earned two wins in 2018, each coming down to the final play. The Ponies came back from 13 points down in the fourth quarter to edge Roseville and survived a last second goaline stand to shutout St. Michael-Albertville. The Ponies were led by the second leading receiver Cooper Yeary with 614 yards and five touchdowns and defensive lineman Will Gleason who racked up nine tackles for loss. Stillwater lost 7-0 at Rosemount in the first round of the playoffs.

In 2017, the Metro East struggled in non-district play primarily against the Metro North with a record of just 3-11. The district played the same schedule but flipped that trend in 2018 going 10-4. The four defeats were at the hands of Blaine and Champlin Park.

Metro East totaled six players who competed in the Minnesota Football Coaches Association All Star Game, including Nate Farm and Rowan Morgan (Mounds View), Christen Hurt (Roseville), and Luke Parzyck (White Bear Lake) on the North team. The South roster included Jack Mohler and Simon Stark (East Ridge), Joe Rossebo (Woodbury), and Peter Udoibok (Cretin-Derham Hall).

Cretin Derham Hall Head Football Coach Brooks Bollinger stepped down after three seasons. He is replaced by 2003 Raider alum Chuck Miesbauer who recently served as Head Football Coach at Presentation College for two years. Miesbauer was a Raider assistant from 2008-2009.

Finally, we are proud of the Metro East's White Bear Lake Head Football Coach Ryan Bartlett who Tackled Cancer in 2018. Bartlett battled his treatments with cancer while coaching his players in off-season and season workouts, practices, and games. Congratulations Coach Bartlett and the White Bear Lake community!

### **East Central South**

The East Central South Division had co-champions in 2018, Congratulations to both Annandale and Dassel-Cokato. Both teams finished 5 -1 in the division and finished 7 – 1 overall. Congratulations to Matt Walter of Annandale and Ryan Weinandt of Dassel-Cokato were named co-head coaches of the year. Assistant coaches of the year were Mark Kovall of Annandale and Patrick Schuette of Dassel-Cokato.

It was another great year for the South Division. Competition was well-played and made for very entertaining games throughout the year for the fans. Congratulations to Annandale for qualifying for the state tournament. They fell to Pierz in the first round. Fans will be out some great rivalry games next year though, with Delano being moved out of the district and replaced with Princeton. Princeton will be in the north division and New London Spicer is being moved from the north to the south for the


#### 8. Benson Braves



### **Academic All-State Football Team Concept**

**Purpose of Awards** – To promote and recognize academic achievement by Minnesota high school football teams in each classification.

**Proposal** – Team academic recognitions in each class will be awarded based on the following standards and procedures.

### Criteria

**GOLD AWARDS:** A team must have a GPA of 3.26 or above for the past school year for their whole home official roster. (NO FRESHMAN) **SILVER AWARDS:** A team must have a GPA of 3.0 - 3.25 for the past school year for their whole home official roster. (NO FRESHMAN)

### **Guidelines and Procedures**

- \* The teams and awards from each class will be chosen by the Academic All-State Team Committee.
- \* A team must use all members on their official home roster in determining the team GPA. (may include Grades 10-12, no freshmen for small schools.)
- \* Each player's name and GPA must be recorded and sent to the class representative.
- \* A 4.00 system will be used and 4.00 will be the highest grade possible. No weighted grades.

- \* Grades will be rounded to two decimal points.
- \* Grades will be from the past full school year. No summer school or current fall grades should be included.
- \* Individual GPA's will be added together and divided by the number of team members to determine the team GPA. The team GPA must be included on the entry form.
- \* A school official (principal, councilor, etc.) must sign the form.
- \* To be eligible for the team academic awards, the head coach must be a current member of the MHSFCA.
- \* Forms must be submitted to the class representatives by November 1st and award winners must be submitted to the committee by November 8th.

### **INDIVIDUAL**

### **Academic All-State Football - Player Guidelines and Procedures**

A review of the Minnesota State Football Coaches Association's basic requirement for the team are:

- 1) Must be a senior varsity letterman for the current season who is a starter on either offense, defense or kicker.
- 2) The player must have outstanding football and leadership ability plus academic excellence.
- 3) Player must carry a 3.0 (4.0 scale) grade-point average in an academic core curriculum in his sophomore, junior and first quarter of the senior year.
- 4) Player shall not have any Minnesota State League eligibility penalties or infractions during his high school career.
- Each class will select a team consisting of the number stated below:

9-Man=13	3A=16	6A=19
1A=14	4A=17	
2A=15	5A=18	

- 6) The teams will not be selected by position, but the committee will select the top football players of each class who meet the criteria stated above.
- 7) The Coach submitting the player application must be a member of the Minnesota State Football Coaches Association.

### **Guidelines & Procedures:**

- 1) All applications should be typed or printed with correct names and data.
- 2) The selection committee must have a good summary of

- not only the player's academic record, but the player's football accomplishments.
- 3) If the first quarter grades are not out for the applicant's senior year, his first quarter senior subjects must be listed.
- 4) All applications must be sent to your class academic team representative. If you have any problems, contact your class representative first. Please check the time deadlines on the application form.

Remember: This is your state's FOOTBALL COACHES ASSOCIATION'S endeavor.

The Cadets held a slim 3-0 lead in the second half before star RB Jason Willamson broke the game open for the Huskies with two long TD runs.


