Is it possible that this ugly pandemic might give us reasons to say "thanks?" Well, yes - in a way. As Commissioner, I would like to suggest that the members of the Arizona Region and their families might want to consider taking a moment to do just that.

It was one year ago that everything changed. The pandemic was real and the United States was going to have to find a way to deal with it. Different countries took different approaches but one year ago it became obvious that life as we knew it, would not continue for the immediate future. It seemed like almost all activity was impacted in one way or another and volleyball in the Arizona Region was no exception.

Over the past year, many people associated with the Arizona Region have been impacted by COVID-19. Sure, everyone who wanted to continue to play volleyball was affected. Unlike many Regions in USA Volleyball, the Arizona Region was fortunate because we were able to find ways to bounce back after the summer with a Boys' season, a Girls' season and an Adult season. We will even host the High Performance Championships in Phoenix this summer so, from my perspective, there are plenty of reasons to say "thanks." From a Region perspective, I think it is important to say thank you to a number of people for their efforts over the course of the last year. Please consider saying "thanks" in some way to the following people:

Becky Hudson – Becky's efforts as the Region Office Manager over the years are the primary reason the Region was not devastated financially like so many other Regions. Becky has done an exceptional job when it comes to the finances of the Region. She has made sure that the Board is always aware of the revenues and expenses the Region is facing. Her watchful eye has helped the Region keep costs as low as possible, to gradually build up a small emergency reserve fund (that helped us throughout pandemic) and to enable to Region to always pay our debts. The net result is that the Arizona Region was able to offer volleyball when other entities were either unable to do so or only able to offer them at much higher prices. Equally important, Becky has made it a point to stay current on the protocols, rules and regulations in relation to COVID-19 and shared that knowledge with our Social Media Director so the membership could stay current. Even though the pandemic landscape constantly changes, she has done a remarkable job staying in contact with facility owners, Region staff and officials as well as club directors to make sure the Region can continue to function. She deserves your "thanks."

Lisa Naughton – Lisa is the Arizona Region Registrar and she has been a stabilizing force throughout the pandemic. Lisa has been in her office throughout the pandemic answering the phone and responding to questions, concerns and complaints. As if the pandemic wasn't enough, Lisa was forced to deal with the daily frustration of a new Member Management System through Sports Engine. Unfortunately, USA Volleyball made the decision to go with this new system before it was fully functioning and Lisa has been at the forefront attempting to learn everything she needs to do her job and to answer all of the questions that club directors, coaches, and parents ask her on a daily basis. Sports Engine is still making changes and Lisa's job is no easier today than it was one year ago. As if that isn't enough, Lisa has put her own health and the health of her family on the line almost every weekend working as a Site Director. The next time you see her, please tell her "thanks."

Eric Hodgson - Another unsung hero in the Arizona Region Office, Eric is the Outreach Director for the Region. Eric took it upon himself to create Webinars this past year so coaches and club directors could continue to learn and grow when traditional clinics were no longer available. Over the years, he has traveled all over the state to bring volleyball clinics, camps, and information to anyone who wants it. He has contacts everywhere and when the pandemic hit the state, he was already reaching out to our friends and members on the reservation up north to provide assistance. On his own, Eric helped organize efforts to bring food, water and needed supplies to people who desperately needed it. Without notoriety or funding, Eric has continued to stay in touch and to promote volleyball for the disabled community as well as working to set up alternative clinics and/or leagues for low income and underprivileged areas in the state. Lance Johnson – As the Tournament Scheduler, IT expert, and Site Director, Lance has spent untold hours during the pandemic to develop a Region program that allows coaches, club directors, parents and spectators to keep track of how their teams are doing during the tournament weekend. Lance's efforts have saved the Region (and clubs) significant money that would have been spent to provide the same service from an outside provider. And, as the Site Director for our events at Court One, Lance has done an amazing job working with those in attendance to ensure that rules, policies, and protocols are followed so Court One can keep its doors open for both practice and tournaments. Lance deserves a word of "thanks," too.

Jen Barber – Jen is a fairly recent addition to the Arizona Region Staff but she has been instrumental in making sure all relevant news is made available to our members on Facebook, Twitter and Instagram. As the Social Media Director, Jen is always ready to post messages of recent changes, messages of thanks, and messages of general interest to the membership. With people looking for information from a variety of sources in recent years, the Region Staff could not keep pace until we hired Jen. Her skills in Social Media have helped the Region keep our membership up to date on any and all information in the Region that impacts them. Earl Capps – Despite having an intense full-time job, Earl has done an incredible job as the Officials Division Coordinator during the pandemic. For a variety of reasons, many officials were not available to work tournaments. Somehow, Earl managed to find and schedule officials for as many sites as possible. Through Earl's leadership, some new innovative ideas are being discussed to recruit new officials and to find new ways to make life better for our current officials. Few people realize how much work goes into the position so Earl rarely gets the thanks he deserves. He's too modest to take credit but, nevertheless, please say "thanks" to Earl next time you see him.

Ron Pelham – Ron has the title of Adult Division Coordinator and High Performance Director but the work he does for the Region extends far beyond those titles. From his home in Tucson, Ron has reached out to the community colleges and adults to find out what kinds of volleyball opportunities they would like the Region to offer during the pandemic. Ron remained flexible and very willing to do whatever it took to create a potential fall league for community colleges as well as alternative tournaments for adults. Along with Bill Lang, Ron was instrumental in putting together the Copper State Challenge on President's Day weekend. Ron never hesitates to volunteer to help out in the office even though it means driving up from Tucson to do so. Throughout the pandemic, Ron has continued to stay in touch with a variety of people at the National Office with respect to the HP Program, the Officials Division and for all things related to Beach. Ron is another one of our Region people who has been at most tournaments working in a variety of capacities to make sure players have a safe and competitive volleyball experience. Cindy Kirk – In addition to having her hands full as a full-time teacher, club coach and the Region SafeSport Director, Cindy stepped up and ran for the Junior Division Coordinator position right before the pandemic hit. Her calm demeanor and organizational skills have enabled the junior seasons to go on with very little disruption. Private facility owners – Many of our members have never met the people who own the two private facilities we use every week but the owners deserve to be acknowledged for their efforts and their willingness to work with the Region to keep their facilities open and provide safe and welcoming environments. Even though the pandemic protocols prevented the Region from allowing the same number of spectators we normally have at tournaments, it is important for everyone to know how hard the owners worked to make sure their facilities were in compliance with the protocols issued by federal, state, and local governments. During the past year, the owners have graciously kept the lines of communication open and worked cooperatively with the Region to provide consistently reliable places for our members to play. Whether you know them by name and/or face, I would encourage you to say "thanks" to them and to their employees or representatives. # Navigating Our New Normal ...

Many people would have bet against the Arizona Region reaching the end of the Spring season of 2021 intact. Rising COVID numbers in Arizona and shut downs across the country were the topics of discussion in January when the Girls' season was just getting off the ground. April 2021 and the numbers are down, restrictions are being lifted statewide and the season end is in sight.



The Arizona Region Board of Directors made a decision early on that we wanted to provide an opportunity for the players to get back on the court as safely as possible. It was as much a mental health issue for us as it was a virus issue BUT we still had to take into account there was a virus trying its best to keep us from playing.

The COVID waiver and release of liability form was created, reduced spectators and mask protocols were put in place, wristbands and team referee packets were purchased and BallerTV (Sporfie and Profile Sports, too) was brought in to allow those that could not physically come to tournaments the ability to watch their sons and daughters play. It was not ideal but it allowed the athletes the ability to play again. It was what we could do in the middle of a pandemic.

Schools are opening up. Vaccination roll outs began and are continuing. State and local governmental oversight is being rolled back. Email messages from parents are arriving in increasing numbers every day for us to take off the masks and open the doors. We would love to—but we can't just yet.

We want to thank all the parents, coaches, officials and players for their cooperation as we move through the process of restrictions within the opportunity to play to back to whatever our new normal will be. It was not easy for anyone.

With the mask and occupancy restrictions by the state allowed to expire and the city oversight being rolled back some level of relaxation can begin. The Arizona Region is in constant contact with our facility owners and other tournament site hosts regarding all of the protocols for moving forward. The businesses are now the ones that need to control the situations in their own facilities. Many areas are opening up faster than others. Many businesses and schools are more comfortable with the roll back than others. Since we operate in multiple counties, facility types and schools we had to come to a working arrangement that we can all live with. Spring breaks ended just as these restrictions were allowed to expire. Not enough time has elapsed to know if that will affect the spread of the virus in our state.

With that said and as qualifiers are just getting underway and our season end just 5 weeks away, the AZ Region policy that will remain in effect through the end of the season will continue to be restricted spectators – 3 spectators per team in the building at any one time so social distancing can be accomplished. Wristbands must be worn by all adults in the building – coaches and spectators alike. The wristbands may be switched out by parents to allow different spectators for each match. Masks covering the nose and mouth will be required by everyone – coaches, players, spectators, staff and officials. As the climate heats up and the numbers continue to

fall, the mask requirement of players on the court may loosen up, BUT there are no promises being made with that – it will depend on the cooperation of everyone to end this virus. These same restrictions will be the requirements at National Qualifiers and Junior Nationals as our teams begin to travel to other states to compete.

Our end goal is to get through the rest of the season intact with as few teams as possible sitting out due to COVID invading their team. Next season we hope to be back to our normal.

#### **VBScorekeeper Developed for Tournament Ease**

Welcome to www.VBScrorekeeper.com, a simple phase completes. site that allows club directors, coaches, players, parents, and spectators to view team schedules and results for the individual AZ Region tournaments.

Due to COVID restrictions, there was a desire for everyone to be able to see results online as near to real time as possible. Costs and scheduling challenges led us to quickly create our own system.

While we are not yet displaying the information in an eye-pleasing format, most everything that you would want is available. Results with scores are shown as soon as we are able to enter them into the system. Teams are automatically advanced to their next matches and working assignments. Pool results and tie-breakers are automatically determined and displayed. There is no need to wait until they are manually published on the region website.

After choosing the tournament (ordered by newest to oldest) in the top dropdown, there are seven basic functions: Club View, Team View, Pool View, Seeds, Places, Pool Schedule, and Pool Results. All of these functions are separate and you can execute them by using the specific dropdown or button.

The Club View is most useful to club directors. With this dropdown, you can pick any club participating in the tournament. VBScorekeeper will then display all known matches, schedules, and results for each team in the chosen club.

The Team View is a quick method to view all known matches, schedules, results, and working schedules for an individual team. This is especially useful for multiple-day tournaments such as the AZ National Club Qualifiers (NCQs). VBScorekeeper displays the results of all that team's matches from each pool and bracket in which they participated.

The Pool View is probably the most useful for teams and spectators on tournament day. This view shows all matches in that specific pool. If the teams in a match are not yet determined, VBScorekeeper shows where they will come from; usually the winner or loser from a previous match in the same pool. After all the matches, VBScorekeeper displays the results of the pool as it is completed.

The first button below the three View dropdowns, Show Seeds, shows the starting seed positions for each division playing in the tournament. If the tournament has multiple phases (such as the AZ NCQs), it info@xcelsiortechnology.com will display a seed list for each phase as the previous

The second button, Show Places, shows the final positions as the tournament completes. This is especially useful during the early-season seeding tournaments and AZ NCQs where teams are snake seeded into pools. It can be very difficult to follow where



teams end up the seeding order after finishing pool play.

The third button, Pool Schedule, show the basic schedule of the tournament. This is almost the exact same thing shown on the AZ Region site schedule. It will show you all the pools, the teams in the pool, their chosen site, and the wave (AM/PM) or time that the pools start.

The final button, Pool Results, populates as the pools complete. As with Pool Schedule, this is almost the exact same thing shown on the AZ Region site results. However, these are available as soon as we are able to enter the match and pool results versus having to manually update the AZ Region site.

While rewarding, development of VBScorekeeper has been challenging due constant updating as the season progressed. You can equate it to having to rebuild the wings of a plane while flying it. Most of the work is behind the scenes with the software that schedules and updates the matches. For example, VBScorekeeper has to allow scheduling to various locations and times, it has to group teams and move them from one tournament to the next, it has to update pools instantly with a different format when a team does not show up to play, it must be able to correct mistaken results that were previously entered, etc.

Human error is always a potential problem. Either the scores are recorded incorrectly on score sheets, the bracket sheets, or in VBScorekeeper. If you every find that we made a mistake, please contact us to let us know. We will correct it. If you have any suggestions or functionality that you would like added to VBScorekeeper, please contact us and let us know.

We hope that you find VBScorekeeper useful as we continually work to make it better on both the front and back ends.

### A Region Spotlight On JR Salima By Harold Cranswick- Commissioner

Some people have seen him. Others have talked to him but haven't met him. Still others knew he headed up their Division for several years but didn't really get to know him. And yet, even though he is not well known, he has been a crucial member of the Arizona Region for many years.

Let me introduce you to Mr. Salima. JR (as he affectionately known) joined the Arizona Region and worked as an official for many years earning his National Referee rating in the process. When the Officials' Division Coordinator, Mr. Peter Meyer, decided it was time to retire, JR stepped up and took on the task of trying to fill Peter's shoes as the Officials' Division Coordinator. As the Region grew, JR knew it would be impossible for one person to run the Division like Peter used to do. JR took little time to analyze the Officials' Division and reorganized the Division to enable more officials to learn about the complexities of the Division and to participate in the decision-making. The new structure enabled the Region to recruit, train and assign more officials to deal with the ever-increasing size of the Region. To his credit, JR masterfully employed the idea of delegating duties to other officials. JR retired from the position a couple of years ago but the structure that he implemented is still in use today.

As much as the members of the Region have appreciated JR's work as the Officials' Division Coordinator, that role may not have been his greatest contribution to the Region. Anyone who has been involved with or associated with the Region for more than one tournament knows that there are always comments and/or complaints that are sent to the Region Office. The comments and complaints cover everything from mild, constructive criticism to angry, nasty comments to serious legal allegations. For many years, the Region relied on the willingness of a single member to step up and take on the task of dealing with these complaints. For a variety of reasons, some complaints were handled very well and others weren't. There were times when the Region would hear through the grapevine that "it doesn't pay to complain to the Region because it doesn't do anything."



As a result of comments like that, the Region knew that, with continued growth, things were

not going to get better without serious action. It was at that point, that JR heard the call and stepped up again. Between his years of service in the Mesa Police Department and his work with his church, JR was the ideal candidate and, fortunately, he was willing to take on the role of Ethics and Compliance Officer (ECO). Since taking the job, JR has responded to and investigated (when appropriate) every complaint that has been sent to the Region. In other cases, particularly those that involve serious allegations, JR has spent untold hours conducting investigations to make sure the complaint or allegation is handled in an objective and professional manner that allows all parties to be heard. As part of his job as ECO, JR works closely with our SafeSport Director, Cindy Kirk, to make sure the Region and our members comply with all aspects of SafeSport as well as all applicable laws and that any violations are dealt with according to policy.

Even though last year's season was cut short and this year has seen fewer teams, JR has still been kept busy as the Ethics and Compliance Officer. Few people will know what JR goes through to handle the variety of cases that come his way but, in every case, he is objective, thorough and fair. Life has been a bit challenging for JR in recent years and yet, through it all, he remains committed and loyal to the Region and does a masterful job as our ECO. In addition, JR is always ready and willing to provide the Region with guidance when it comes to developing protocols that ensure the safety of our players, officials, staff and spectators. The Region is very, very fortunate to have him in this position. Whether you know JR from his time as an official or you met him as the Ethics and Compliance Officer or you happened to see him walking through a gym with his new companion, lggy Lou, please approach the two of them and let JR know how much you appreciate the good work he has done and continues to do for the Arizona Region.

### **Region Championships Ahead– Not Your Ordinary Tournaments**

The Arizona Region will begin its Region Championships tournaments starting April 18th with the Open 18's, April 24th for the 15-18's Club and Championship divisions, May 1st for all 12's and the Open 15-17's teams and May 8th for all 13-14's teams.

Teams that are late to a site hold up an already very long day.

Medals will be awarded to the top three finishers in each age division and overall level of play.

As of this writing, the COVID restrictions will be in place. Please check your site to see if they have any changes in these restrictions. It IS possible you may go to a site in the morning and the afternoon site may have different COVID restrictions. We urge that athletes, coaches and parents continue to follow these safety protocols for the remainder of their Region Championships day. We have 4 weeks of Region Championships.

We don't want to cause site issues for the age groups that play in the later weeks. Thank you for your cooperation as we get ALL THE WAY through this season.





# **AZ Region Junior Beach Program Starts Year 20!**

The Arizona Region's Junior Beach Program heads into year 20 with tournaments beginning the week of May 4th.

Tournaments will be held most Tuesdays, Thursdays and Sundays by age group(s). They will begin promptly at 6 pm. Sundays were added 5 years ago to keep up with the growth of the program.

Players will be awarded points on their finish and how many teams were in their age division. These points are calculated by PLAYER, not team, so players can play with multiple partners throughout the season if they so wish.

The program is "call your own" where players will call and score keep their own matches. Parents and coaches are not allowed on the sand and are asked to not interfere with play. A tournament director is on site to handle any disputes that may arise.

The cost of the program has been the same for 20 years. It is a \$20 program fee paid once upon registration and then each tournament is \$10 per player. Players MUST be registered with USA Volleyball to participate and if not, will need to purchase a summer membership to play at a cost of \$15.

Medals are awarded for first and second place at each tournament. Boy's are encouraged to come out and bring friends. This season the Region will continue it's Mother's Day and Father's Day tournaments and have added, by popular demand, two Coed tournaments.

The registration and schedule are on the Region's website. Registration will need to be done through your SportsEngine account.

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### 20 Years Ago This Summer, the Region Hit the Beach!

It was the year the Arizona Diamondbacks shocked the world and upset the Yankees for their only World Series Championship.

It was sadly the year terrorists flew planes into buildings and put fear in our National consciousness.

And it would be another 6 years before society would forever be altered by an invention called the iPhone.

Yet, in what was at the time a remote trek into the desert, the Arizona Region partnered up with Victory Lanes Sports Park in north Phoenix in the summer of 2001. It was partially owned by 1983 Indy 500 winner Tom Sneva, thus the name. As partners, the program set out the idea of letting kids come out and play, with no officials, coaches or parents necessary, and learn through trial and error how to play this difficult sport.



The creativity and fun it provides can be a stark contrast to an athlete's indoor experience and many athletes flocked to the 8 lighted sand courts at Victory Lanes for that exact reason.

Later on, Victory Lanes was sold to Mike Krueger who welcomed youth sports and the partnership. "The Arizona Region and staff have run a great sand program at Victory Lanes, helping lots of kids. We love and need youth activities. The interest in sand play grew

locally because of these programs and moved the sport into the schools."

Betsi Metter, now Betsi Flint, started playing in the program at age 11. It was an hour plus drive from Ahwatukee to the park, but she fell in love with the sport.

Betsi and her partner Anna Gott became one of the staples of the program and Anna's father Kent would drive them, take pictures of the kids playing and got many more boys playing along with his son Andrew. Mr. Gott passed away recently but he is fondly remembered for his contribution to the program.

Betsi had a stellar indoor collegiate career,

transitioned to the beach and has won several AVP and FIVB tournaments.

"Arizona Region beach volleyball really helped me grow into the player I am today. Starting from my very worst, as a

beginner and losing a lot, to developing me into the player that won often because of weekly tournaments in multiple age divisions I was able to play in. I was able to learn the skill of how to win and I'm so grateful I had the opportunity at a young age to learn this amazing sport."

Betsi has crossed paths with another of the program's alum, Sarah Sponcil who is currently third in a two team race for a spot in the Tokyo Olympics. Sarah started playing with her older sister and developed a passion and competitiveness that serves her well as a professional player today.

It gave me the opportunity to go out every Tuesday and Thursday with my friends in the summers and learn this beautiful game. It's absolutely incredible to see how far and how fast the game of beach volleyball has grown in Arizona since then and I'm stoked to see where it goes in the next 20 years!"

For some it was a respite from the rigors of indoor and with no coaches or parents, a chance to just play with friends.
