TODAY'S GAME

The U.S. meets Canada here today in the gold-medal game of the 2019 Para Ice Hockey World Championship. Puck drop at Ostravar Arena is set for 4:30 p.m. local time (10:30 a.m. ET). The game will be broadcast live in the U.S. on the Olympic Channel and aired on NBCSN on tape-delay at 5:30 p.m. ET.

This is the seventh season meeting between the two teams, with the U.S. owning a 5-1 record. The last three world championships have featured the two teams in the gold-medal game, with Team USA winning once (2015) and Canada twice (2013, 2017).

TALKING POINTS

SERIES VS. CANADA

Since the 2014-15 season, the two teams have met 24 times, with the U.S. posting a 16-3-1-4 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record. All-time, the teams have met on 96 occasions with Team USA holding a 30-10-8-47-1 (W-OTW-OTL-L-T). Combined, the two teams have captured the last six world championship and last five Paralympic titles.

TITLE GAME REGULARS

Dating back to the 2015 IPC Sled Hockey World Championship, the United States and Canada have now met in the championship game of eight consecutive international tournaments. The U.S. holds a 7-1 advantage, with its lone loss coming in the 2017 Para Ice Hockey World Championship.

A year ago, the U.S. came from behind in dramatic fashion to capture the gold medal at the 2018 Paralympic Winter Games with a 2-1 overtime win. **Declan Farmer** scored the game-tying goal with 37.8 seconds left in regulation and tallied the golden goal 3:30 into overtime.

Since 2009, when the U.S. captured its first world championship gold medal here in Ostrava, Team USA has now reached nine consecutive gold-medal game berths at the Paralympic and World Championship level. In those appearances, the U.S. has posted a 6-2 record while claiming three Paralympic gold medals (2010, 2014, 2018) and three world championship gold medals (2009, 2012, 2015). Its two losses came in world championship play (2013, 2017). For the 2017 game summary, see page 3.

FINAL SKATE OF 2018-19

Today's game is the final game of the 2018-19 season for the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team. Through 11 games this season, the U.S. holds an overall record of 10-0-0-1 (W-OTW-OTL-L). For a game-by-game summary, including boxscores of this tournament's four U.S. games, see page 6.

Including its 11 games this season, the U.S. holds a 53-4-1-4 (W-OTW-OTL-L) record over the last four seasons. Those 53 wins include a Paralympic gold (2018), two world championship medals (gold - 2015, silver - 2017), five-straight Para Hockey Cups (2015, 2016 (Jan.), 2016 (Dec.), 2017, 2018), the 2016 IPC Pan-Pacific Championship and the 2018 Turin Para Ice Hockey International Tournament.

U.S. TOURNAMENT RECAP

The U.S. skated with a perfect 3-0 record in Group A. It opened with a 3-1 victory over rival Canada on April 27 before blanking South Korea, 4-0, the following day to clinch Group A. With a semifinal berth secured, the U.S. closed group play with a 10-0 victory over Norway. In yesterday's semifinal bout against the host Czech Republic, the U.S. skated to a 10-2 victory.

U.S. AMONG TOURNAMENT'S BEST

Team USA enters today's gold-medal contest ranking first overall in six statistical categories, including powerplay efficiency (57.14%), penalty kill (100.00%), goals-against-average (0.75), save percentage (.885%), shorthanded goals (3) and a tournament-low seven penalties taken. Additionally, Team USA's 27 goals for is second to only Canada's 29.

Among players, **Declan Farmer** leads the tournament in faceoff efficiency (73.5%), sits second in points with 12 (6-6), fourth in goals (6) and tied for second in assists (6). **Jack Wallace** is tied for the tournament lead with seven goals while **Steve Cash** is third in goals-against average (1.13).

LEADING TEAM USA

David Hoff, USA Hockey's Northern Plains District Coach-In-Chief and assistant coach of last year's gold medal-winning 2018 U.S. Paralympic Sled Hockey Team, is in his first season as head coach of the 2018-19 U.S. National Sled Hockey Team. This will be Hoff's third season with Team USA after making his debut in the 2016-17 season.

Josh Pauls, who has helped the U.S. capture the gold medal in the last three Paralympic Winter Games (2010, 2014, 2018), is serving as captain of the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team. In addition, two-time Paralympic gold medalists (2014, 2018) **Declan Farmer** and **Rico Roman** have been named alternate captains.

Pauls begins his 11th season with the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team and his second as team captain while Farmer is entering his seventh season with the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team and his second as an alternate captain. A Purple Heart recipient and U.S. Army Veteran, Roman is serving as an alternate captain for the first time as he begins his eighth season with Team USA.

Declan Farmer scored twice, **Steve Cash** made 10 saves and **Noah Grove** registered the game-winning goal to earn Player of the Game honors. The win marks Team USA's 32nd victory in 49 world championship games. Farmer's two goals push his U.S. tournament records to 24 goals and 34 points while the win was Cash' 25th across seven world championships.

Captain **Josh Pauls** registered three assists and four different U.S. players scored to lead the United States past South Korea, 4-0, for its second win at the 2019 Para Ice Hockey World Championship here at Ostravar Arena. **Jack Wallace**, **Brody Roybal**, **Declan Farmer** and **Noah Grove** all tallied in the win.

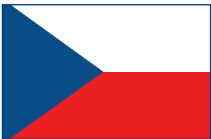


LAST MEETING: 2019 WORLDS - USA 10, NOR 0

Luke McDermott (Westerlo, N.Y.), **Rico Roman** (Portland, Ore.) and **Declan Farmer** (Tampa, Fla.) each tallied three points to lead the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team past Norway, 10-0, to close preliminary round play. A total of nine different U.S. players scored and 14 different players tallied at least one point.

LAST MEETING: 2019 WORLDS - USA 10, CZE 2

Jack Wallace scored five goals and **Declan Farmer** added five points as the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team defeated the Czech Republic, 10-2, to advance to the gold-medal game. Wallace's five goals established a new U.S. record for most goals by a player in a single game in tournament play.

FIFTH-PLACE



LAST APPEARANCE: 2000 SWC - USA 0, EST 4

The U.S. suffered a 4-0 defeat to Estonia to finish sixth in Salt Lake City, Utah. The United States hosted its first-ever IPC Sled Hockey World Championship in preparation for the 2002 Salt Lake City Paralympic Winter Games, where the U.S. would claim its first-ever Paralympic gold medal.

BRONZE-MEDAL



LAST APPEARANCE: 2008 SWC - USA 3, JPN 1

On home ice in Marlborough, Massachusetts, the United States skated to a 3-1 victory to earn its second-ever medal in tournament play. **Jimmy Connelly** opened the scoring before **Alexi Salamone** tallied a pair of goals to help lead the U.S. to victory.

GOLD-MEDAL



LAST APPEARANCE: 2017 SWC - USA 1, CAN 4

The U.S. reached its fifth straight world championship gold-medal game but fell to Canada, 4-1, to earn the silver medal at the 2017 Para Sled Hockey World Championship in Gangneung, South Korea. The loss was Team USA's only defeat of the season

All-Time Gold-Medal Game Record: 3-3

2019 GROUPS

The 2019 tournament features a new format that places the top four teams in the world rankings forming Group A and the next four in Group B. The top two finishers from Group A will earn a quarterfinal bye to the semifinals. The third-place finisher in Group A will face the second-place finisher in Group B while the other quarterfinal game will place Group A's fourth-place team against Group B's top finisher.

2018-19 SEASON OVERVIEW

Team USA's 2018-19 campaign started last July, with the 17-player U.S. roster selected following tryouts. In December, the U.S. opened international play at the 2019 Para Hockey Cup in London, Ontario where it skated to a perfect 5-0 record to capture its fifth-straight title in the event. In March, the U.S. hosted Canada for a two-game series in Indian Trail, North Carolina, that resulted in the both teams each claiming one win.

Team USA's season leaders include forwards **Declan Farmer** and **Brody Roybal**, who respectively hold 28 (15g-13a) and 21 (7-14) points through 11 games apiece this season. Farmer's goals and points totals lead all U.S. skaters as does Roybal's assists. In goal, **Steve Cash** has a perfect 7-0 (W-L) record, including all five U.S. wins over Canada.

2019 SLED SERIES GAME-BY-GAME

GAME 1: USA 3, CANADA 4

Brody Roybal registered a goal and an assist and five other players tallied a point but the U.S. fell to Canada, 4-3, in its first game of the 2019 Sled Series in Indian Trail, North Carolina. The loss was Team USA's first of the season.

GAME 2: USA 4, CANADA 1

Josh Pauls and **Declan Farmer** each posted a goal and an assist to lead the United States past Canada, 4-1, to close the 2019 Sled Series with its sixth victory of the season.

2018 PARA HOCKEY CUP GAME-BY-GAME

The U.S. blanked Canada, 3-0, as **Declan Farmer**, **Kyle Zych** and **Rico Roman** all scored in the win. Goaltender **Steve Cash** made nine save to secure the shutout.

Brody Roybal and **Declan Farmer** each tallied five points and 10 other players collected at least one point to lead the Team USA past South Korea, 8-0.

GAME 5: USA 5, CANADA 4 (CHAMPIONSHIP)

A back-and-forth affair culminated in the United States capturing a thrilling 5-4 title victory. **Jack Wallace** had two goals and an assist, **Josh Sweeney** added two helpers and **Steve Cash** turned aside seven shots in the victory.

TEAM USA'S TIME IN THE CZECH REPUBLIC

Team USA's time in the Czech Republic started on Monday, April 23, with players and staff traveling overnight to Vienna, Austria, where the U.S. players and staff boarded a bus for a 3-hour trip to Ostrava. The last time the U.S. was in the Czech Republic, it reached the gold-medal game at the 2009 world championship, where Andy Yohe tallied the decisive goal with 11 seconds to play to give the U.S. its first-ever world championship title.

Last Wednesday, during the team's second off-day of the tournament, Team USA took a three-hour train to visit Prague. Nicknamed "the City of a Hundred Spires," the team dispersed throughout the city to explore Old Town Square, the medieval Astronomical Clock, Charles Bridge and St. Vitus Cathedral.

SINGLE-SEASON, CAREER RECORDS KEEP RISING

Forward **Declan Farmer** has a point in every game this season and leads the team with 28 points (15-13) in 11 games. His 28 points currently rank sixth-most ever by a U.S. player in a single season. Farmer and **Brody Roybal** hold four of the top-five ever single-season performances. Last season, Roybal set a U.S. record of 48 points (26-22) while Farmer set the second-best ever performance with 41 points (24-17).

Kevin McKee this season became the fourth U.S. player ever to eclipse the 100-point mark in their career, currently sitting at 103 (40-63). Only Farmer (97-80--177), Roybal (61-73--134) and **Josh Pauls** (42-73--115) have more career points. Farmer's 97 goals, 80 assists and 177 points are all U.S. career-best marks.

LOCKER ROOM VISITORS

The U.S. has received notable postgame locker room visits here at the 2019 Para Ice Hockey World Championship.

Following Team USA's victory over Canada, the U.S. received a visit from **Stephen B. King**, U.S. Ambassador to the Czech Republic. King, who was confirmed by the Senate on October 5, 2017, hails from Madison, Wisconsin, where the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team has trained the last few years due to strong relationships developed by the late head coach and long-time Wisconsin Badger men's ice hockey coach, **Jeff Sauer**.

After its game against Norway, **Dominik Hasek**, an Olympic and Stanley Cup champion, visited Team USA. Hasek, a native of Pardubice, Czech Republic, is serving as a tournament ambassador for the 2019 Para Ice Hockey World Championship.

TEAM USA IN WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP PLAY

The U.S. has captured three gold medals in the events' nine-year history and enters the 2019 event seeking a sixth-straight berth in the gold-medal game. This is the second time the event will take place in Ostrava, which hosted the 2009 event and resulted in the U.S. capturing its first-ever world championship.

WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP DEBUTS

A total of five players made their debuts in world championship play in Team USA's 3-1 tournament-opening win over Canada, including **Ralph DeQuebec**, **Travis Dodson**, **Colin Gooley**, **Josh Hargis** and **Kyle Zych**. DeQuebec and Dodson were part of Team USA's gold medal-winning Paralympic entry a year ago while Gooley, Hargis and Zych are in their first season with the U.S. National Sled Hockey Team.

THIS AND THAT

The 2019 Toyota-USA Hockey Disabled Hockey Festival included the Adult Sled Hockey National Championship in which the Chicago Blackhawks Sled Hockey Program (**Travis Dodson**, **Kevin McKee**, **Brody Roybal**) defeated the Gaylord Wolfpack (**Declan Farmer**, **Jack Wallace**) in Wesley Chapel, Florida ... Earlier this month, U.S. goaltender **Jen Lee** took part in the Boston Marathon, finishing the race in just under five hours ... Lee is just one of seven players on Team USA who hold military backgrounds, including three U.S. Army veterans in alternate captain **Rico Roman**, Lee and U.S. Army Ranger **Josh Hargis** and four U.S. Marines in **Ralph DeQuebec**, **Travis Dodson**, **Luke McDermott** and **Josh Sweeney**.

USA HOCKEY HAPPENINGS

U.S. INTERNATIONAL SUCCESS

Entering the 2018-19 season, no other nation has claimed more medals in Olympic, Paralympic and International Ice Hockey Federation play than the United States' 44 since 2010. Additionally, Team USA's 26 collective gold medals also leads all nations. In total, the last eight years has seen the U.S. claim 26 gold medals, 12 silver medals and six bronze medals.

The 26 gold medals span seven events, including the Olympic Winter Games (2018 - Women), Paralympic Winter Games (2010, 2014, 2018), IIHF Women's World Championship (2011, 2013, 2015-17), IIHF World Junior Championship (2010, 2013, 2017), IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship (2010-15, 2017), IIHF Under-18 Women's World Championship (2011, 2015-18) and IPC Para Hockey World Championship (2012, 2015).

2019 U.S. MEN'S NATIONAL TEAM

The 2019 International Ice Hockey Federation Men's World Championship will be held in Kosice & Bratislava, Slovakia, from May 10-26, 2019. The U.S. will compete in Group A alongside Canada, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Great Britain and Slovakia. The U.S. will open the competition against host Slovakia on Friday, May 10 at 2:15 p.m. ET.

Team USA enters the 2019 competition after earning bronze last May in Copenhagen, Denmark. The bronze-medal win gave the U.S. its third bronze medal (2013, 2015, 2018) and fourth top-four finish in the last six IIHF Men's World Championships, a feat the country has not accomplished since medaling in three of the five tournaments it competed in from 1939-1950.

To date, the U.S. has tabbed 20 players to its preliminary roster, headlined by captain **Patrick Kane** (Chicago Blackhawks). **Chris Drury** (New York Rangers) is the general manager of the 2019 U.S. Men's National Team while **Jeff Blashill** (Detroit Red Wings) has been tabbed to serve as head coach for the third straight year.

2019 U.S. UNDER-18 MEN'S NATIONAL TEAM

The U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team earned a bronze medal at the recently completed 2019 IIHF Under-18 World Championship in Ornskoldsvik and Umea, Sweden.

The U.S. defeated Canada, 5-2, to earn its 16th straight medal in the event. That span has included six gold medals in the past 10 tournaments. Its most recent gold came in 2017, when it captured its tournament-record 10th gold.

2019 U.S. WOMEN'S NATIONAL TEAM

The U.S. Women's National Team captured its fifth consecutive gold medal at the International Ice Hockey Federation Women's World Championship in 2019 with a thrilling shootout win over Finland in the gold-medal game.

The 2019 tournament included competition among 10 women's national teams for the first time, as opposed to eight in previous years. The U.S. competed in Group A alongside Canada, Finland, Russia and Switzerland. Group B includes the Czech Republic, France, Germany, Japan and Sweden.

The United States entered the 2019 IIHF Women's World Championship having won gold in the past four Women's World Championships (2013, 2015, 2016, 2017).

2020 U.S. NATIONAL JUNIOR TEAM

The United States recently named **Scott Sandelin** (Hibbing, Minn.) as head coach of the 2020 U.S. National Junior Team that will compete in the 2020 IIHF World Junior Championship in Ostrava and Trinec, Czech Republic. This is the fourth time Sandelin will serve on a U.S. National Junior Team and his second time doing so as head coach. On April 13, he led the University of Minnesota Duluth men's ice hockey team to its second consecutive NCAA national championship.

Additionally, **Steve Miller** (Sun Prairie, Wis./Ohio State University), **David Lassonde** (Durham, N.H./Dartmouth College), **Jerry Keefe** (Saugus, Mass./Northeastern University) and **Brett Larson** (Duluth, Minn./St. Cloud State University) will serve as assistant coaches for the United States in the Czech Republic.
