2018 AAPG AT A GLANCE

The seventh annual USA Hockey All-American Prospects Game features 42 of the best U.S.-born players eligible for the 2019 NHL Draft. Some 130 NHL scouts are expected to be in attendance. Of the 42 players playing tonight, 40 appear on the 2018-19 NHL Central Scouting Pre-Season Futures List, which highlights players that have potential to be selected in the first three rounds of the draft.

Among the 42 players are an event-record 10 Minnesotans. Additionally, Team Leopold forward **Jack Hughes** (Orlando, Fla.) is the projected number one pick in the upcoming NHL Draft. Last season at USA Hockey's National Team Development Program, he registered a U17-record 116 points, including 40 goals and NTDP-record 76 assists, in 60 games. His point total was one point shy of tying **Auston Matthews** (Scottsdale, Ariz.) for the most-ever by an NTDP player in a single season. As an under-ager at the 2018 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship, Hughes earned tournament MVP honors while also being named Best Forward and a member of the Media All-Star Team.



TIDBITS SURROUNDING THE GAME

Tonight's game will be streamed on HockeyTV with NHL Network's **Steve Nelson** handling play-by-play duties and **Brian Lawton**, the first-ever U.S. player to be chosen first overall in an NHL Draft (1983), providing color commentary ... 1960 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team gold medalists **Jack McCartan** (Saint Paul, Minn.) and **Dick Meredith** (South Bend, Ind.) will take part in the ceremonial opening faceoff while **Mike "Lefty" Curran** (International Falls, Minn.), who helped the U.S. capture the silver medal at the 1972 Olympic Winter Games, will present the trophy to the game's most valuable player ... To date, AAPG alumni have gone on to become Calder Trophy Finalists, NHL All-Stars, earn NHL All-Star Game MVP honors and win the Stanley Cup. Entering the 2018-19 season, 41 AAPG alumni have already made their NHL debuts. For more on AAPG alumni, see page 9 ... Among those in attendance tonight are Hockey Hall of Fame member **Lou Nanne**; USA Hockey's assistant executive director of hockey operations and U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame member, **John Vanbiesbrouck**; president and commissioner of the United States Hockey League, **Tom Garrity**; president and commissioner of the North American Hockey League, **Mark Frankenfeld**, among others.



AMERICANS AT THE 2018 NHL DRAFT

Overall, 52 American players from 17 different states heard their name called in Dallas at the 2018 NHL Draft. Six American first-round selections were made, including Minnetonka, Minn., native **K'Andre Miller**. Additionally, four Americans were taken in the second round followed by nine in the third, a record 14 in the fourth, six in the fifth and sixth rounds and seven in the seventh round.

The 2018 NHL Draft also saw a record-tying 28 AAPG alumni drafted, including **Brady Tkachuk** (St. Louis, Mo.), MVP of last year's AAPG, who was the first American taken when he was selected fourth overall by the Ottawa Senators. Also among the selections was **Quinn Hughes** (Orlando, Fla.), the older brother of **Jack Hughes**, who was taken by the Vancouver Canucks seventh overall. To date, 155 AAPG alumni have been drafted. For a list of AAPG drafted players, see pages 7 and 8.



STATE OF HOCKEY TIES

Tabbed the 'State of Hockey', Minnesota led all U.S. states with 57,634 USA Hockey registered players in the 2017-18 season. Additionally, among USA Hockey's 12 districts, Minnesota ranked second behind the Central District (78,348) with 69,605 players, coaches and officials.

Of the 272 Americans who skated in the NHL last year, 54 were from Minnesota, the most of any state. Entering the 2018-19 season, four of the 24-filled NHL captaincy positions are held by Americans, including Minnesotan **Blake Wheeler** (Winnipeg Jets). Additionally, Minnesotan **Ryan McDonagh** (Tampa Bay Lightning) spent four seasons as captain of the New York Rangers before a trade last season. For more on Minnesota, see page 4.

U.S. Olympian (2006)

NCAA National Champion, Hobey Baker Award Recipient (2002)

Jordan Leopold, a native of Golden Valley, Minn., and University of Minnesota product who enjoyed a 12-year NHL career before retiring as a member of the Minnesota Wild in 2015, is serving as a head coach for the seventh annual USA Hockey All-American Prospects Game.

Selected by the Anaheim Ducks in the second round (44th overall) in the 1999 NHL Draft, Leopold registered 214 career points (67-147) over stints with the Calgary Flames (2002-06, 2009), Colorado Avalanche (2006-09), Florida Panthers (2009-10), Pittsburgh Penguins (2010), Buffalo Sabres (2010-13), St. Louis Blues (2012-15), Columbus Blue Jackets (2015) and Minnesota Wild (2015). Internationally, Leopold skated for Team USA on seven different

occasions, including one Olympic Winter Games (2006), four IIHF World Championships (2002, 2003, 2005, 2008) and twice at the IIHF World Junior Championship (1999-2000).

Leopold, who was a member of USA Hockey's National Team Development Program during its inaugural season (1997-98), played four seasons at the University of Minnesota (1998-2002). He capped his career in a Gopher uniform by winning the Hobey Baker Memorial Award his senior season (one of only seven defensemen to do so) and assisting on the game-winning goal in overtime to help Minnesota capture the 2002 NCAA national championship.

Two-Time Olympian (1998, 2010 - silver)

Two-Time Stanley Cup Champion (1999, 2003)

Jamie Langenbrunner, a native of Cloquet, Minn. who captured two Stanley Cups (1999, 2003) and captained the silver medal-winning 2010 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team, is serving as a head coach for the seventh annual USA Hockey All-American Prospects Game.

Currently working in player development for the NHL's Boston Bruins, Langenbrunner skated 16 seasons in the NHL, including stints with the Dallas Stars (1994-2001, 2011), New Jersey Devils (2002-11) and St. Louis Blues (2011-13). Drafted by the Stars in the second round (35th overall) of the 1993 NHL Draft, Langenbrunner amassed 663 points (243-420) in his playing career, one of only 35 American-born players to eclipse the 660 mark. Additionally, Langenbrunner ranks 22nd all-time for most NHL

games played by an American with 1,109 outings. A proven playoff performer, Langenbrunner tallied 34 goals and 53 assists for 87 points in 146 career playoff games while playing key roles on the Stanley Cup-winning Dallas Stars (1999) and New Jersey Devils (2003).

Langenbrunner also represented the U.S. on five occasions, registering eight points (4-4) while skating in two Olympic Winter Games (1998, 2010), one World Cup of Hockey (2004) and two IIHF World Junior Championships (1994, 1995).

AAPG ALUMS CAPTURE 2017-18 TITLES

Collectively, AAPG alums have gone on to capture three NCAA championships, two AHL Calder Cups, one Stanley Cup and 11 medals (five gold, two silver, four bronze) in IIHF play.

This past season, **Shane Gersich** (2013 AAPG) became the first AAPG alum to capture the Stanley Cup as a member of the Washington Capitals, **Jeremy Bracco** (2014 AAPG) helped the Toronto Marlies win the Calder Cup Championship while **Joey Anderson** (2015 AAPG), **Mikey Anderson** (2016 AAPG) and **Riley Tuft** (2015 AAPG) were instrumental in the University of Minnesota Duluth winning the NCAA national championship.

In IIHF play, a total of 39 AAPG alums helped the U.S. to medals at the IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship (silver), IIHF World Junior Championship (bronze) and IIHF Men's World Championship (bronze).

U.S. captain **Mattias Samuelsson** (2017 AAPG) and 13 other AAPG alums were part of the U.S. Under-18 Men's National Team's silver medal effort while another 18 players, including captain and Roseville, Minn., native **Joey Anderson** (2015 AAPG) helped the U.S. earn a bronze medal on home ice at the 2018 IIHF World Junior Championship in Buffalo, N.Y. Last May, eight players, including alternate captain **Dylan Larkin** (2013 AAPG) were part of Team USA's bronze medal effort at the 2018 IIHF Men's World Championship.

Defenseman **Quinn Hughes** (2017 AAPG) skated for Team USA at both the IIHF World Junior Championship and IIHF Men's World Championship, the first draft-eligible player to represent the U.S. in the IIHF Men's World Championship since **Auston Matthews** in 2016.



NCAA HOCKEY

Thirty-eight players competing in tonight's game are verbally committed to NCAA programs. Additionally, **Ben Brinkman**, a native of Edina, Minn., is entering his first season at University of Minnesota (Big Ten). Boston University (Hockey East) leads the way with six commitments.



UNITED STATES HOCKEY LEAGUE

A total of 31 players playing in tonight's game have developmental roots in the USHL. As the top junior league in the United States, the USHL prepares players for NCAA Division I hockey as well as careers in the NHL. The USHL had its strongest-ever showing at the 2018 NHL Draft, as 57 players with USHL ties were selected. The 57 players chosen set a new USHL record, eclipsing the previous mark of 51 set at the 2014 NHL Draft. Forty-five of those 57 players skated in the USHL during the 2017-18 season, also setting a league record, breaking the previous mark of 40 set at the 2017 NHL Draft.



USA HOCKEY'S NATIONAL TEAM DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Nineteen players here tonight have played or currently play for USA Hockey's National Team Development Program in Plymouth, Mich. The full-time program is composed of two squads, the U.S. National Under-18 Team and Under-17 teams, which compete in the USHL, while also facing international and collegiate competition.



USA HOCKEY PLAYER DEVELOPMENT CAMPS

Thirty-four players here tonight have attended at least one USA Hockey Player Development Camp, which are held annually every June and July. The week-long sessions provide many of the United States' best young hockey players with concentrated on- and off-ice training and coaching, as well as the opportunity to compete against their peers. Notable Minnesotan NHLers

Minnesota has produced some of the NHL's top stars in the league today, including **Zach Parise** (Minneapolis), a two-time U.S. Olympian (2010, 2014) and 2004 IIHF World Junior Championship MVP and gold medalist. Parise's 685 career points rank fifth all-time among Minnesota-born NHLers while his 333 goals rank third, only seven behind all-time leader **Dave Christian**, a member of the gold medal-winning 1980 U.S. Olympic Team who played parts of 15 seasons in the NHL.

In addition to Parise, other notable current NHL veterans from Minnesota include **Blake Wheeler** (Plymouth) and **Dustin Byfuglien** (Minneapolis) of the Winnipeg Jets, as well as Tampa Bay Lightning's **Ryan McDonagh** (Saint Paul).

Wheeler has served as captain of the Jets for the past three seasons while Byfuglien, a 2010 Stanley Cup champion with the Chicago Blackhawks, has skated eight seasons within the Jets organization. Together, Wheeler and Byfuglien have donned the U.S. sweater five times, including once together as teammates at the 2016 World Cup of Hockey.

McDonagh, the 2007 recipient of the Minnesota Mr. Hockey Award, skated eight seasons with the New York Rangers, including four as captain, before being traded to the Tampa Bay Lightning last season. Internationally, McDonagh has represented the U.S. on five separate occasions, helping the U.S. earn a silver medal at the 2007 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship.

Additionally, a number of rising NHL stars and prospects hail from the State of Hockey. Last season, **Brock Boeser** (Burnsville) of the Vancouver Canucks became the first American rookie and second-ever rookie behind Mario Lemieux in 1985 to be named MVP of an NHL All-Star Game. Additionally, his 29 goals ranked second among all NHL rookies while his 55 points sat fifth.

The 2018-19 season will also see two notable AAPG alums battle for places on NHL rosters in their respective organizations. 2016 AAPG MVP **Casey Mittelstadt** (Edina), the 2017 Minnesota Mr. Hockey Award winner and tournament MVP at the 2018 IIHF World Junior Championship in Buffalo, N.Y., aims for a full-time spot on the Buffalo Sabres roster after making his NHL debut last season following a season with the University of Minnesota. Also looking for a place in the NHL this season is 2015 AAPG player **Joey Anderson** (Roseville), who captained the U.S. to a bronze medal at the 2018 IIHF World Junior Championship and helped the University of Minnesota Duluth capture the 2018 NCAA national championship last April.

WILD CONNECTIONS

Overall, 14 members of the Minnesota Wild have American ties, including 12 players and two coaches. Additionally, the Wild have drafted 10 Americans in the last five NHL Drafts, including five AAPG alums currently in the organization in **Luke Kunin** (2016/Chesterfield, Mo.), **Ivan Lodnia** (2016/Novi, Minn.), **Jordan Greenway** (2015/Canton, N.Y.), **Louie Belpedio** (2014/Skokie, Ill.) and **Nick Boka** (2014/Plymouth, Mich.).

Among the coaching staff are two Minnesota natives in assistant coach **Darby Hendrickson**, and goaltending coach **Bob Mason**. A native of Richfield, Minn., Hendrickson is entering his ninth season as an assistant coach for the Wild, the same team he played for from 2000-04. An original member of the Wild, Hendrickson scored the team's first goal at Xcel Energy Center against the Philadelphia Flyers and represented the U.S. seven times, including one Olympic Winter Games (1994) and six IIHF Men's World Championships (1996 – bronze, 1997, 1998, 1999, 2000, 2001). Additionally, Mason, an International Falls, Minn., native, played for the 1984 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey team under Lou Vairo, a 2014 U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame inductee who led the Minnesota-based Austin Mavericks to the USHL National Championship in 1976.

Ten current members of the Minnesota Wild have represented the United States internationally at the International Ice Hockey Federation or Olympic level.

In total, 10 players who laced up for the Minnesota Wild last season have represented the United States 27 times in international play. Collectively, the group has captured eight gold medals, one silver medal and four bronze medals in Olympic and International Ice Hockey Federation competitions. Of the eight gold medals, three were won at the IIHF World Junior Championship (2004, 2010, 2017) and five were captured at the IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship (2002, 2009-10, 2014-15).

Among the gold medalists are Wild alternate captains, **Zach Parise** and **Ryan Suter**, who helped the U.S. capture its first-ever gold medals at both the IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship and IIHF World Junior Championship. Additionally, **Luke Kunin** captained the U.S. with Wild teammate **Jordan Greenway** to gold medals in both tournaments (2015 IIHF MU18, 2017 IIHF WJC) while **Louie Belpedio** served as captain for Team USA's gold-medal win at the 2014 IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship. **Jason Zucker** holds the most IIHF gold medals with three, including two at the IIHF Under-18 Men's World Championship (2009, 2010) and one at the IIHF World Junior Championship (2010).

Other Wild players to skate for the U.S. internationally include **Charlie Coyle**, **J.T. Brown**, **Matt Hendricks** and **Kyle Rau**. Hendricks captained the U.S. to a bronze medal at the 2015 IIHF Men's World Championship alongside Wild teammate Coyle.

Parise, Suter and Greenway are the only current Wild players to have skated for the U.S. in an Olympic Winter Games. After Parise and Suter helped the 2010 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team earn a silver medal, Parise served as captain while Suter was an alternate captain for the 2014 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team that reached the bronze-medal game. Meanwhile, Greenway was part of the 2018 U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team last February and in doing so became the first African-American to skate on a U.S. Olympic Men's Ice Hockey Team and the first player to play in an Olympic Winter Games, an NCAA Tournament and the Stanley Cup Playoffs in the same season.

AAPG HISTORY AT A GLANCE

Now in its seventh year, the USA Hockey All-American Prospects Game provides the best U.S. players eligible for next year's NHL Draft the opportunity to showcase their skills on a national stage. To date, 155 alumni have been drafted in the NHL, including 36 first-round selections.



2017 AAPG BUFFALO, NEW YORK SEPT. 21

Hockey Hall of Famers **Chris Chelios** and **Brian Leetch** served as head coaches for the sixth annual game. The 11 combined goals set an AAPG record for most goals in a single game as Team Leetch bested Team Chelios, 6-5. A record-tying 28 participants went on to be selected in the 2018 NHL Draft, including six first-round selections.



2017 AAPG PHILADELPHIA, PENNSYLVANIA SEPT. 22

Mark Howe and **John LeClair**, both members of the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame and former Philadelphia Flyers, served as head coaches. A total of 10 goals were scored as Team LeClair topped Team Howe, 6-4. Twenty-four players that competed in the game went on to be selected in the 2017 NHL Draft. Two players have made their NHL debuts.



2015 AAPG BUFFALO, NEW YORK SEPT. 24

Derek Plante and **Jeremy Roenick** served as head coaches for the fourth annual game. The 10 combined goals set a then-AAPG record for most goals in a single game. The game included a record 10 AAPG players who would go on to be selected in the first round of the 2016 NHL Draft, including forwards **Matthew Tkachuk** and **Clayton Keller** as the sixth and seventh overall selections. Eight 2015 AAPG players have made their NHL debuts, including Keller who was a Calder Memorial trophy finalist in 2018.



2014 AAPG BUFFALO, NEW YORK SEPT. 25

Led by coaches **Mike Grier** and **Ed Olczyk**, the third CCM/USA Hockey All-American Prospects Game had Team Grier defeating Team Olczyk, 6-3. Alumni from the game include 2018 NHL All-Star Game MVP **Brock Boeser**, 2017 Calder Memorial Trophy finalist **Zach Werenski**, and 2015 Hobey Baker Memorial Award winner **Jack Eichel**. In total, nine 2014 AAPG players have made their NHL debuts to date.



2013 AAPG PITTSBURGH, PENNSYLVANIA SEPT. 26

Mark Johnson and **Joe Mullen** served as head coaches in the second-ever AAPG. Held at CONSOL Energy Center, Team Johnson bested Team Mullen, 5-2. Forward **Dylan Larkin** opened the scoring and went on to be the first American selected at the 2014 NHL Draft when he was selected 15th overall by his hometown Detroit Red Wings. To date, 13 players from the game have made their NHL debuts.



2012 AAPG BUFFALO, NEW YORK SEPT. 29

In the inaugural USA Hockey All-American Prospects Game, **Rob McClanahan** led his team to victory over **Phil Housley** by a 5-2 count. Headlining the AAPG class were defenseman **Seth Jones**, who went on to be selected fourth overall by the Nashville Predators at the 2013 NHL Draft, and **Will Butcher**, the 2017 Hobey Baker Memorial Award winner. To date, nine 2012 AAPG players have made their NHL debuts.
