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FOND DU LAC CO-CURRICULAR CODE (MIDDLE SCHOOL/HIGH SCHOOL)

I. PHILOSOPHY

The Fond du Lac School District sponsors co-curricular activities to provide students with additional opportunities for personal growth, self-discipline, skill development, cooperation with others, creativity, and fun. Although the co-curricular program is a valuable part of the total educational experience, participation in co-curricular programs is a privilege, and not a right. As such, all participants must abide by all rules and responsibilities which apply to each co-curricular program in order to continue participation in these activities.

As a privilege, participation in co-curricular activities carries additional responsibilities and expectations for students. To be a credit to self, family, school and community, a student is expected to display high standards of behavior, exemplify good sportsmanship, and show respect to self and others. Parents, coaches, and staff have a responsibility in supporting and ensuring the rules and standards of the co-curricular program are followed.

It is recognized that personal problems can interfere with the health and well-being of students and their ability to participate in co-curricular activities. This code therefore includes provisions for support, intervention, and referral in order to help students achieve their full potential.

Coaches and advisors have a responsibility to provide instruction, guidelines, expectations, and practice times; to encourage improvement; to fully communicate with the athlete and student on status within the team or activity; and to provide team play and good sportsmanship. When an injury occurs, the coaching and training staff will attempt to contact a parent.

II. DEFINITION OF CO-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Co-curricular activities include any school-related organized activity that is offered outside of academic class requirements. Co-curricular activities for grades 6 to 12 are divided into four distinct categories. School District policies and school rules govern all student activities. In addition, each category has unique rules and expectations, which regulate participation. Co-curricular activities are designated into four categories:

- Category 1 - Leadership and Honors
- Category 2 - Athletics
- Category 3 - Competitive Activities
- Category 4 - Music/Performing Arts Activities

III. CATEGORIES 1, 2 and 3 ACTIVITIES

Category 1 - Leadership and Honors

This category includes those activities that have their membership representatives elected or appointed to leadership and public recognition. There will be an application or nomination process established by the building administration for these activities. Students in this category are expected to be representative of the values, expectations, and ideas espoused by the school.

Students participating in Category 1 activities will be expected to comply with the academic rules, attendance rules, and social behavior and conduct rules listed as part of the co-curricular code. In order to be eligible to participate, students must be in good standing, exhibit proper school behavior, and have no school violations. Students who violate stated rules are subject to removal from the activity for the rest of the current school year, and can reapply during the following school year. All eligibility determinations will be made by the advisor and/or the building administration. Activities included under Category 1, but not limited to the following listing, are:

Category 2 - Athletics

Interscholastic athletics are governed by the Fond du Lac School District Co-Curricular Code and the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association (WIAA). Activities included under Category 2, but not limited to the following listing, are:

Category 3 - Competitive Activities

Activities that are competitive in nature and/or require tryouts are governed by the same code requirements as interscholastic athletics. Activities included under Category 3, but not limited to the following listing, are:

A. Eligibility Rules: Category 1, 2 and 3 Activities

1. Academic Eligibility - Grades 6-12

- a. Academic eligibility shall be based on the cumulative grade reported in week nine and eighteen of each academic semester.
- b. A student participating in a Category 1, 2, or 3 activity must earn passing grades (D- or higher) in all courses in which they are enrolled.
- c. Ineligibility shall be for a period of fifteen (15) school days. The fifteen (15) school days will begin the day the grades have been distributed. The student may be able to participate after the 15th school day provided he/she regains eligibility based on attaining the above criteria. Middle school students are ineligible until student has all passing grades.
- d. The period of ineligibility shall be adjusted for Category 1, 2, and 3 activities, which begin competition/activity before the opening day of school. The period of time will be a minimum of three (3) weeks (21 calendar days) from the date of the first contest. (Does not apply to middle schools.)
- e. A student participating in a Category 1, 2, or 3 activity is required to attend meetings/practices during a period of academic ineligibility, provided students are not missing class time.
- f. A student may erase ineligibility status following the last grading period of the school year through the summer school courses at the same or some other school provided the course made up is equivalent to the one that caused ineligibility. (Does not apply to middle schools.)
- g. A student who is making satisfactory progress in a CWD (Children with Disabilities) program or alternative school may be exempt from the above criteria.

2. Required Paperwork to Compete

- a. WIAA Physical Paperwork (Every 2 years)
- b. WIAA Rules of Eligibility
- c. Concussion Paperwork
- d. Emergency Contact Form

3. Regaining Eligibility - Grades 6-12

- a. Eligibility will be regained when grades are rechecked after 15 school days for verification that the minimal requirements have been met.
- b. If a student earns an incomplete in a class due to an extenuating circumstance, the student regains eligibility immediately if “incomplete assignments” are made up within two (2) weeks after the grade reporting period.

4. Attendance Policy

- a. A student must be present at all classes on the day of a practice or competition/performance to be eligible to participate. Absence due to illness will not be considered an excuse to participate that day in any competition/performance or practice. Only permission from school administration or the athletic director will permit a student to compete after missing classes. Such examples of excused reasons would be attendance at a funeral, a doctor or dentist appointment, an absence that is related to a classroom grade (e.g. field trip), or the like. Students may not participate in any competition/performance or practice if they are out ill for any portion or all of the school day without permission from school administration or the athletic director.

- 1) Penalty: The student will not be allowed to participate in practice or a contest on that day. If a student is unexcused from a class during the season, he/she will miss the next contest. If the student misses practice, the coach will determine the consequences. Chronic absences, as determined by the coach, will result in dismissal from the team. A student who is assigned to an alternative program/in-school suspension or is serving an out-of-school suspension may not participate in any contest on days or portions of days of scheduled contests when alternative program assignment or the suspension is in effect. Students may not practice on days when a suspension is in effect.

Students suspended Friday and Monday will result in no Saturday competition. Students may practice the day the suspension ends.

Note: A student who is ill on a Friday and misses the entire day shall be withheld from a contest on Saturday unless he or she has written permission from the parent that he or she can compete and the coach determines that he or she can compete.

5. Social Eligibility

- a. Participants in all co-curricular programs will be responsible for maintaining a high level of social and behavioral acceptability at all times. They must conduct themselves in such a fashion as to bring pride to their family, school, and community. All students shall refrain from willful, persistent, and disruptive behavior.
- b. The coach/advisor shall define the consequences for poor student conduct in writing prior to the start of the season. Consequences may include suspension from participation. These consequences must be approved by the building administration and kept on file with the athletic director. Consequences established by a coach/advisor cannot supersede the provisions of the Fond du Lac School District Co-Curricular Code.
- c. All participants are required to attend practice (when applicable) during social ineligibility.

Socially Eligibility violations will include, but will not be limited to, the following:

- 1) Use, possession, remaining in the presence of others who are illegally using or possessing such items, or buying of controlled substances or street drugs.
- 2) Use of banned substances according to WIAA policy performance enhancement pamphlet and creatine.
- 3) Use, possession, remaining in the presence of others who are illegally using or possessing such items, or buying alcoholic beverages.
- 4) Possession or use of drug paraphernalia.
- 5) Remaining present at events/parties or situations where alcohol, tobacco related, or other illegal/controlled substances are being illegally consumed or possessed. This does not include social gatherings such as weddings/family/work events.
- 6) Presence in a bar or tavern that may result in a citation or arrest by law enforcement.

- 7) Use or possession of tobacco or tobacco-related products in any form, or remaining in the presence of others who are illegally using or possessing such items. This also pertains to juuls, vape pens, boulders, supplies, paraphernalia, and solutions.
 - 8) Abusive actions/language or willful insubordination of teacher/admin/coach/advisor.
 - 9) Violations of criminal state statutes, i.e. assault, weapon charges, burglary, etc
 - 10) Acts that are determined to be vandalism
 - 11) Illegal or inappropriate use of the internet, personal cell phones, or other digital devices both on and off campus.
 - 12) A criminal offense or violation of an ordinance having a statutory counterpart (i.e. a citation for underage drinking in another community would have a statutory counterpart in Fond du Lac).
 - 13) Hosting a party - Any person who has a gathering at their home/property where alcohol, tobacco, or drugs are permitted by such a person to be used will be given a penalty at the next level above the level they would normally be suspended.
- Note: A student violating this area of the code of conduct may not use the self-referral option.
- 14) Distributing alcohol/tobacco/drugs - Any person who distributes alcohol, tobacco, or drugs to another person(s) will be given a penalty at the next level above the level they would normally be suspended.
- Note: A student who supplies alcohol, tobacco, or drugs to another person(s) may not use the self-referral option.
- 15) Flagrant or unsportsmanlike conduct and/or assault on an official: Any participant who spits on, strikes, slaps, kicks, pushes or intentionally and aggressively physically contacts an official at any time, shall be immediately ineligible for competition a minimum of 90 calendar days from the date of the confrontation. In addition, the player is ineligible to compete for the first 25% of the next season in that same sport.

School administrators and/or designee and the athletic director will address instances of misconduct after consideration of the facts and circumstances.

B. Code of Conduct:

1. Investigation of Violations and Notification Process

- a. Reported violations must be done in writing. No anonymous reports will be considered.
- b. The school administrator or athletic director or designee will inform the student of the violation, allow the student to give his/her side of the story, and make a determination as to whether the co-curricular code was violated.

- c. During the investigation any student that is misleading, dishonest, or untruthful during disclosure may be given a penalty at the next level above the level they would normally be suspended.
- d. Students will meet with the athletic director, high school administrator or designee for investigative process.

C. Discipline for Code Violations:

Discipline for code violations is cumulative over the course of the student’s high school career. The student’s violation record is not cleared at the start of each new school year, and the step process does not start over on an annual basis.

- a. Violations of Academic Eligibility will be followed as outlined previously in Section A. 1.
- b. Violations of Social Eligibility and Athletic Eligibility will be addressed as follows:

Category 1 Activity:

- a. 1st Offense - Suspension as follows:

The student will not be allowed to hold office or apply for areas listed under Category 1 during that school year. If violation occurs during the summer, violations will be applied to the upcoming school year.

Category 2 and 3 Activities:

If a season is completed before the entire suspension is served, the suspension will be extended into another season or year until served.

Percentage of individual contests/events will be rounded up or down. (.5 or more equals one missed event.)

Note: During suspension, the student is required to practice and travel with the team, provided that they are in good academic standing and it has been agreed upon by the coaches, but not suit up. Scrimmages are not included in scheduled contests.

3. Severity Clause: A student arrested and/or charged for a violation(s) of Wisconsin criminal statutes as determined serious enough by the superintendent, athletic director, and principal shall lose co-curricular eligibility for the remainder of his/her academic career. The student is eligible to re-apply for reinstatement after one (1) calendar year through this code's appeal process if he/she has completed 100 hours of school approved service. The severity clause supersedes step offenses 1-3 and goes to step 4 of the violations listed above stating: The participant will lose co-curricular eligibility for the remainder of his/her high school career and the Board of Education will be notified.
4. Ineligibility for Special Awards: Participants who violate the code of conduct will be ineligible for any special awards during the season of participation as well as any season in which the suspension is served. No student with a code of conduct violation may be nominated for any special end of season awards. This shall include, but not be limited to, MVP, MIP, Coaches' Award, Captain, All-Conference, All-Area, All-State awards.

D. Penalties for Code of Conduct Violations with Self-Referral:

1. Self-Referral - If a student presents himself/herself to the athletic director or high school administration as a person who has violated the code of conduct, that student could possibly have his/her penalty reduced if deemed appropriate by the athletic director, advisor, or school administration. For this to occur, the student must self-admit no later than the first school day after the violation has occurred and the information cannot already have been shared with the administration from another source. Voluntary disclosure by the student during the summer vacation period must be reported the morning of the next weekday.
 - a. Voluntary disclosure by the student on the first offense for example will result in consideration of the student's violation being reduced to less

than 25% (most common reduction is 15%) of the contests/events and may be required to participate in an approved counseling program.

- b. Voluntary disclosure requires the student to report the violation by the start of the next school day or regular scheduled practice/event whichever comes first (this includes practices/events held during a scheduled school vacation such as holiday breaks, spring break, etc.)
- c. Voluntary disclosure by the student for a code violation during the summer vacation period must be reported the morning of the next weekday. Violations that occur on the weekend (Friday, Saturday, Sunday) must be reported by the morning of the following Monday.

E. Student Appeal Procedure:

1. Students may appeal the suspension for violation of the co-curricular code. They will remain suspended during the time of the appeal process. The following steps will be taken:
 - a. To appeal, the parent must contact the athletic director and/or administrator of the school attended in writing within seven (7) days of written notification of the suspension.
 - b. The athletic director or advisor will arrange a meeting with the student, a parent or guardian, and high school principal within seven (7) days of receipt of the written appeal.
 - c. After meeting with the parties, the building principal and/or designee will render a decision affirming, modifying, or overruling the suspension.
 - d. The building principal's decision will be sent in writing within seven (7) school days after the meeting.
 - e. Should the student and/or his/her parent(s) or guardian(s) disagree with that decision, they may appeal in writing within seven (7) days to the school district superintendent.
 - f. The superintendent appeal shall follow the same criteria as with the principal. If satisfaction is still not reached, then the same procedure will apply requesting a meeting with the Board of Education. The Board's decision is final.

IV. CATEGORY 4 - MUSIC/PERFORMING ARTS ACTIVITIES

This activity area is governed by the relationship of classroom enrollment to the requirements for performance as an aspect of grading by the instructor. Behaviors under this category remain under the direction of the building principal and the supervision of the individual classroom instructor. All students participating in the respective activities will adhere to school board policies, school rules and regulations, and classroom expectations. Activities included under Category 4, but not limited to the following listing, are:
