Every season we lose some ski patrollers, not on the mountain...we lose them to family moves, job responsibilities, a new addition to the family, or possibly an injury or an illness. Therefore, to keep the ski patrol numbers going in the right direction, a new group of candidates study, train and test to become Outdoor Emergency Care technicians. It actually takes about a year of training to become a ski patroller and this round of certification is only the first in the process. If you are interested in helping the patrol and learning a little about our training process, we would be delighted to have you as a patient.



#### Testing Schedule

- Saturday, Nov. 19 - 8:00 to 5:00
- Sunday, Nov. 20 - 8:00 to 5:00
- Monday, Dec. 5 - 6:30pm to 9:30pm

Saturday and Sunday testing will take place at the Idaho Music Academy, 1505 Tyrell Lane, Boise 83706. Monday, Dec. 5 will take place at the Bogus Basin office on Bogus Basin Road.

If you sign up, you should plan to be there the entire time. You can sign up for one day or more than one day. **Patients need to be**

**able to act injured and be consistent from one candidate test to the next. Be prepared to be touched by people you don't know!**

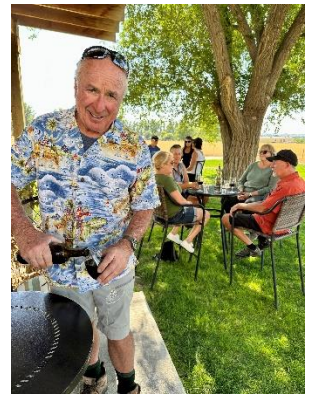
## Wine Ride 2022

Special thanks to Bruce and Juli for opening their home to us and to Paul Markowitz for organizing this event.

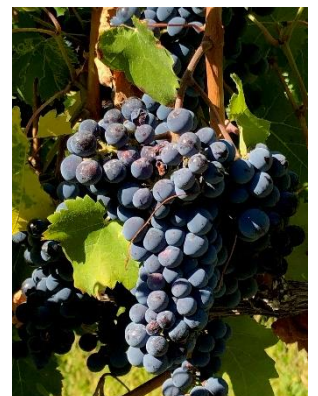


Guy Exon brought the Sag Wagon and Michael Bouton ran traffic control.
