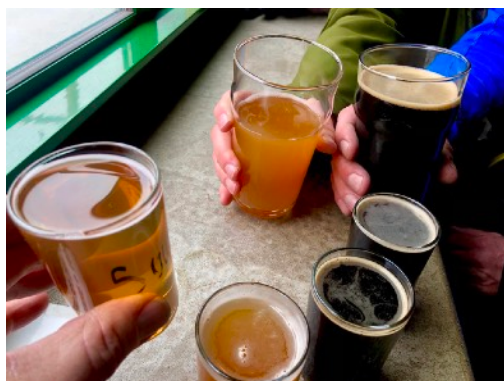

series of weather change five or six times before ending our day. Anyway - better luck next year when we catch a weekend with Highway 55 open.

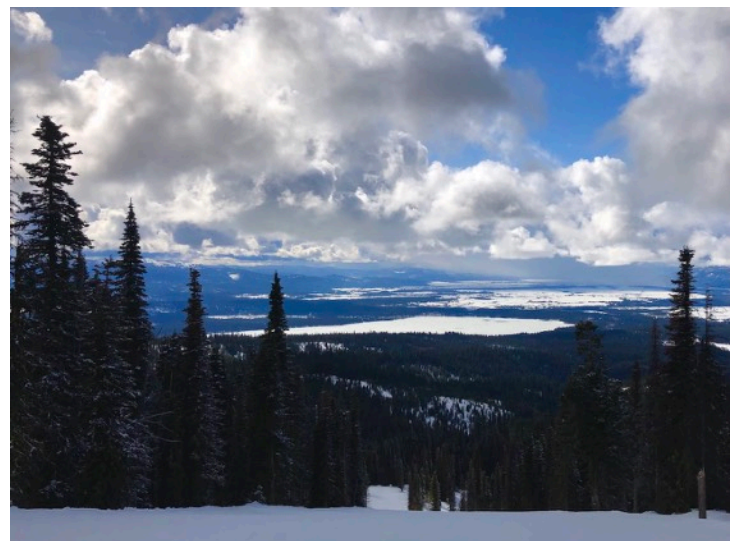

In Memoriam

Terence "Terry or TL" Lofsvold (1938-2021)

Terence "Terry or TL" Benjamin Lofsvold was born in Spokane, Washington, February 15, 1938, to Doris "Churchy" Lofsvold and Gene Lofsvold. He was raised in Issaquah, Washington, and graduated from Issaquah High School in 1956. He continued his education at Whitman College, graduating with a B.S. in Physical Education in 1960. He later pursued a Master's degree in Recreation Administration from Oregon State University, graduating in 1969.



After graduating from Whitman College, Terry moved to Boise, where he worked as Assistant Recreation Director for the City of Boise. He spent his winter months at Bogus Basin supervising the youth ski school instructors. This presented him with the opportunity to become a management trainee for Bogus Basin. He worked at Bogus Basin for 20 years, and served as General Manager from 1984-1991. During this time, he was responsible for lowering the cost of season passes to be more affordable to residents in the Treasure Valley, and bringing more local families to the mountain. His mantra was "skiing is a lifetime sport", so he focused a lot of his time on encouraging people of all ages to come give skiing a try. Terry's biggest accomplishment was providing expert skiers more terrain to ski at night by installing lights on the backside of Shafer Butte (Superior Chair).

While living in Boise, Terry served as a member of the Idaho Travel Council, President of the Idaho Ski Areas Association, and a board member of the Boise Area Chamber of Commerce. He was also a member of the National Ski Patrol Association and a member of the Bogus Basin Ski Club. In 1998 Terry and Carol moved to Grand Junction, Colorado, and he remained an avid skier. Terry passed away in his sleep on March 9, 2021. He will be remembered for his many contributions to Bogus Basin Recreation Area and to the Bogus Basin Ski Club. William (Bill) H. Tuller (1925-2021)



Bill was born at his parent's home on 20th Street in Boise, March 25, 1925, to William H and Evelyn Tuller. He attended Lowell, North, and Boise High, graduating in 1943. From 1943 to 1946 while stationed in Hawaii, Bill served in the Navy Construction Battalions (Sea Bees) to build airstrips. This experience led him to choose Civil Engineering as his course of study at Boise Junior College and then University of Colorado-Boulder where he graduated in 1950. He then returned to Boise where he worked for the US Geological Service as a hydrological engineer. In 1961 Bill joined Don McCarter as a partner in McCarter-Tuller Consulting Engineers and Surveyors. His company along with other companies planned, designed, and laid groundwork for roads and power lines in Idaho and other states in the Northwest. One of his firm's last jobs was designing the new grade into Horseshoe Bend on Highway 55. After a wonderful career he retired in 1990.

Bill thought Idaho was the best place to work and play. Skiing was important to him, and he was on the ski patrol at Bogus Basin. He helped with ski races, and Bill and Jean were active in the Bogus Basin Ski Club where they had many friends. At age 94, he passed away in his family home on March 10, 2020. He will be missed. 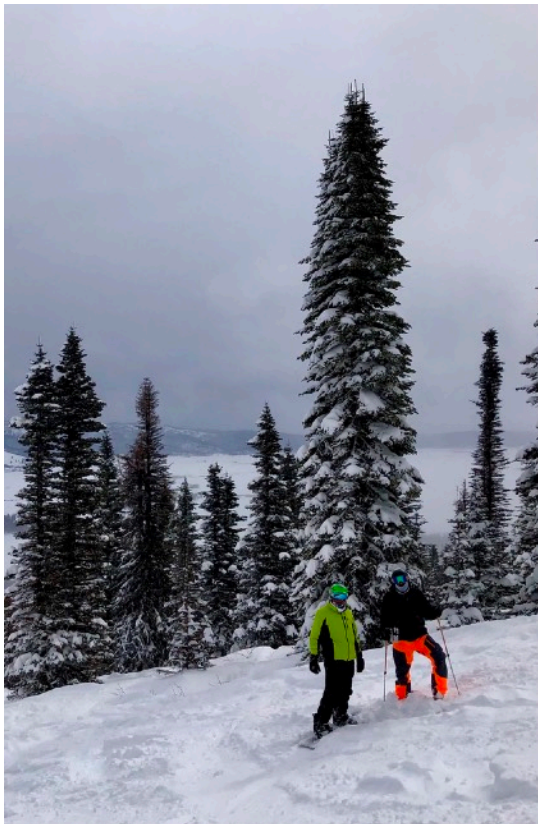

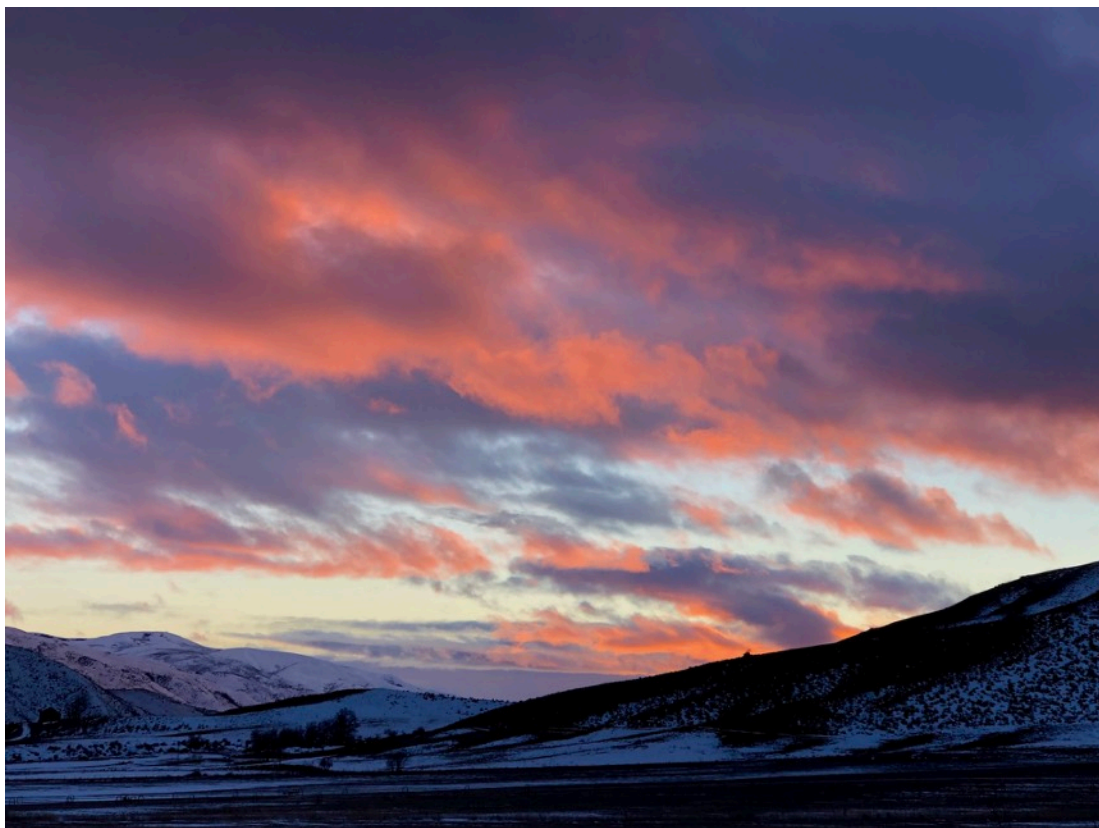
